New Funding Opportunities

Title of the Call: Call for Grassroots CSOs: Organizational Capacity Development and Financial Support to Third Parties (FSTP)

Deadline: 16-Aug-2026 (at 23:59)

Funding Source: People in Need Moldova

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Grassroots Civil Society Organizations (CSOs)
- Geographic scope: Republic of Moldova
- Must be legally registered grassroots organizations operating within local communities
- Organizations with limited institutional capacity, strong community engagement, and demonstrated interest in integrating information resilience approaches into their work
- Important limitations: Up to 18 grassroots CSOs will be selected. Selection will consider comparative assessment criteria, thematic focus, geographical balance, and targeted groups across People in Need's overall portfolio in Moldova

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Countering disinformation, mitigating Foreign Information Manipulation and Interference (FIMI), building information resilience, and strengthening grassroots institutional capacity
- Specific areas of interest: Enhancing local community-level awareness against manipulative content; integrating information resilience practices into local CSO activities; and building internal organizational and administrative capacity through tailored coaching and financial support
- Cross-cutting aspects: Phased capacity development, community engagement, information resilience, and institutional sustainability

Funding Details:

- Program Structure:
 - Stage I: Tailored organizational capacity development support
 - Stage II (Capacity Grants): Eligibility to apply for organizational capacity development grants of up to EUR 3,750
 - Stage III (Project Grants): Eligibility to apply for information resilience project implementation grants of up to EUR 6,500
- Support Nature: Financial Support to Third Parties (FSTP) combined with technical and organizational mentoring

Title of the Call: Eurofins Foundation Grant Programme 2026

Deadline: 01-Sep-2026 (at 17:00 CET)

Funding Source: Eurofins Foundation

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Legally registered non-profit organizations (NGOs/CSOs), universities, academic/research institutions, students, and independent researchers
- Geographic scope: Global (open to legally registered entities worldwide)
- Applicants must be officially registered and have a documented operational track record of at least 24 months.
- Communities facing environmental challenges, nutrition and food security initiatives, STEM/scientific research groups, social development networks, and vulnerable populations
- Important limitations: Only one application per calendar year per organization is permitted. Grants cannot exceed 25% of the total project budget. A maximum of 10% of the requested funding can be allocated to administrative overhead costs

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Protecting the environment, enhancing health and nutrition, supporting scientific research and innovation, promoting local community development, and supporting social/educational welfare
- Specific areas of interest: Protecting biodiversity, soil, water, and air quality through conservation and sustainable management; supporting research and practical interventions in public health, safe nutrition, and food security; promoting STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) education, scientific research, and academic innovation; advancing social inclusion, access to clean water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH); and supporting local community initiatives and vulnerable groups near Eurofins' operational presence
- Cross-cutting aspects: Long-term sustainability, measurable social/environmental impact, transparency, and effective governance of allocated funds

Funding Details:

- Maximum grant size: Up to €25,000 per project
- Co-funding requirement: Requested grant cannot exceed 25% of the total project/initiative costs
- Project duration: 9 to 12 months (for implementation between Q4 2026 and Q4 2027, or as part of a multi-year effort)

Title of the Call: Protection, Inclusion and Solutions for forcibly displaced and stateless people in Moldova, 2027-2029 (CfEol/HCR/MDA/2026/001)

Deadline: 04-Sep-2026 (at 23:59 Moldova time)

Funding Source: UNHCR Moldova (United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees)

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- National and international non-governmental organizations (NGOs), civil society organizations (CSOs), and community-based organizations (CBOs), including refugee-led organizations (RLOs) and women-led organizations
- Geographic scope: Republic of Moldova (nationwide, including Chisinau, all districts, with specific attention to the left bank of the Nistru River)
- Legal entities registered (or completing registration) on the UN Partner Portal with demonstrated operational capacity and sectoral expertise in Moldova
- Civil society and community organizations delivering protection, legal assistance, child protection, gender-based violence (GBV) response, cash-based interventions, and socioeconomic inclusion services
- Important limitations: Organizational applications only (individual applications are not eligible). Concept notes must be submitted in English via the UN Partner Portal and must not exceed 5 pages. Applicants must complete and upload PSEA (Prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse) capacity and Data Protection self-assessments. Partner selection does not guarantee a fixed grant amount, as annual workplans and budgets are subject to negotiations, operational prioritization, and funding availability

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Supporting Moldova's transition from short-term emergency response to sustainable, government-led inclusion, self-reliance, and national system integration for refugees, asylum-seekers, and stateless persons
- Specific areas of interest: Border monitoring, protection counselling, and reception monitoring; fair asylum and statelessness procedures, legal aid, and post-Temporary Protection legal pathways; survivor-centred GBV response, case management, and Girl Shine life-skills curriculum; child protection case management, Best Interest Assessments, and inclusion in national education; targeted protection-sensitive cash assistance (CBI); strengthening refugee-led and community-based structures, AAP feedback mechanisms, and social cohesion; labor market

inclusion, vocational training, business development, and integration into national social protection, housing, and health systems

- Cross-cutting aspects: Age, Gender, and Diversity (AGD) mainstreaming, Accountability to Affected Populations (AAP), environmental sustainability, local capacity strengthening, and alignment with EU integration reforms

Funding Details:

- Agreement type: Multi-year partnership framework agreement for 2027–2029 implemented through annual project workplans
- Budgeting / Currency: Annual budget allocations defined in local currency (MDL) based on operational needs and availability of funds
- Project Period: Annual project cycles (1 January – 31 December) starting 01-Jan-2027, with continuation across 2027–2029 subject to Q4 performance evaluations

Title of the Call: Call for Applications: Fellowships Without Borders 2026 (Eastern Partnership Civil Society Fellows)

Deadline: 11-Sep-2026

Funding Source: European Union / Eastern Partnership Civil Society Facility (EaP CSF)

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Individual applicants (natural persons/civic activists)
- Geographic scope: Nationals of Eastern Partnership countries: Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Georgia, Moldova, and Ukraine
- Individual civil society actors, community leaders, researchers, or civic tech innovators with a demonstrated track record in community engagement or civic initiatives
- Important limitations: Minimum 18 years old. Applicants must NOT have previously received support through the Eastern Partnership Civil Society Fellowship Programme. Organizational applications are not accepted; support is provided directly to individuals. Minimum B1 level proficiency in English, plus relevant language skills for the proposed project location

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Fostering cross-border cooperation, civic leadership, democratic participation, digital innovation, and community resilience across two fellowship tracks
- Specific areas of interest: Building a resilient and sustainable economy; strengthening accountability, rule of law, and security; supporting environmental and climate resilience; promoting inclusive digital transformation; and encouraging participatory decision-making
- Cross-cutting aspects: Social inclusion, international networking, knowledge transfer back to local communities, and democratic resilience

Funding Details:

- Grant size: Approximately €5,000 per selected fellow
- Eligible project costs: Direct project implementation costs, travel and accommodation, communication/visibility, mentoring services, consular fees, bank transfer charges, and administrative overheads (capped at 10% of the total budget)
- Restrictions: Funds cannot be used for direct salaries/fees for the fellow, payments to a workplace supervisor, or purchase of general equipment
- In-kind / Technical support: Tailored expert coaching, structured learning modules, and access to the regional EaP Civil Society alumni network

Title of the Call: Request for Applications: zivik Funding Programme

Deadline: 01-Oct-2026

Funding Source: ifa (Institut für Auslandsbeziehungen / Institute for Foreign Cultural Relations), funded by the German Federal Foreign Office

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Legally registered non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and local civil society organizations (CSOs)
- Geographic scope: Priority target regions include Sub-Saharan Africa, Southwest Asia and North Africa (SWANA), Southeastern Europe, Ukraine, Belarus, South Caucasus, and Latin America and the Caribbean (via the Unidas Women's Network). Projects outside these target regions are considered only under exceptional circumstances
- Must be state-registered organizations with a proven track record and demonstrated experience in peacebuilding, conflict prevention, or stabilization
- Youth-led peacebuilders, community leaders, civil society actors, and local stakeholders operating in crisis and conflict-affected environments
- Important limitations: Projects must strictly fall within eligible thematic priorities. The maximum grant request must not exceed €400,000

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Preventing violent conflict, managing crises, advancing stabilization, building sustainable peace, strengthening democratic systems, and bolstering youth participation in fragile contexts
- Specific areas of interest: Implementing crisis prevention and conflict transformation activities; reinforcing local peacebuilding capabilities and civil society collaboration; promoting democracy-building and institutional trust; supporting UN Security Council Resolution 2250 on Youth, Peace and Security across its 5 core pillars (Participation, Protection, Prevention, Partnerships, and Disengagement & Reintegration)
- Cross-cutting aspects: Local ownership and community-driven engagement, gender integration, youth empowerment, measurable impact evaluation, and long-term project sustainability beyond the grant period

Funding Details:

- Maximum grant size: Up to €400,000 per project
- Non-financial / In-kind support: Comprehensive technical assistance, project implementation guidance, networking with global peacebuilding partners, knowledge-sharing platforms, and impact assessment support

Title of the Call: The Pollination Project: Our Daily Grant Program

Deadline: 31-Dec-2026 (Rolling review throughout the year)

Funding Source: The Pollination Project (TPP) Foundation

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Individual volunteers, grassroots organizations, informal community groups, and small charitable organizations
- Geographic scope: Global (open to changemakers and community projects worldwide)
- Applicants must be able to receive an international wire transfer
- Early-stage changemakers, volunteer-led groups, and grassroots community organizers launching or expanding charitable social impact projects
- Important limitations: The organizational annual budget must not exceed USD 50,000, and total project budgets must be under USD 10,000. Organizations with paid staff (except for occasional professional services like accounting or web design) or those that have previously received a Pollination Project Daily Grant are ineligible. Does not fund personal financial support, academic research, political campaigns, or projects involving animal agriculture/farming

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Early-stage seed funding to empower grassroots leaders and volunteer-led initiatives addressing social, environmental, educational, and humanitarian needs within local communities
- Specific areas of interest: Launching new local community programs or expanding existing grassroots initiatives; strengthening community safety, social justice, and environmental sustainability; delivering direct charitable services; and promoting volunteerism and civic engagement to solve immediate local challenges
- Cross-cutting aspects: Volunteer leadership, measurable community benefit, feasibility, sustainability, and grassroots social change

Funding Details:

- Grant value: Up to USD 500 per project (seed microgrant)
- Scope/Scale: 365 microgrants awarded annually (1 grant given every day)
- Funding nature: Direct seed grant funding to cover immediate initial project deployment expenses

New Funding Opportunities for Academia

Title of the Call: ERC Advanced Grant Programme 2026 (ERC-2026-AdG)

Deadline: 27-Aug-2026 (at 17:00 Brussels time / Opening date: May 28, 2026)

Funding Source: European Research Council (ERC), under the Horizon Europe Programme (Pillar I: Excellent Science)

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Individual Principal Investigators (PIs) hosting a research team, in host institutions established in an EU Member State or Associated Country
- Geographic scope: Global researchers of any nationality or age, provided the research project is hosted by an eligible institution in an EU Member State or Associated Country
- Established research leaders with a recognized, outstanding track record of research achievements over the past 10 years
- Internationally recognized active senior scientific leaders across all domains of research
- Important limitations: The host institution must be a legal entity established in an EU Member State or Associated Country. The PI must spend at least 50% of their total working time in an EU Member State or Associated Country and commit at least 30% of their total working time to the ERC-funded project. Individual applications only (no multi-partner organizational consortia required, though single investigator teams are expected)

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Investigator-driven, bottom-up frontier research that addresses ambitious, high-risk, and high-gain scientific challenges without predetermined thematic priorities
- Specific areas of interest: Open to all scientific fields (Humanities and Social Sciences, Physical Sciences and Engineering, and Life Sciences); supporting innovative methodologies, exploratory scientific questions, and high-impact theoretical or experimental discoveries
- Cross-cutting aspects: Scientific excellence as the sole evaluation criterion, interdisciplinary research approaches, scientific independence, and long-term global impact

Funding Details:

- Standard maximum grant size: Up to €2,500,000 for a period of up to 5 years (pro-rata for shorter projects), awarded as a lump-sum contribution
- Additional funding options:
 - Up to an additional €1,000,000 for major research costs (e.g., purchasing major equipment, access to large-scale research facilities, or major experimental/fieldwork costs)
 - Up to an additional €2,000,000 for eligible Principal Investigators relocating from a non-

associated third country to an EU Member State or Associated Country

- Reimbursement scale: 100% of eligible direct costs plus a flat rate contribution of 25% towards indirect costs

Title of the Call: Wiko Early Career Fellowship 2027/28

Deadline: 01-Sep-2026: Primary deadline for Humanities and Social Sciences; 01-Nov-2026: Parallel stream deadline for Life Sciences, Natural Sciences, Medicine, and Psychology

Funding Source: Wissenschaftskolleg zu Berlin (Institute for Advanced Study Berlin), Germany

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Individual early-career researchers and scholars
- Geographic scope: Global (open to applicants of all nationalities worldwide)
- Applicants must hold a completed doctorate (PhD, MD, or equivalent) awarded no more than 5 years prior to the start of the fellowship
- Early-career researchers in the humanities, social sciences, life sciences, natural sciences, medicine, and psychology
- Important limitations: Individual applications only (no organizational proposals). Exceptions to the 5-year post-PhD rule may be considered upon request for documented career interruptions (e.g., care responsibilities, parental leave, or illness). Full-time residential presence at the Wissenschaftskolleg in Berlin during the fellowship period is required

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Investigator-driven, bottom-up research providing scholars dedicated, protected research time away from teaching and administrative duties, within an interdisciplinary academic community
- Specific areas of interest: Open to all disciplines across the humanities, social sciences, life sciences, natural sciences, medicine, and psychology; no prescribed thematic restrictions (fellows determine their own independent research projects)
- Cross-cutting aspects: Interdisciplinary exchange, intellectual independence, cross-border academic networking, and knowledge sharing

Funding Details:

- Fellowship duration:
 - Humanities & Social Sciences: 10-month residential fellowship (September 2027 to June 2028)
 - Life/Natural Sciences & Medicine: 3 to 5 months duration during the academic year
- Financial support: Monthly stipend (commensurate with former salary/academic standing), coverage of inbound and outbound travel expenses, and relocation assistance for fellows and their families
- In-kind / Institutional support: On-campus studio accommodation, private office space, full library/document delivery services, IT infrastructure, daily meals, visa assistance, and active

integration into the institute's interdisciplinary colloquia

Title of the Call: Request for Applications: ERC Plus Grant Programme (ERC-2026-PLUS)

Deadline: 02-Sep-2026

Funding Source: European Research Council (ERC), under the Horizon Europe Programme (via the "Choose Europe for Science" initiative)

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Individual Principal Investigators (PIs) of any nationality or career stage, hosted by an eligible university or research organization
- Geographic scope: Global researchers intending to carry out their project at a host institution established in an EU Member State or Associated Country
- Individual application basis. Applicants can be at any career stage (from early-career talent to senior research leaders) with an exceptional scientific track record and outstanding intellectual leadership
- Outstanding individual researchers undertaking high-risk, high-gain frontier research
- Important limitations: The project must be hosted by a legal entity in an EU Member State or Associated Country. The PI must commit at least 30% of their total working time to the project and spend at least 50% of their total working time in the EU or an Associated Country. Current ERC grantees may only apply after completing their active grant, and researchers can only hold one ERC Plus grant across their career. Individual applicants cannot hold multiple active ERC applications simultaneously

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Supporting ambitious, visionary, and high-risk frontier research that goes beyond the scale, duration, and scope of standard ERC grants, with the potential to redefine scientific fields or establish entirely new research disciplines
- Specific areas of interest: Groundbreaking research proposals across all scientific disciplines (Humanities and Social Sciences, Physical Sciences and Engineering, and Life Sciences) that address fundamental scientific challenges, require substantial scale, and deliver transformative scientific breakthroughs
- Cross-cutting aspects: Interdisciplinary integration, scientific independence, transformative potential, long-term societal impact, and global scientific excellence

Funding Details:

- Maximum grant value: Up to €7,000,000 per project (awarded as a single lump-sum contribution based on estimated actual project costs)
- Call budget / Scope: Total call budget of €210,000,000 for 2026, funding approximately 30 projects annually
- Project duration: 4 to 7 years (48 to 84 months)

Title of the Call: SVRI Data to Evidence Grant 2027: Knowledge for Action to End Violence Against Women and Child Sexual Violence

Deadline: 17-Sep-2026 (at 23:59 South African Standard Time)

Funding Source: Sexual Violence Research Initiative (SVRI)

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Researchers based at non-governmental organizations (NGOs), universities, research institutions, and non-profit organizations
- Geographic scope: Low- and Middle-Income Countries (LMICs)
- Applicants must be based in an LMIC and have institutional support to conduct secondary data analysis
- Locally led research teams, early-career and established researchers in LMICs, and practitioners addressing violence against women (VAW) and child sexual violence (CSV)
- Important limitations: The project must involve secondary analysis of existing, ethically sourced datasets. Applicants must demonstrate that they hold all required permissions and ethical approvals to access and use the proposed dataset prior to application. Proposals focused exclusively on primary data collection are ineligible

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Secondary data analysis to generate policy-relevant, actionable evidence on violence against women (VAW), child sexual violence (CSV), and broader gender-based violence (GBV) in LMICs
- Specific areas of interest: Unlocking insights from existing datasets (e.g., population surveys, evaluations, cohort studies); identifying risk and protective factors; evaluating intervention impacts; understanding patterns and drivers of violence; and translating data findings into policy, program design, and advocacy
- Cross-cutting aspects: Ethical data stewardship, local research leadership, evidence-based decision-making, capacity strengthening, and effective research-to-practice translation

Funding Details:

- Grant size: USD 30,000 to USD 50,000 per project
- Total funding envelope: USD 400,000 (funding approximately 8 to 13 awards)
- Project duration: Up to 12 months (starting around March 2027)
- In-kind / Technical support: Tailored technical assistance, expert mentoring on secondary data analysis, and international networking/dissemination support through SVRI networks

Title of the Call: FRIAS Early Career Fellowship Programme 2027/28

Deadline: 18-Sep-2026 (at 13:00 CE(S)T)

Funding Source: Freiburg Institute for Advanced Studies (FRIAS) at the University of Freiburg, Germany

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Individual postdoctoral researchers and early-career scholars
- Geographic scope: Global (open to researchers of any nationality based in Germany or abroad)
- Applicants must hold a completed doctoral degree with a maximum of eight years of post-doctoral experience by the application deadline. They must also have completed at least six months of research or study experience at academic institutions in a country different from the country of their first academic degree
- Early-career scholars across all academic disciplines that can be supported at the University of Freiburg
- Important limitations: Individual applications only (no organizational applications). Applicants must have published at least four peer-reviewed publications since 1 January 2022 (out of a maximum total publication list of eight). Experimental scientists must secure and attach a letter of support identifying a host laboratory at the University of Freiburg, along with an experiment sketch and timetable. Full-time physical presence at FRIAS in Freiburg is mandatory throughout the fellowship period (fieldwork conducted outside Freiburg cannot be funded during the fellowship)

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Providing protected research time, institutional freedom, interdisciplinary dialogue, and international networking for outstanding early-career scholars
- Specific areas of interest: Independent research projects across the humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, engineering, and medicine that align with the research strengths and facilities of the University of Freiburg; exploratory or open preliminary research projects; and cross-disciplinary methodological collaboration
- Cross-cutting aspects: Interdisciplinary communication, cross-faculty intellectual exchange, international scholarly networking, and active integration into FRIAS academic life

Funding Details:

- Fellowship duration: 4 to 10 months (between 1 September 2027 and 31 August 2028)
- Financial support: Selected fellows receive a full-time employment contract with the University of Freiburg (or alternative compensation depending on individual employment status) offering approximately €5,300 per month before tax and social security deductions
- In-kind / Additional support: Dedicated research cost contribution, coverage of inbound and outbound travel expenses, office space, and full access to University of Freiburg libraries and research infrastructure

Title of the Call: FRIAS Senior Fellowship Programme 2027/28

Deadline: 18-Sep-2026 (at 13:00 CE(S)T)

Funding Source: Freiburg Institute for Advanced Studies (FRIAS) at the University of Freiburg, Germany

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Individual senior researchers, established scholars, and professors
- Geographic scope: Global (open to researchers of any nationality based in Germany or abroad)
- Applicants must hold a completed doctoral degree with a minimum of eight years of post-doctoral research experience by the application deadline. They must also have completed at least six months of research or study experience at academic institutions in a country different from the country of their first academic degree
- Senior scholars and leading researchers across all academic disciplines that can be supported at the University of Freiburg
- Important limitations: Individual applications only (organizational applications are not accepted). Applicants must submit a publication list with a maximum of 15 total publications, of which at least 10 peer-reviewed publications must have been published after 1 January 2020. Experimental scientists must secure and submit a letter of support identifying a host laboratory at the University of Freiburg, along with an experiment sketch and timetable. Full-time physical presence at FRIAS in Freiburg is mandatory throughout the fellowship period (fieldwork conducted outside Freiburg cannot be funded during the fellowship)

Thematic Focus:

- Priority themes: Providing protected research time, institutional freedom, interdisciplinary integration, and cross-border academic collaboration for internationally recognized senior researchers
- Specific areas of interest: Independent, advanced research projects across the humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, engineering, and medicine that align with the research strengths and facilities of the University of Freiburg; launching groundbreaking research agendas; and mentoring and collaborating with early-career researchers and interdisciplinary faculty networks
- Cross-cutting aspects: Interdisciplinary communication, cross-faculty intellectual exchange, global scholarly networking, and active participation in FRIAS academic life

Funding Details:

- Fellowship duration: 3 to 8 months (between 1 September 2027 and 31 August 2028)
- Financial support: Selected fellows receive a full-time employment contract with the University of Freiburg (or alternative financial compensation/replacement cost coverage depending on individual employment status at their home institution)
- In-kind / Additional support: Dedicated research cost contribution, coverage of inbound and outbound travel expenses, dedicated office space, and full access to University of Freiburg libraries, laboratories, and research infrastructure

Eligibility of Entities to Apply:

- Individual early-career researchers (doctoral candidates and postdoctoral scholars)
- Geographic scope: Global (open to candidates of all nationalities worldwide)

- Groups do not need to be registered non-governmental organizations (NGOs) to qualify for funding.
