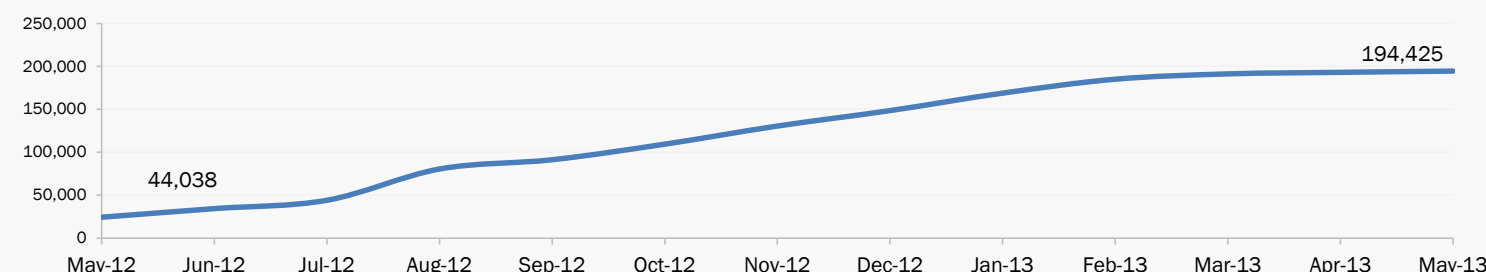

Highlights

• On 19 May 2013, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey announced that the total number of Syrians registered and accommodated in 17 camps in 8 provinces has increased to 194,715 including 336 Syrians receiving medical treatment in hospitals.

• AFAD reported that between 17-19 May, 1,699 new arrival Syrians were registered and accommodated in the camps while 1758 Syrians voluntarily returned to Syria. This brought the weekly total of Syrians accepted into camps as 3,013 people and departures from camps to 2,188 people.

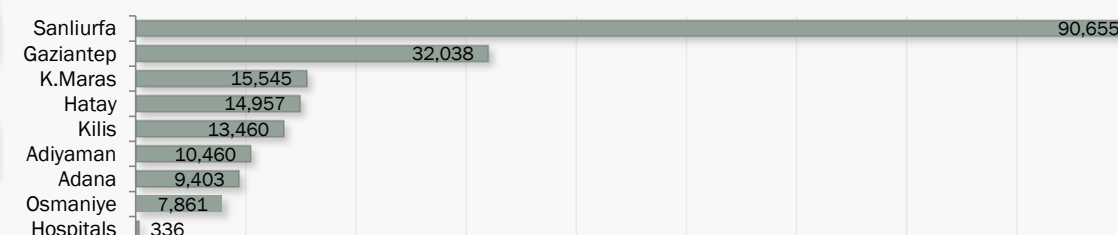
• As highlighted in the media, the Turkish Red Crescent (TRC) reported that there was a strong storm damaging some 200 tents in Ceylanpinar camp. TRC and camp managers are assessing the damage and the tents that are no longer inhabitable will be replaced by tents donated by UNHCR. It was also reported by TRC Teams in Ceylanpinar that the shipment of UNHCR donated tents will continue this week and when all transportation is completed, priority will be given to the new camp in Viranshehir which is expected to be completed by the end of June.

• Further vocational training activities are being developed to generate income for the refugees. It has been reported that in the sewing workshop in Adiyaman camp 1,500 t-shirts are being prepared for private brands and 2,000 dresses are being tailored to be sold in Arab countries. The camp management is supervising this activity and the income will be distributed among the refugees by the school principle, on the basis of the items produced.

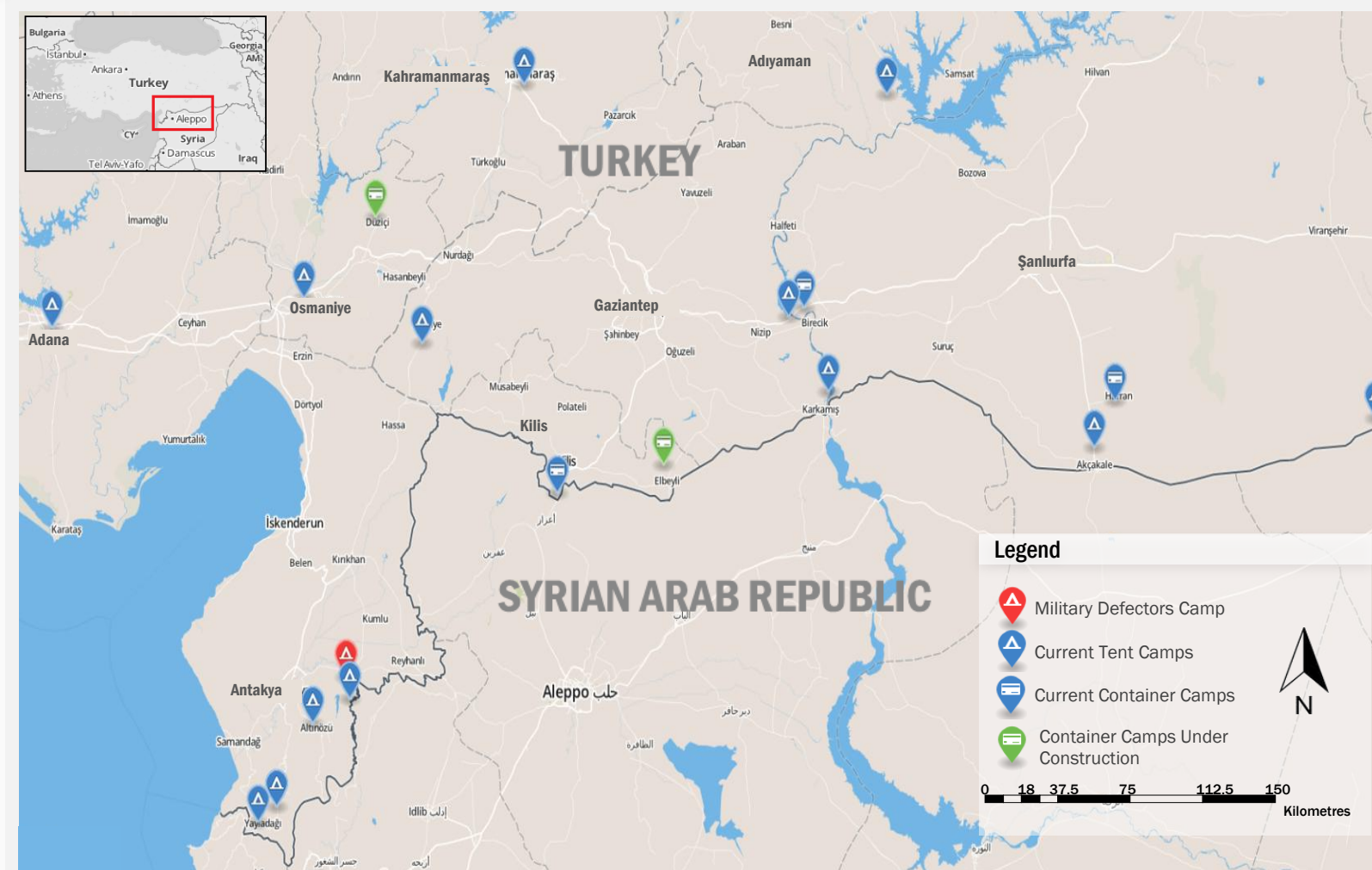
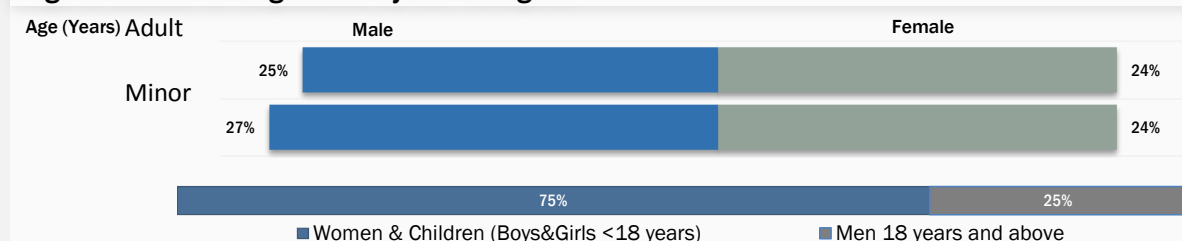
• After the incident in Reyhanli killing more than 50 people, which lead to reactions against the Syrians living in the town, NGOs reported that some Syrians have spontaneously re-located from Reyhanli to other parts of Turkey, in addition to the organized transport of Syrians to the camps in other provinces. There are also media and NGOs reporting that some more Syrians have opted to return to Syria; UNHCR is unable to verify this information.

• On the 15th of May, WFP and the Turkish Red Crescent (TRC) distributed the E- Food Card Programme cards to Osmaniye-Cevdetiye (7,700), and on the 17th of May to Kahramanmaraş (15,600) camps. Hot meals were phased out a few days after the distribution to ensure a smooth transition. The programme now provides assistance to just under 100,000 Syrians in Turkey and is expected to start in Adiyaman (10,100) in the first week of June depending on when the camp has all the facilities needed for the programme. This will increase the total number of beneficiaries to around 110,000 once the camps are full, representing around 60 per cent of the total population of Syrians living in camps in Turkey.
