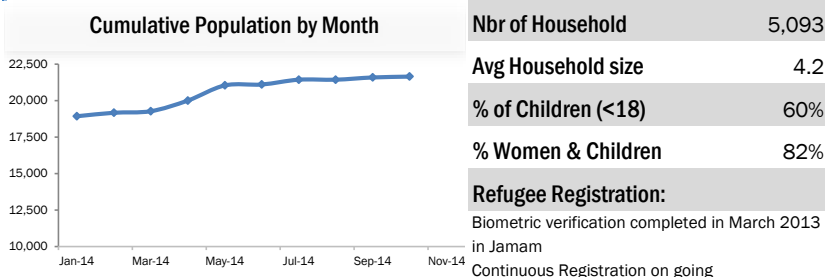

Highlights

- Following MSF-H's notification on the closure of the 24 hours emergency service in Kaya and its planned phase out from Maban by June 2015 a number of meetings have been held with health partners, IMC and Medair to facilitate the smooth handover of outreach and surveillance activities in Kaya, Gendrasa and Batil camps.
- Out of 120 pre-fabricated shelters in Kaya, 94 Phase One Shelters were distributed to the Magaja community (who had relocated from Batil to Kaya earlier this year). Procurement of sticks for the up grading of 2,000 Shelter Phase One is ongoing with major challenges due to heavy rains resulting in flooding. Continuous community mobilization is required to urge refugee leaders and their communities to mud the shelters completed with roof and zinc.
- Water supply coverage in Kaya increased from 17.2 l/p/p/d to 21l/p/p/d.
- Although seasonal malaria cases are on the increase in all camps, the health profile of the refugee population and surrounding host communities remains stable despite the overall security environment negatively impacting the scope of

Kaya Monthly Updates

Protection

- UNHCR and DRC launched a 30 member Kaya Protection Network to pro-actively conduct conflict mapping, conflict management and conflict resolution between refugees and the host community.
- Preparations for the commencement of the Age, Gender, and Diversity Mainstreaming exercise across Maban's camps were concluded with training for multi-functional teams on 31 October 2014. The exercise took place on 3-4 November 2014.
- Protection/CS together with ACTED concluded sanitary materials distribution to 4,922 females of reproductive age from 10 - 50 years old in Kaya camp.

- Nineteen (19) out of twenty newly recruited male teachers arrived from Ajoung Thok on 27th & 28th October 2014. Five (5) have been deployed at the Gentil Secondary School while fifteen (15) are being deployed at primary schools in Gendressa, Batil and Kaya camps.
- UNHCR and education partners have compiled lists of candidates from the previous and current academic year for consideration in sitting Primary 8 school exams which were interrupted in Maban County and Upper Nile State following the December 2013 conflict.
- In service teacher training courses resumed with the commencement of the third school term on 13 October 2014
- Education partner, the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) began the construction of over 40 latrines in schools in Kaya, Gendrassa and Batil.

- For the first time ever, water supply coverage in Kaya refugee camp increased to 21l/p/p/d, an impressive improvement from last week's 17.2 l/p/d.
- Efforts are underway to expedite the improvement of latrine coverage in Kaya which is slightly below standard at 22 persons per latrine instead of at most, 20 persons per latrine

- Preparations for UNHCR's Standardized Extended Nutrition Survey (SENS) to which WFP and UNICEF committed to gets underway. The SENS is the comprehensive Nutrition Survey designed for refugee camps/contest which includes not only anthropometric/health data but also anaemia testing (women and children), Infant and Young Child Feeding Practices, Mosquito net coverage, WASH indicators and Food Security indicators. The current assessment will exclude Food Security module.
- The nutrition profile remained stable. IMC conducted the joint camp monthly MUAC screening. The levels of Global Acute Malnutrition (GAM) and Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) rates are within UNHCR standards (GAM =5.2 %, SAM = 0.6%) which is an improvement as compared with September. No significant variation in new admissions was noted. Two sessions of 15-Day General Food Distribution (GFD) were held with 30 day voucher distribution at the first session.
- MSF-H have confirmed their commitment to extend their operation in Gentil hospital till the end of 2015. This will enable IMC and Medair to focus on the Primary Health Care services and strengthen the outreach and surveillance activities in Kaya, Gendrassa and Batil camps.
- IMC has finalized recruitment of refugee health staff and ambulance driver to start 24 hours emergency health services and night Ambulance at the main clinic, however, the health posts remained closed due to shortage of manpower.
- Seasonal malaria and acute respiratory tract infections remained the main health problems in all camps, however, the overall health profile of the refugee population and surrounding host communities remain stable despite the prevailing insecurity that continues to negatively impact the scope of health care services in
- Selected drugs and medical supplies were distributed to UNHCR partners (IMC, Medair and SP) in Maban based on need.
