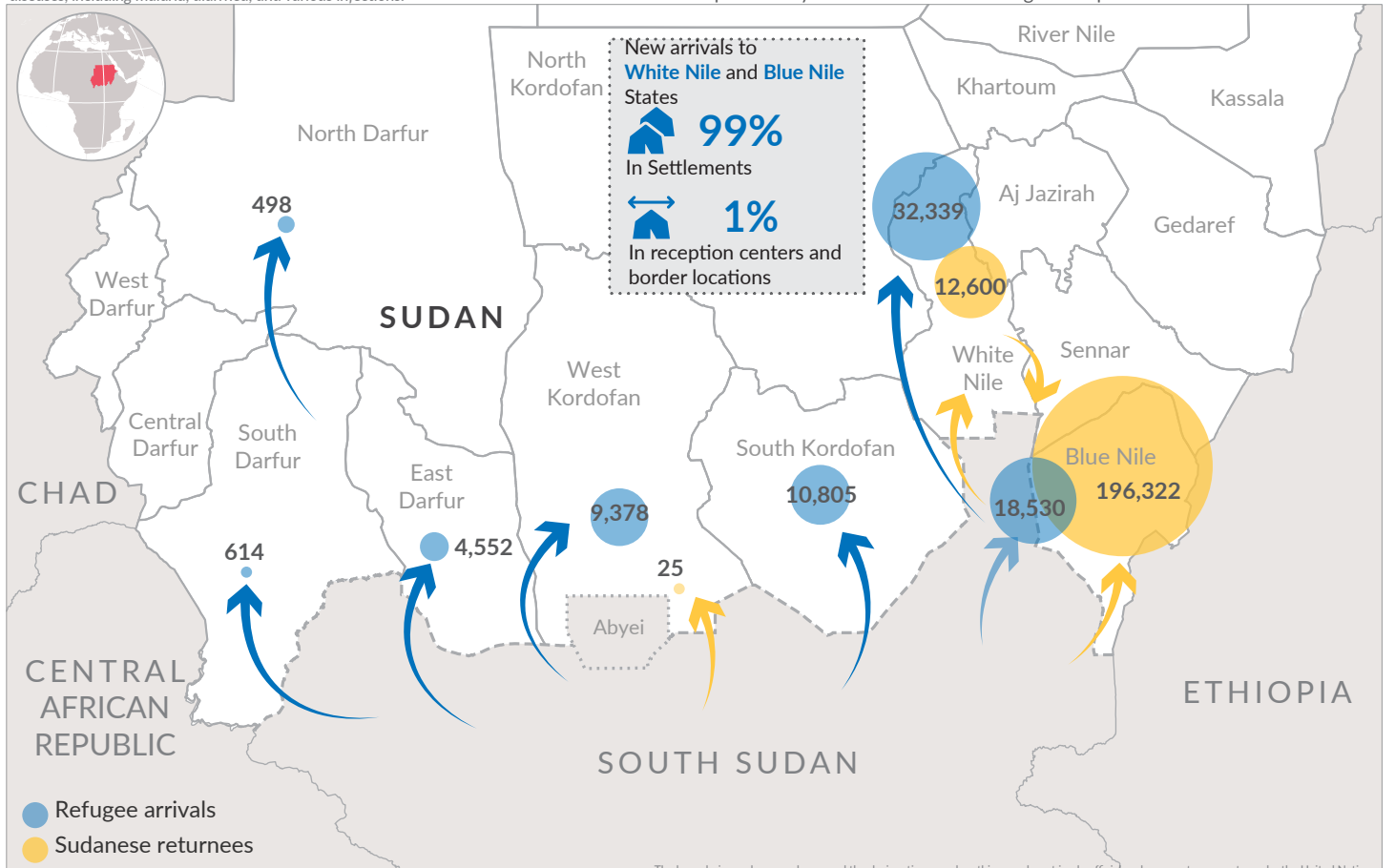
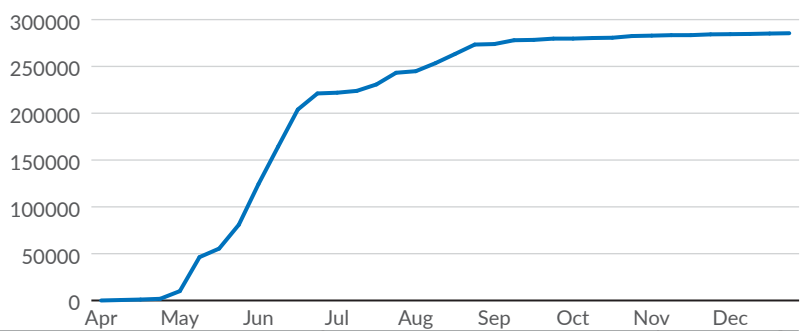
White Nile State: UNHCR and partners continue to monitor water quality to reduce the risk of cholera and other waterborne diseases.
Blue Nile State: Health services continued to operate effectively during the reporting period, supported by ongoing health awareness activities and service delivery led by MSF, UNICEF, Pan Care, WVI, and IRC. IRC trained six midwives from Al Karama Sectors 5, 6, 7, and 8, while CAFA conducted public health awareness sessions focusing on common diseases, including malaria, diarrhea, and various infections.

Context

Since late February, political instability and rising hostilities between armed groups in South Sudan have led to fresh clashes, particularly in Upper Nile State. This has caused a large influx of people to flee South Sudan to Sudan. Over **285,000 people** have entered Sudan during this period. This includes an estimated **76,700 South Sudanese**, most of whom (42%) are in White Nile state, followed by Blue Nile (24%), South Kordofan (14%), West Kordofan (12%), East Darfur (6%) and the arrivals in North Darfur and South Darfur by small percentages. Movements at Joda remain spontaneous and without major incidents.

Adding to this complexity is the arrival of an estimated **209,000 Sudanese returnees** to Blue Nile and White Nile States. Activities at the UNHCR-supported clinic (through MoH) in Joda have decreased following the suspension of registration services. MSF, in collaboration with the Ministry of Health (MoH), continues providing technical support and health promotion to manage cholera cases and response efforts at Joda and Algabaleen Hospital. Partners continue providing protection and basic services for returnees in Alkaram 5, 6, 7, and 8 gathering sites, including health and nutrition, education, WASH, and shelter.
