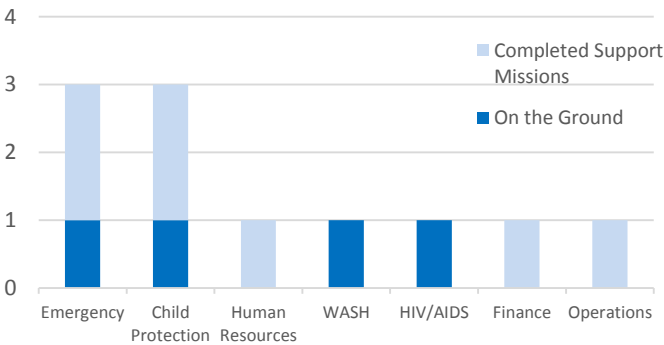
RESOURCE MOBILISATION: \$1.1 MILLION UTILISED, REMAINING GAP OF \$11 MILLION

HUMAN RESOURCES: SCALED UP STAFF ON THE GROUND WITH 11 SUPPORT MISSIONS

- 12 UNICEF staff in Bertoua, scaled up from 3 staff in March 2012, for Nutrition, WASH, Education, Protection, HIV/AIDS and Admin
- 3 support missions currently on the ground for Emergency, Child Protection, WASH, and HIV/AIDS (31 May 2014)
- 8 completed support missions in 2014 for Emergency, Child Protection, HR, Finance and Change Management, HIV (31 May 2014)



SUPPLIES

- A system of monitoring to facilitate RUTF delivery at site level is now in place and partners did not report breakdown over the past 2 weeks. Since January, 2014, 2,809 boxes of ready to use therapeutic food (RUTF), 167 boxes of F75 and 135 of F100 therapeutic milk and medicines for InpF have been distributed to cover the needs of 2,700 SAM children
- A new warehouse of health delegation for nutrition inputs has been identified in Bertoua
- 10,500 WASH kits have been pre-positioned and 4,530 have been distributed to families
- 4,200 hygiene kits have been pre-positioned and 700 have been distributed to families
- 260,000 doses of Measles vaccines procured for 9 months to 5 years old immunization
- UNICEF is ensuring that essential medicines for common childhood illnesses and women are available in sufficient quantity in affected areas; UNICEF made available additional essential medicines to cover approx. 2,000 children, and distributed 4,000 bed nets to partners for distribution
- HIV/PMTCT supplies were sent in the affected regions.
- The Douala Supply hub is nearly empty, impeding timely provision of supplies in Cameroon. Following the fire in the warehouse last year, stocks are being replenished and are in the 2nd phase of orders

UNICEF Response to date

Nutrition:

- Intensification and quality insurance of Integrated Management of Acute Malnutrition (IMAM) through training of 335 health staff and 73 NGO staff (IMC, MSF, AHA) as per national protocol and technical supervision in the CAN and CNTI located in East and Adamawa.
- The coordination of Nutrition sectorial group is effective at the regional level and met all the stakeholders weekly in Bertoua.
- A multisectoral survey (nutrition, health, WASH) was organized by CDC and the Ministry of Health, with the support of UNICEF in Gado refugee site and will end on 2nd June.
- From 2-6 June, a joint mission UNICEF/WFP/UNHCR from regional offices and headquarters is planned and will support teams for reinforce coordination and joint communication.
- Potential new Nutrition actors are assessing the situation in the East and Adamawa regions: the NGO ALIMA is in the country. In addition, ACF (RRM partner in CAR) is planning to visit East and Adamawa affected localities in early June.

Health and HIV/AIDS:

- 75 health staff have been trained to ensure the integration of HIV counselling, testing, care and support as part of SAM treatment protocol in affected health facilities. Radio debate/sensitization programs on HIV awareness are on-going.
- A regional coordination framework in charge of monitoring the activities in health facilities has been established.

WASH:

- The construction of 2 additional boreholes is being finalized. In addition, UNICEF settled 5 bladders in 2 sites which will ensure water access for 3,833 refugees.
- The coordination of the WASH sector is effective at both the national and regional level. However, the reduced number of partners in-country (private companies and NGOs) able to quickly produce an important number of quality WASH infrastructures (drillings in particular) has resulted in delays in the implementation of UNICEF WASH response.

Protection:

- 23 Child Protection actors have been trained on Child Protection in Emergencies and psychosocial support to map CPIE actors and activities for refugees and improve quality of services delivery for an approximate 13,590 children.
- 91 community members, leaders and parents have been involved in sensitization and awareness meetings on the implementation of Child Friendly Spaces.
- There is a focus on the follow up of on-going Protection activities in the camps to meet the urgent needs of affected CAR refugee children and scale up the response.

Education:

- Ensuring a quality access to education for up to 22,000 children will include the organization of awareness and back to school campaigns, the distribution of teaching/learning material, the training (psycho-social support detection, life skills, promotion of peace through education, child-centered methods and large-group management) of teachers, inspectors, management committees and the organization of education activities for preschool, primary school-age children and adolescents.
