Assistance

White Nile State: MSF has installed a Cholera Treatment Unit (CTU), latrine, and drum incinerator at the Joda field hospital. No suspected cholera cases were reported during the recent Public Health visit.

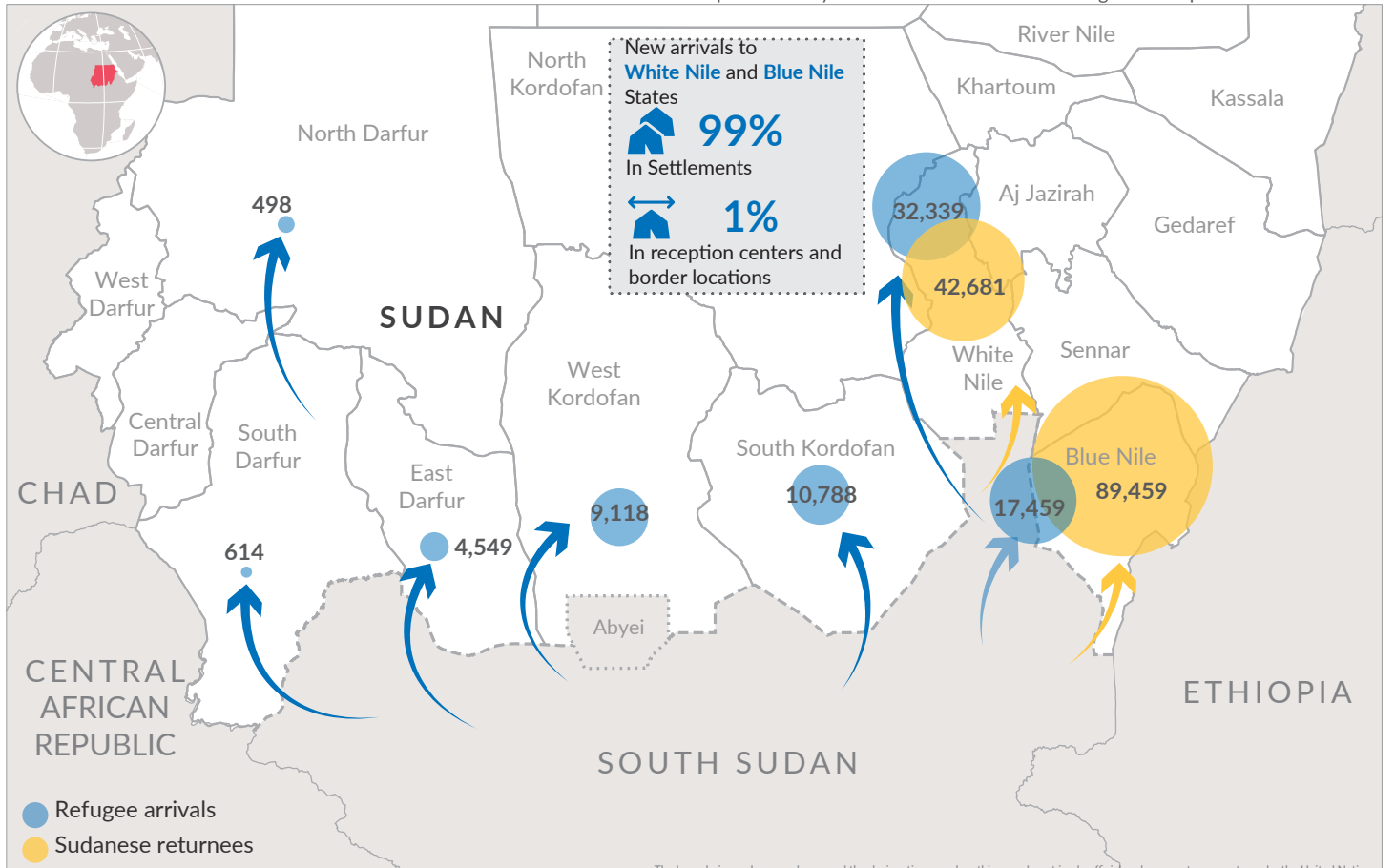
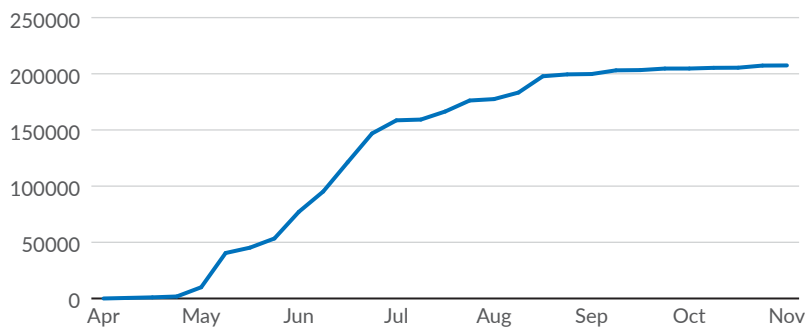
Blue Nile State: MEDAIR is verifying registered extremely vulnerable families in preparation for shelter distribution and setup, targeting 530 households. NORD and UNICEF continue to provide education activities for children in grades 1–3.

Context

Since late February, political instability and rising hostilities between armed groups in South Sudan have led to fresh clashes, particularly in Upper Nile State. This has caused a large influx of people to flee South Sudan to Sudan. More than **207,000 people** have entered Sudan during this period. This includes an estimated **75,000 South Sudanese**, most of whom (43%) are in White Nile state, followed by Blue Nile (23%), South Kordofan (14%), West Kordofan (12%), East Darfur (6%) and the arrivals in North Darfur and South Darfur by small percentages. Movements at Joda remain spontaneous and without major incidents. Although formal border monitoring activities remain suspended, some South Sudanese arrivals who crossed through unofficial border points were recorded during the reporting period.

Adding to this complexity is the arrival of an estimated **89,400 Sudanese returnees** to Blue Nile State and more than **42,600 Sudanese returnees** to White Nile State. The Ministry of Health (MoH) continues routine medical screening at Joda via a fixed service point integrated with immigration services, as part of Federal MoH's point-of-entry surveillance. Under UNHCR funding, BMDO continues registration and verification of new refugee returnee arrivals at all Al Karama sites, and is conducting household surveys.
