UNHCR OPERATIONAL UPDATE FOR SOUTH SUDAN

18 September – 1 October 2015

HIGHLIGHTS

- The reported total number of South Sudanese in Sudan is now 193,049, and all identified arrivals during the reporting period (768) have settled in White Nile State. There were a total of 3,583 arrivals in September, against 2,979 in August.
- On 21 September, the White Nile State Governor met with all UN organizations and NGOs working to respond to the needs of South Sudanese refugees. He was briefed on achievements to date and remaining priorities. The purpose of the meeting was to coordinate individual efforts, identify gaps and avoid duplication of the operations.
- A regional coordination meeting was held on 29 September in Nairobi with the donor, UN and NGO partners to discuss 2016 planning assumptions and scenarios that will inform the preparation of the 2016 Regional Refugee Response Plan. It was acknowledged that Sudan will most likely continue to receive high number of refugees next year.

UPDATE ON ACHIEVEMENTS

Operational Context

The overall situation in White Nile state remained stable throughout the reporting period. 768 South Sudan arrivals (173 households) were received through the Joda reception centre. The new arrivals for the reporting period settled in Um Sangor (404), Jouri (113), El Redis II (99), El Redis I (89) and Al Alagaya (63).

A constant influx is reportedly to have arrived in Elleri, South Kordofan state. 5,200 individuals have arrived for the month of September. Response is being discussed between partners; however UNHCR has yet to verify the number of arrivals, due to poor road conditions. ES-NFI and food assistance are ready to be transported by UNHCR and WFP respectively, possibly next week, when the roads are accessible

Achievements and Needs Assessment

Education

Achievements and Impact

- During the two week reporting period, 16 social mobilisers from the arrival sites were trained through a presentation by Adventist Development and Relief Agency(ADRA)'s and Ministry of Education (MoE) on the importance of education for their communities and how to help to encourage all families to provide education for their children in both host and arrival communities.
- The arrival students in White Nile State who attend the morning/evening schools and volunteer teachers are currently being registered. The data obtained will serve as baseline for future learning assessments.



Health

Achievements and Impact

- 10,885 curative consultations were held throughout the seven clinics in the camps during the reporting period. Acute respiratory infection (ARI) remains the primary cause of attendance at 25 per cent of all consultations (slightly increased), followed by malaria 24 per cent (a sharp increase from last reporting period's 16 per cent) and diarrheal diseases at 12 per cent (a slight decrease).
- There has been a seasonal surge of malaria case in White Nile State due to the rains, exacerbated with overcrowding in the sites and current WASH gaps. UNHCR and UNICEF are planning a mass distribution of mosquito nets within the next two weeks. Focused-malaria interventions are currently under discussion with the Ministry of Health (MoH).
- A mass immunization campaign against measles has been conducted by the Expanded Programme Immunization (EPI) department, MoH. in El Redis I & II during the reporting period. A total of 2,541 children under 15 were vaccinated. No other disease under surveillance has been reported (jaundice, suspected meningitis, suspected acute watery diarrhea, or suspected acute flaccid paralysis).



Food Security and Nutrition

Achievements and Impact

- 6,360 children were screened during the past two week for acute malnutrition across all seven sites in White Nile, of which 53 (0.8%) were identified with Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) and 460 (7.2%) with Moderate Acute Malnutrition (MAM).
- Through WFP interventions in White Nile State, a total of 0.508 Metric Tons (MT) of Plumpy'Sup was distributed to 184 new arrivals (117 children under five(U5) and 67 pregnant and lactating women(PLW)) as transit rations.

No cases of SAM or MAM were reported for the new arrivals in Joda reception area. WFP distributed a total of 64.12 MT to 9,717 beneficiaries (8,557 children U5 and 1,160 PLW) to all seven sites in White Nile State as an Emergency Blanket Supplementary Feeding Programme (eBSFP).



Water and Sanitation

Achievements and Impact

- In Kharasana, the construction of 81 latrines has been completed by ASSIST and Save the Children International (SCI) while an additional 155 are scheduled to be constructed. The partners also conducted two cleaning campaigns during the reporting period.


