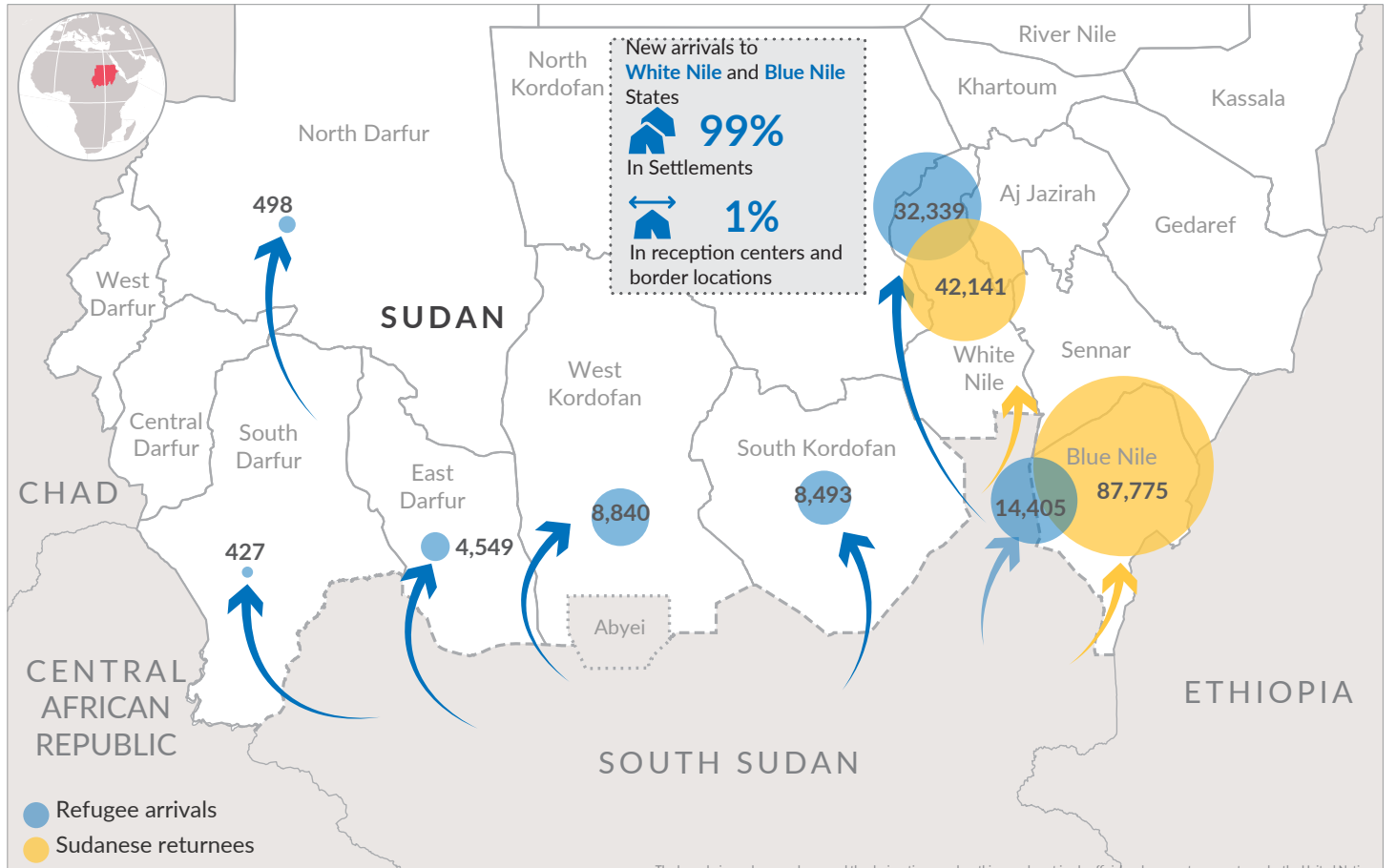
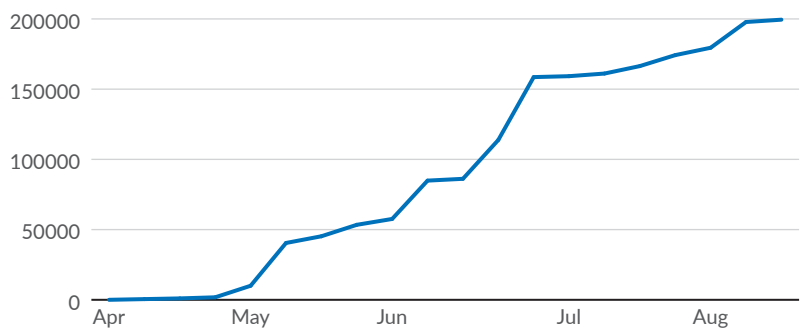
In **White Nile State**, A nutrition survey was also conducted during the reporting period, targeting 300 families, including returnees. The survey identified 18 cases of malnutrition, all of whom are now receiving treatment through the CMAM programme. In **Blue Nile State**, ADD, through UNHCR funding, is conducting Psychosocial support (PSS), Risk identification for women and children, meetings with Community-Based Protection Networks (CBPN) and distribution of plastic sheets to 5,000 individuals.

Context

Since late February, political instability and rising hostilities between armed groups in South Sudan have led to fresh clashes, particularly in Upper Nile State. This has caused a large influx of people to flee South Sudan to Sudan. More than **199,000 people** have entered Sudan during this period. This includes an estimated **69,500 South Sudanese**, most of whom (46%) are in White Nile state, followed by Blue Nile (21%), West Kordofan (13%), South Kordofan (12%), East Darfur (7%) and the arrivals in North Darfur and South Darfur by small percentages. Following the suspension of registration activities countrywide, border monitoring activities at the three designated border points (Joda, Al Megenis and Um Jalala) will also be suspended until further notice.

Adding to this complexity is the arrival of an estimated **87,700 Sudanese returnees** to Blue Nile State and more than **42,000 Sudanese returnees** to White Nile State. The household registration/verification activities are currently ongoing at all Al-Karama sites, led by BMDO/UNHCR. Heavy rains in the area have halted the movement of Sudanese returnees from Kaya, Gandarasa, and Bateil refugee camps in South Sudan, with no returnees recorded during the first week of September.
