

Syria Crisis Bi-Weekly Humanitarian Situation Report
Jordan, Lebanon, Iraq and Turkey
Date: 8 November 2012
Reporting Period: 25 October – 8 November

HIGHLIGHTS

- **JORDAN:** UNHCR, UNICEF & partners identify and register 797 separated/unaccompanied children in Za'atri camp, host communities and transit sites. UNICEF and Mercy Corps have finished drilling the first of two boreholes in Za'atari camp.
- **IRAQ:** Al-Qaim's border has been closed again, preventing refugees from entering Iraq.
- **LEBANON:** To date, 7,543 children have been enrolled in schools as part of the Back to School Initiative.
- **TURKEY:** Camp authorities have begun building shelters from fire-proof materials.
- **REFUGEES:** In surrounding countries, the number of registered refugees increased by 10 per cent from 274,712 to 303,241; some 157,685 are children and around 57,616 are children under five. This does not include the many tens of thousands of children not registered as refugees. Most of the increase in registered refugees came in Lebanon and Turkey. In Iraq, Jordan and Lebanon, around 89,500 people have been provided with access to safe water; around 19,500 children have benefitted from psychosocial support; and 28,500 have benefitted from access to education.

JORDAN

Highlights

- A multi-agency assessment team visited the new refugee camp site in Zarqa, which is expected to open by mid-December and will initially host 5,500 refugees.
- Jordan Hashemite Charity Organization (JHCO), with support from Government of Bahrain, is completing a new school complex in Za'atari this week, to serve some 4,200 students.
- UNICEF and Ministry of Education (MoE) have started induction training for 42 MoE teachers serving children from King Abdullah Park and Cyber City.
- Since March 2011, UNHCR, UNICEF and partners have identified and registered 797 separated and unaccompanied children in Za'atri camp, host communities and transit sites through an inter-agency system.
- UNICEF and Mercy Corps have finished drilling the first of two boreholes in Za'atari. The location of the second borehole is pending a decision on the final camp capacity.

Some 61,356 Syrians are now registered with UNHCR in Jordan and a further 31,094 are awaiting registration and thus receiving assistance. More than half of all Syrian refugees in Jordan are children under 18. Bailing out continues on an exceptional basis (estimated bailed out from Za'atari is some 6,000 people). The Government of Jordan estimates that over 220,000 Syrians are in the country. According to UNHCR, some 48,000 Syrian refugees have been transported to Za'atari refugee camp since July. UNHCR is completing an in-depth verification exercise to confirm the current population of Za'atari camp.

Inter-Agency Collaboration and Partnerships:

UNICEF continues to lead daily WASH coordination meetings and bi-weekly WASH sector meetings (next meeting: 15 November), as well as weekly child protection sub-group meetings at Za'atari (Thursdays), bi-weekly child protection (next meeting: 6 November), gender-based violence coordination meetings (Tuesdays), and bi-monthly education coordination meetings (next meeting: 12 November). UNICEF also participates in twice-weekly area coordination meetings at Za'atari (Tuesdays and Thursdays), daily health coordination meetings, and bi-weekly taskforce meetings (Thursdays).

Programme response:

WASH: The Government of Jordan invited UN agencies to visit the new camp in Zarqa now under construction. A multi-agency assessment team visited the site to advise on set-up of the site. The camp is expected to open by mid-December. It will initially host some 5,500 refugees, with a potential capacity of 30,000. Water will be delivered to the camp from a nearby pipeline yielding 15 cubic metres per hour. UNICEF is at the same time considering drilling a borehole in Zarqa to complement needs. Meanwhile, UNICEF and Mercy Corps have finished drilling the first of two boreholes in Za'atari. In turn, Cyber City camp will be extended to include an area for single men on a privately-owned lot within the Cyber City Industrial estate. The new site will accommodate some 2,000 to 2,500 refugees in tents. UNICEF will expand WASH services accordingly. On 1 November, a WASH Sector Working Group Coordination Meeting took place in Mafrq. UNICEF and partners have agreed to hire a consultant to work on the water supply system design in Za'atari. UNICEF has worked with the Ministry of Water and Irrigation to build capacity, training 10 engineers to assist in water technology interventions. At the same time, the Royal Scientific Society (RSS) will perform quality assurance on winterization efforts. UNICEF is preparing to install the winterized WASH units, which will include facilities for people with disabilities. UNICEF operates 450 fixed showers and 450 latrines in Za'atari camp, in addition to some 87 mobile latrines. With UNICEF support, ACTED also continues to deliver full WASH coverage in Cyber City and in King Abdullah sites.

UNICEF also continues to deliver 1,100,000 to 1,300,000 liters of water per day to Za'atari camp. UNICEF is relaying the building and design of new pipelines for drinking water and sewerage to private sector consultants. UNICEF and ACTED remove some 400 cubic metres of solid waste from the camp each day. The volume of solid waste collected has dropped due to the shift from hot meals to dry rations. This has resulted in a reduction in the number of Cash-for-Work cleaners hired for camp cleaning (down to 200 cleaners and 25 supervisors). ACTED and THW have improved residual chlorine monitoring. UNICEF and THW evacuate some 300 to 400 cubic metres of waste water per day.

Child Protection: This week, UNICEF partner Save the Children (SC) focused on quality assurance of services provided in CFSs. This includes a revision of monitoring tools and additional training for field coordinators, including refresher trainings on psychosocial interventions and child resiliency trainings. Child protection partners have identified and registered 797 separated and unaccompanied children (344 unaccompanied and 453 separated) in Za'atari, host communities and transit sites. UNICEF is deploying a specialist to work with partners on establishing a holistic system to provide care to separated and unaccompanied children.

In host communities, SC Jordan has initiated its child protection project, "Safe You, Safe Me". This project works with Syrian children to enhance their understanding of their rights and how they can protect themselves from violence, abuse and exploitation. The project will run in 14 Community-Based Organisations (CBOs) throughout Jordan. SC Jordan has already identified the 14 CBOs and will begin training CBO staff on session methodology on 17 November. The project will reach over 1,000 children and also raise awareness among parents on how to better protect their children. Meanwhile, UNICEF Jordan C4D has printed awareness-raising materials for parents in camps on issues related to child protection and how to deal with crises.

Education: Almost 3,300 students have registered for school since UNICEF and the Ministry of Education (MoE) opened the temporary learning spaces in Za'atari camp on 1 October, of which 54 per cent are girls. JHCO, with support from the Government of Bahrain, is completing the construction of a new school complex in Za'atari this week, which will accommodate around 4,200 students in double-shifts. This week, UNICEF and MoE started induction training for 42 MoE teachers (50 per cent female) providing education services for children bussed from King Abdullah Park and Cyber City to attend double-shifted public schools.

In host communities, UNICEF, in partnership with East Amman Charity, Questscope and Yarmouk Baqa'a Club, has provided informal and remedial education activities to over 1,150 school-aged children and adolescents. In addition, 6,359 Syrian parents and children have been engaged in awareness raising activities and referred to appropriate education opportunities by SC Jordan and UNICEF. Some 17,000 Syrians are currently registered in Jordanian schools, out of which 2,038 are on waiting lists. UNICEF and SC International are carrying out small scale renovations in 50 public schools across Jordan. To date, seven schools have been renovated.

Health: UNICEF continues to provide vaccines to new arrivals in Za'atari camp through the measles, polio and Vitamin A supplementation campaign. To date, 6,382 children between the ages of six months and 15 years have received vaccinations under the campaign. The next phase of the campaign will be the vaccination of children in the host communities of Ramtha, Irbid and Mafraq, which is expected to begin on 18 November. UNICEF is procuring an additional 350,000 polio doses, 130,000 measles doses and 250,000 syringes to support the vaccination campaign.

Nutrition: With UNICEF as lead, UN agencies and the Jordanian government are continuing a nutrition assessment for Syrian children under 5 across Jordan. Data collection in host communities was completed on 24 October. Data collection in Za'atari began on 4 November and will last until 13 November. UNICEF in cooperation with SC Jordan is still working on an agreement to support the implementation of an infant and young child feeding programme in Za'atari, to start in mid-November.

LEBANON

Highlights

A total of 81,605 refugees are currently registered with UNHCR and an additional 30,249 Syrians have been in contact to be registered, bringing the total number to 112,939. However, many refugees do not register and the real number of refugees in the country is believed to be the double. Some 7,500 Palestinians from Syria have also recently arrived in Lebanon, according to UNRWA. Palestinian refugees from Syria are being hosted in the already crowded Palestinian refugee camps in Lebanon. Recently it has been reported that despite the situation in Syria, some refugees are choosing to return, painting a very complex and fluid displacement picture. As winter approaches, there is growing concern for the living conditions of refugees in North Lebanon and the Bekaa Valley. Although there has for a long time been a fear of spill-over from the violence in Syria into Lebanon, these fears reached a new level in the last weeks after the blast in Beirut on 19 October.

Programme response:

WASH: Water distribution is continuing in the Bekaa Valley through a water voucher system with 7,712 vouchers distributed for December. Last week, 112 one-thousand-litre water tanks were distributed in Baalbeck, Saadnayel, Taalabaya and Fayda. UNICEF and partners have so far distributed 707 baby hygiene kits, 734 hygiene kits, 1,780 jerry cans, 934 buckets and 218,000 aqua tabs to Syrian refugees. UNICEF partner Action Contre la Faim (ACF) has continued a Hygiene Promotion Campaign in communities and schools. Some 1,220 hygiene kits for adults and 1,700 for babies are being distributed through UNICEF partners this week to Palestinian refugees from Syria. This is the second round of supplies distribution from UNICEF to Palestinian refugees. Water sector meetings continue meanwhile to be held fortnightly.

Child Protection: Six agencies continue to offer CFS in 26 locations. UNICEF has initiated planning for an inter-agency child protection needs assessment, building on existing assessments. A sub-working group for the CFS was convened by UNICEF to discuss plans for scaling up operations and different service delivery options, improving service delivery through case management and targeted use of psychologists, and improving the measuring of the impact of services. On the day-to-day implementation and work with communities, agencies operating UNICEF-supported Child Friendly Spaces (CFS) reported that children and parents are initially anxious about participating in the organized activities, though this changes over time once trust is built. Agencies report that parents are more receptive if there are Syrian adults involved in the activities, especially when children have to travel to attend the CFS. Further work was done in the past week with three agencies to provide services to female survivors of SGBV, as well as to build the capacity of service providers to administer psychological first aid to refugees affected by violence and displacement.

Education: UNICEF is continuing distribution of education supplies; so far 7,562 children have received supplies in 23 schools and 155 School-in-a-Box kits have benefited 6,189 children in 19 schools in the border villages Wadi Khaled and Akkar, in Northern Lebanon. This number is in addition to a previous distribution of education supplies reaching 1,373 children in four schools in Hermel. The Back to School package currently being distributed includes school bags, school uniforms, educational materials and compulsory parents' committee fees. UNICEF has so far supported 2,610 unregistered refugee children in the Bekaa and the North. A partnership has been launched with Caritas Lebanon Migrant Center to also facilitate the enrolment of 11,000 more Syrian children in Lebanese schools, and aims to provide educational supplies to a further 20,000 children.

Health: UNICEF is working with the Ministry of Public Health (MoPH) to plan vaccination activities. UNICEF has delivered 150,000 doses of polio vaccines and 200,000 doses of measles vaccine to the MoPH, with other supplies in the pipeline, including vaccination materials and cold chain systems. To prepare for winter, UNICEF will provide emergency health kits to two Public Health Centres (PHCs) in Akkar, Wadi Khaled. The kits will meet the needs of a population of 6,000 people for three months.

Nutrition: UNICEF has met with WFP and UNHCR to follow up on the nutrition survey findings and to discuss the establishment of a nutritional surveillance system to trace early signs of deterioration in the nutritional status of children in the most affected areas. A common strategy will be put in place to screen and refer identified malnourished children for appropriate care and follow up. UNICEF is also developing a partnership with International Organization Christian Charity (IOCC) for the implementation of workshop on infant and young child feeding. The purpose of the workshop is to sensitise organisations involved in the emergency response on the International Code of Marketing of Breast-milk Substitutes (BMS) and to stop improper distribution.

IRAQ

Highlights

- Al-Qaim's border has been closed again, preventing refugees from entering Iraq.
- 5,170 people in Al-Qaim camps were vaccinated against seasonal influenza.
- An intermediate school has opened in Al-Qaim, with 185 children registered so far.

Some 48,390 Syrian refugees have been registered in Iraq, including 38,686 in the Kurdistan Region and 8,418 in Anbar governorate, western Iraq. On 20 October the Al-Qaim border was again closed leaving hundreds of Syrians waiting to cross into Iraq.

Inter-Agency Collaboration and Partnerships:

A technical coordination meeting was held between UNICEF and UNHCR to plan the design of Camp 3 in Al-Ebaidy, western Iraq. The Protection Working Group held its first meeting with implementing partners in western Iraq. Networks will be mobilized to assess humanitarian needs of the Syrian population on the other side of the border.

Programme response:

WASH: Northern Iraq: Families in Domiz camp continue to have access to water and sewage services, however waste management services are poor. Water networks are functioning in phase 1 and 2, while water trucking continues in transit areas. The UNICEF-supported tent-to-tent hygiene promotion campaign continued in Domiz, with 3,807 people reached this week, bringing the total to 10,802 (3,367 women, 2,824 men, 2,220 girls and 2,391 boys). Six water and sanitation facility units will be completed in the coming days. Sewage work in phase 5 has begun, with 130 soak pits dug and lined with concrete blocks. Water and sanitation units in the school are functioning.

Western Iraq: High turbidity in the Euphrates River affected the quality and quantity of potable water supplied to the camp from the water treatment plant. The first set of 14 solar boilers was delivered to Camp 1 as part of preparations for winter. An eight-day training to enhance the capacity of 20 operators from different water projects within Al-Qaim has been planned. Hygiene mobilizers (50 per cent female) are being recruited from Camp 2 to carry out daily hygiene promotion activities similar to those in Camp 1. A topographic survey for the land allocated in Al-Ebaidy for Camp 3 was conducted; design and layout of the camp will be developed according to the findings.

Child Protection: Northern Iraq: Refugees in Domiz have been affected by rain and dropping temperatures. A lack of proper clothing for children has prevented families from sending them to school or to the CFSs. Child labour is increasingly of concern with some families relying on young children to beg or sell items in the camp or in nearby cities to earn an income. Activities continue at the CFSs, and discussions with Save the Children to identify a more appropriate location in the camp for the spaces are on-going.

Western Iraq: The CFS in Camp 1 is operating with regular recreational activities led by Syrian volunteers and a UNICEF Child Protection facilitator. Syrian volunteers are being mobilized in Camp 2 to assist with the implementation of child protection interventions, and allocation of space for CFSs is being discussed. Meanwhile, UNICEF and UNHCR raised the issue of birth certificates for newborns with health authorities. The Government of Iraq will follow up at both the local and national level. Special needs for pregnant women and young children were raised with UNHCR and the Department of Health, and child protection partners plan to distribute clothes and newborn kits.

Education: Northern Iraq: With UNICEF's financial and technical support, implementing partner Harikar, conducted an enrolment drive at Domiz camp from 23 to 25 October. Preliminary results indicate there are 2,020 children of school age (6-17 years), including 792 who are out of school. Harikar will follow up with the out of school children to support them to enroll. Furthermore, 731 children are of pre-school age (4-5 years). The need for pre-schooling will be discussed with education authorities. Some 1,170 students are attending the first school in two shifts. UNHCR has started construction of a second school, and a private company is constructing a third.

Western Iraq: The limited area of Camp 2 remains a challenge. An area of 800 cubic metres has been allocated for a school, but UNICEF is still working with camp management to lay the concrete layer foundation for the school tents. On 5 November, children in Camp 1 moved on from the tented school to the new prefabricated classrooms (10 classrooms and one room for administration). The intermediate school opened on 6 November, using three prefabricated classrooms from the primary school; 185 children were immediately registered. The school will run in two shifts.

Health: Northern Iraq: With support from UNICEF, health promotion teams made tent-to-tent visits to promote messages on personal hygiene, food handling and safe water. Sixteen pregnant and lactating women attended the antenatal care unit, 24 children under five with diarrhea were treated, and mothers continued to receive messages on proper feeding practices, including breastfeeding.

Western Iraq: In the Al-Qaim camps, 5,170 people were vaccinated against seasonal influenza. A joint UNICEF/Ministry of Health (MoH) mission to Al-Qaim assessed the health situation and service delivery. Regular health services are available to refugees in Camp 1, with 117 children vaccinated

under the routine immunization program; health services will be expanded to Camp 2. A new PHC center will be established by the MoH in Camp 2.

Nutrition: Northern Iraq: Sixteen children under five (12 male, four female) were screened at the growth monitoring unit with no new malnutrition cases detected. Some 251 under-five children have been screened over the past month. The malnourished children detected in previous weeks continue to attend the growth monitoring unit to receive supplementary feeding while their mothers receive advice on proper feeding practices.

Western Iraq: UNICEF is planning to train doctors and health workers to manage severe malnutrition cases.

TURKEY

Highlights

- No official figures have been released by the government since 2 November, however according to the Regional Representative of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the number of Syrian refugees in Turkey is now 111,890.

No official figures have been released by the Government since 2 November, however according to the Regional Representative of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the number of Syrian refugees in Turkey is now 111,890, including 730 who are receiving treatment in hospitals. Since the beginning of the crisis 157,000 Syrians are reported to have arrived in Turkey, with more than 45,000 returning to Syria voluntarily. Local authorities report that new arrivals are continuing. On 2 November a fire in Hatay Yayladağı camp caused the death of a five year old child. The fire was reportedly caused by electricity. Camp authorities have begun building shelters from fire-proof materials.

Syria Regional Support Hub

Supply/Logistics: Sales Orders amounting to US\$ 2,189,452 have been raised by the Syria, Lebanon and Jordan Country Offices from 18 October to 5 November. Some 130,000 doses of polio vaccine arrived in Jordan this week. UNICEF Syria has received 1.5 million doses of measles vaccines which will be used for the vaccination campaign planned for 26 November to 6 December.

Human Resources: Regional Human Resources have assisted Country Offices and the Regional Office in placing 46 staff in support of the Syria crisis.

Communication and Media: The UNICEF Twitter platform is now tweeting three or four times a day. The most popular tweets remain the ones on Za'atari camp and the Syria crisis. A bi-weekly regional newsletter on the Syria crisis has had two editions so far, focusing on education and winterisation. The Regional Office has also been working with the Jordan Country Office to support media and donor visits.

Funding: Against the total requirement of US\$120.36 million for the Syria Humanitarian Response Plan (SHARP) and the Regional Response Plan (RRP), UNICEF has received US\$41.03 million with a funding gap of US\$79.33 million. In the past week, thematic funding amounting to US\$ 284,352 has been received from the National Committees of Germany, Belgium as well as through International Online Donations. Such flexible thematic humanitarian funding however still only amounts to about 10 per cent of the contributions received to date for this crisis.
