



The monthly *What's New?* newsletter provides a consolidated overview of the latest strategic, operational, and analytical updates related to the Lebanon Response Plan (LRP). The newsletter aims to support coordinated planning, evidence-based decision-making, and continued alignment across stakeholders and response partners under the LRP framework.

Flash Appeal – March to May 2026

The Flash Appeal was launched on Friday, 13 March 2026 to mobilize \$308.3 million covering the period March to May 2026. The announcement took place at the Serail in Beirut with the presence of the Secretary General and the Prime Minister, attended by the Government of Lebanon, UN agencies, member states, the international community, and local and international partners. The Flash Appeal aims to provide lifesaving multi-sectoral assistance and protection to up to 1,000,000 people, including affected vulnerable Lebanese, displaced Syrians, Palestine Refugees in Lebanon, Palestinian Refugees from Syria, and migrants. It is fully complementary to, and supportive of, the LRP 2026, which remains the primary planning framework in the country supporting an integrated humanitarian and stabilization response, co-led with the Government. Flash Update on Escalation of Hostilities in Lebanon #10 – As of 19 March 2026

This Flash Update reports the extent to which the escalation of hostilities across Lebanon has driven a rapid and severe deterioration in the humanitarian situation. Israeli airstrikes, shelling, and expanded ground operations continue to intensify in scale, frequency, and geographic scope. As of 19 March, the Ministry of Public Health reports at least 1,000 people killed and 2,584 injured since the escalation began. Civilians, especially women, children, and other vulnerable populations, continue to bear the brunt of the ongoing hostilities. Attacks impacting civilian infrastructure, including health facilities, continue to raise serious concerns. Repeated and expanded displacement orders, now covering significant portions of southern Lebanon, parts of Beirut, border villages, and the Bekaa, are triggering multiple, secondary, and tertiary displacement exceeding 1.2 million Internally Displaced People (IDPs) when including those outside formal sites. LRP Online Daily Escalations Response Dashboard

The Lebanon Response Plan (LRP) Online Daily Escalations Response Dashboard is now live and directly connected to the LRP Daily Response Activities reporting form on [ActivityInfo](#). It updates automatically as partners report, providing both operational and strategic visibility of the ongoing response. The dashboard allows you to: monitor reporting and coverage at national, governorate, district, and site levels; identify operational gaps across sectors and locations; view activity recency trends (0–7, 8–15, 16–30, >30 days); explore sector-specific response pages, including indicators and partner contributions; export detailed response data directly from the platform. UNHCR-Supported Voluntary Repatriation of Displaced Syrians in Lebanon – 28 February 2026

This overview was prepared by UNHCR to provide an update on the Voluntary Repatriation (VolRep) of Displaced Syrians in Lebanon. Since January 2025, 581,107 Syrian individuals known to UNHCR have been inactivated from UNHCR's database due to confirmed and presumed returns to Syria. By the end of February, a total of 59,784 Syrian individuals known to UNHCR underwent the facilitated VolRep programmes, including completing voluntariness assessments, issuance of Repatriation Forms, and provision of a return cash grant of \$100 per returning individual. In February 2026, 3,800 new expressions of interest were recorded (2% of all expressions of interest since the programme's launch). This reduction reflects seasonal and contextual factors, including winter weather conditions affecting mobility. UNHCR and IOM have facilitated 15 organized return movements of 2,990 Syrian individuals through Arida and Masnaa borders to Rural Damascus, Damascus, Homs, Hama, Idlib and Aleppo. Tensions Monitoring System: Tensions Pulse Reports

In continuation of its monitoring support, the Tensions Monitoring System (TMS), established in 2017 through a collaboration between UNDP, UNHCR, the Ministry of Social Affairs, and the Ministry of Interior and Municipalities in Lebanon, is releasing the Tensions Pulse in a daily and weekly format. The Tensions Pulse aims to equip decision makers and humanitarian actors with timely, evidence-driven insights to support informed planning and response adaptation. It features a Tensions Dashboard, Online Narratives section, Map of Geographical Hotspots, and a "What to Watch" segment outlining emerging issues to monitor closely. Multi-Sector Needs Assessment (MSNA) Gender Snapshot of Live-Out Migrants – 2025

The MSNA Gender Snapshot of Lebanese Households has been developed by UN Women and REACH. It presents an analysis of the priority needs and living conditions of live-out migrant households in Lebanon, based on MSNA 2025 data. The snapshot examines how gender, disability, age, and household composition shape economic hardship, access to services, and assistance gaps. In doing so, it translates the evidence into sector findings (Food Security and Agriculture, Health, Livelihoods, Protection, Shelter, WaSH) and Accountability to Affected Populations (AAP), in addition to priority actions to inform the 2026 Lebanon Response Plan. Advancing the Women, Peace, and Security Agenda in Lebanon: A Review of Status, Gaps and Opportunities

This report has been developed by UN Women to provide a comprehensive assessment of progress and remaining challenges in implementing the Women, Peace and Security (WPS) agenda in Lebanon. Drawing on institutional data, desk research, and consultations with 101 women leaders across the country, the report examines women's participation in political, security, and justice institutions, as well as their role in conflict prevention, protection, and recovery efforts. It also provides evidence-based analysis and policy recommendations to support government institutions, civil society, and international partners in strengthening gender-responsive peacebuilding, humanitarian response, and recovery in Lebanon. UN Women Lebanon: UN Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) Post-Intervention Assessment and Learning Report

This report presents the key results, achievements, and lessons learned from the CERF-funded humanitarian intervention implemented by UN Women Lebanon between January and July 2025 in response to the escalating hostilities and worsening socioeconomic crisis in the country. The intervention highlighted the importance of locally led, gender-responsive humanitarian action in strengthening protection, dignity and resilience for crisis-affected women and girls. Moreover, the report identifies key recommendations for future responses, including the need to strengthen vulnerability targeting, simplify eligibility procedures and integrate legal protection as a core component of emergency assistance to support more inclusive and effective humanitarian programming.
