Context

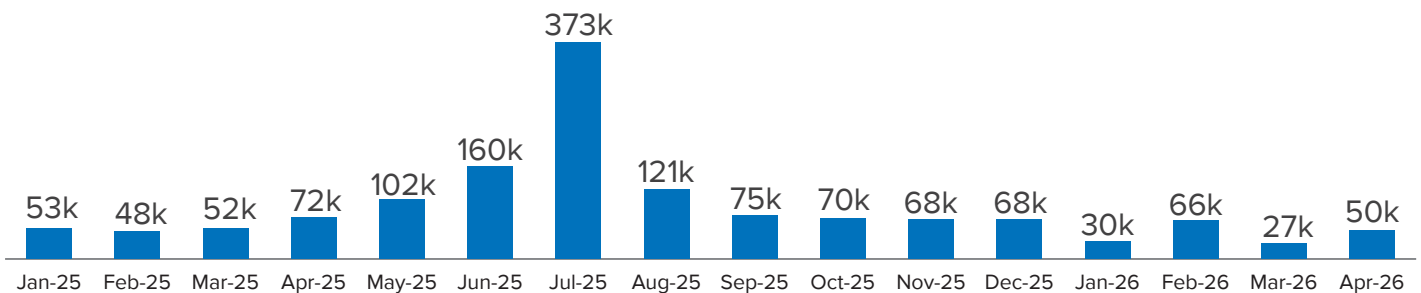
On 20 March 2025, headcount slips for an estimated 2 million Afghans in Iran expired, after which the Government introduced a regularization and return scheme, requiring slip holders to undergo assessments to determine whether they can remain.

Since then, returns have increased significantly. **In 2025, more than 1.9 million Afghans returned or were deported from Iran** – many not by choice. **In 2026, a further 249,100 Afghans have returned.** These large-scale returns are placing pressure on basic services, housing and livelihoods in Afghanistan, straining host communities and increasing the risks of instability and onward movement.

At the same time, hostilities across Asia and the Middle East since 28 February 2026 have further compounded the situation. As of 30 March, Government estimates that up to 3.2 million individuals have temporarily left their homes in search of safety. As one of the largest refugee-hosting countries in the region, Iran is facing growing pressure amid rising humanitarian needs, highlighting the need for flexible and sustained support.

Number of people deported in thousands as of 30 April 2026

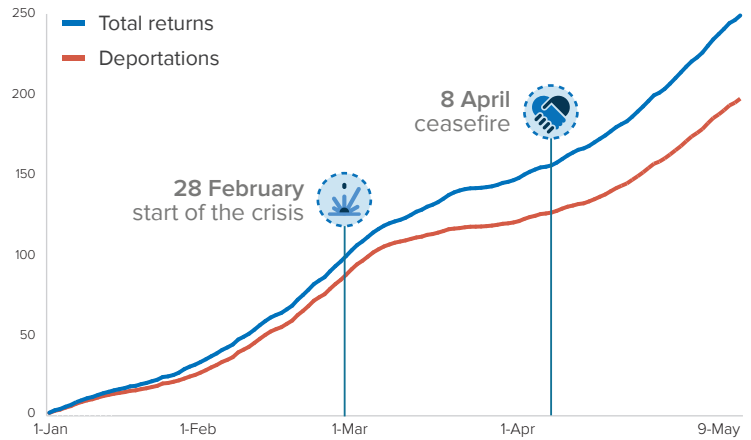


The UN in Afghanistan, including UNHCR, has adopted a harmonized approach to reporting returnee figures, using consolidated data and country-of-arrival figures. The change in UNHCR figures reflects this joint methodology, effective October 2025. Data cleaning efforts undertaken by the participating agencies may result in minor retroactive adjustments to previously reported data.

¹ Includes deportations, assisted VolRep and other returns of Afghans of all statuses such as Amayesh cardholders and the undocumented, excluding passport holders.

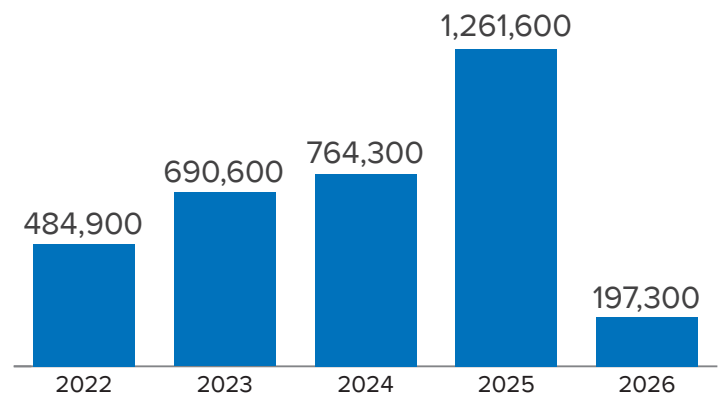


Deportations

In 2026, over 197,300 Afghans have been deported from Iran, representing 79% of the total returns. In 2025, some 1.9 million Afghans have returned, out of which 67% were deportations. Of these, some 852,800 Afghans were deported after 13 June.

In 2026, prior to the onset of the crisis, 89% of returns from Iran were deportations; this proportion has since decreased to 72%

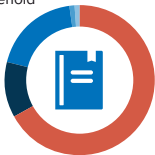

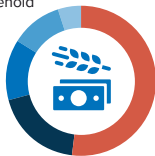

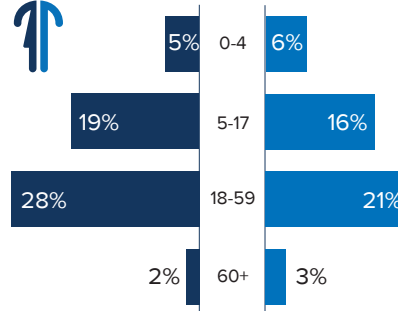

Returns assisted by UNHCR Afghanistan

UNHCR Afghanistan has scaled up its response capacity at the Islam Qala and Zaranj border crossings. First line protection and humanitarian response delivered by UNHCR teams include protection assistance, referrals to specialized services, transportation, and core relief items. Cash assistance is also provided by UNHCR's supplier HesabPay, ensuring that returnees can access emergency cash assistance immediately on arrival, and avoiding the need to travel to nearest UNHCR Encashment Centers.

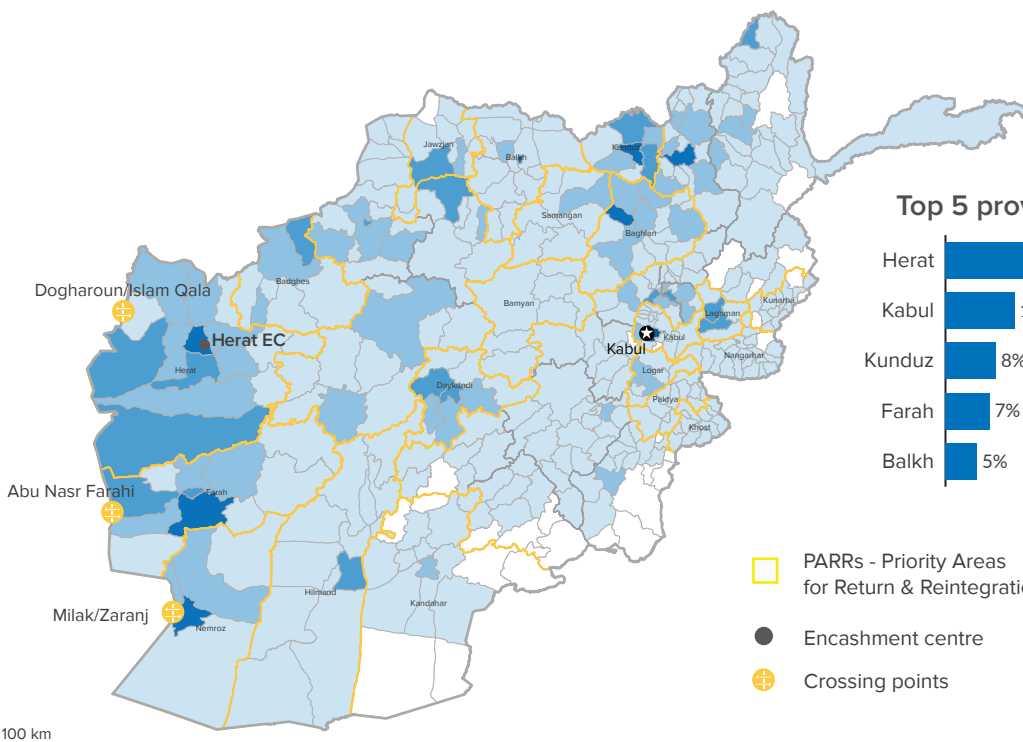
In addition to the cash assistance, UNHCR supports the returnees with emergency relief items and hot meals in Islam Qala. So far in 2026, over 4,800 returning households covering 33,850 Afghan returnees were supported with Core Relief Items (CRIs), 19,600 received hot meals and 964 with transportation.

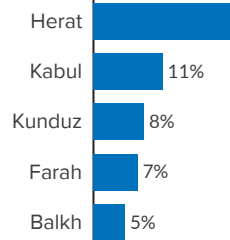
Afghanistan map - 2026 overall returns from Iran by intended district of destination



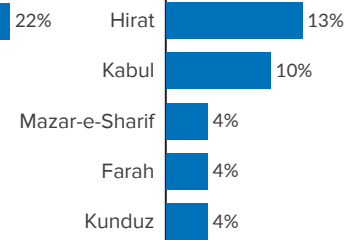

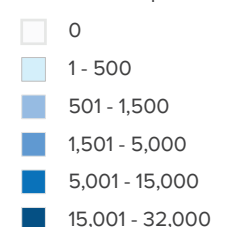

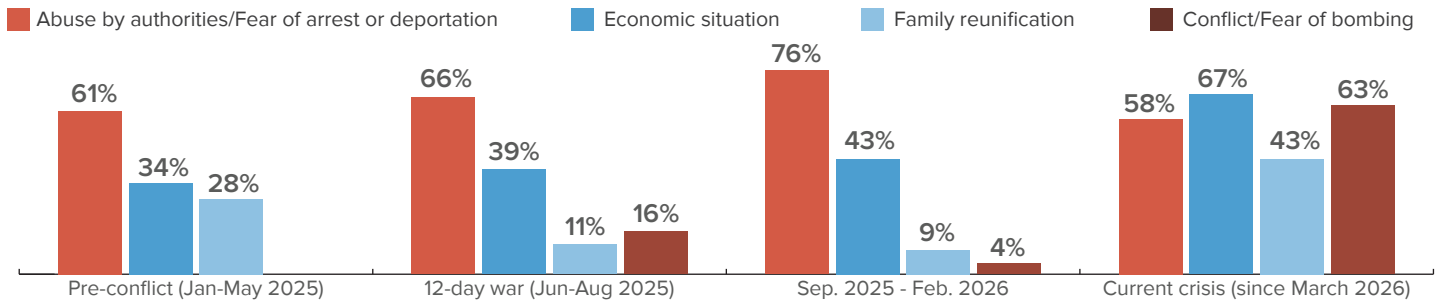

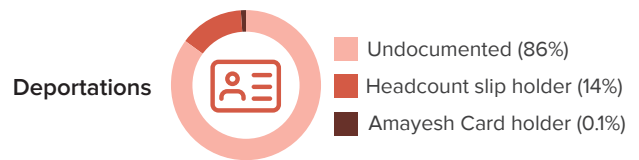
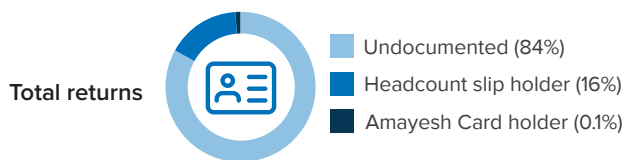

2026 returns by status (as of 9 May 2026)



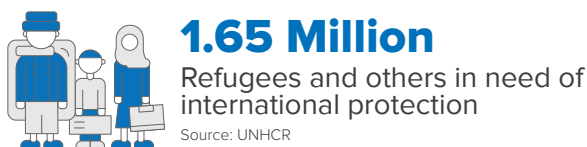
2026 Middle East Crisis

According to the Government of Iran, as of 30 March, around 3.2 million people had temporarily relocated in the country, resulting in one of the largest internal relocations in Iran in recent decades. With public order remaining largely stable since then, increasing numbers of people are likely returning to their places of habitual residence.

Despite the volatile situation, refugees continue to approach UNHCR offices, which are operating at limited capacity due to security constraints. Across its offices in Tehran, Esfahan, Mashhad, Shiraz, and Kerman, UNHCR supports access to essential health, education, and social protection services for refugees and host communities. Reception centres and helplines remain open, providing counselling, information, and assistance to those in need. UNHCR's latest [Protection Overview of Afghan Refugees in Iran](#) highlights that despite increasing insecurity and hardship, remaining in Iran is consistently identified as the preferred option.

With partner resources severely stretched, an [Inter-Agency Flash Refugee Response Plan](#) was launched on 26 March, seeking \$80 million to scale up the protection response and deliver life-saving assistance to 2.8 million people from March to May 2026. UNHCR's requirements stand at \$36.23 million.
