

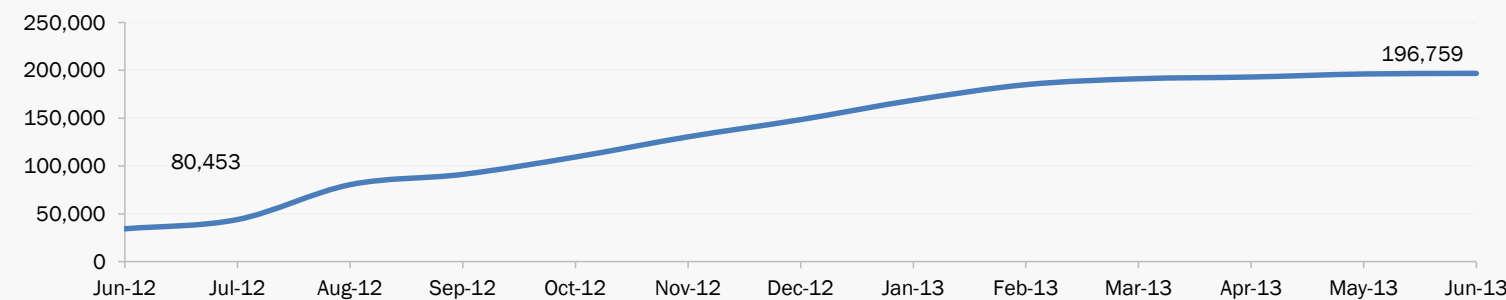

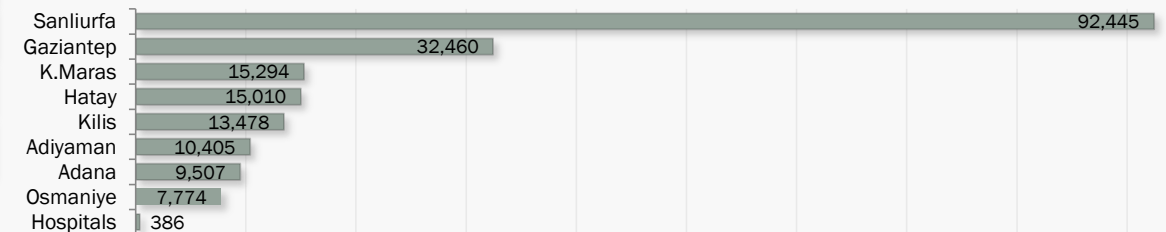

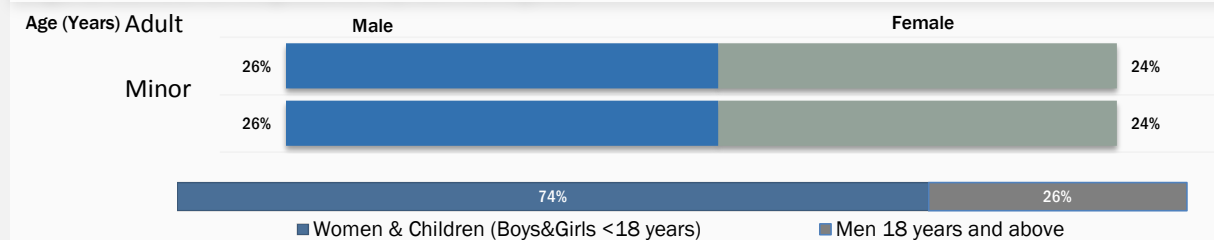

The number of Syrians living in the Urban Area are not included

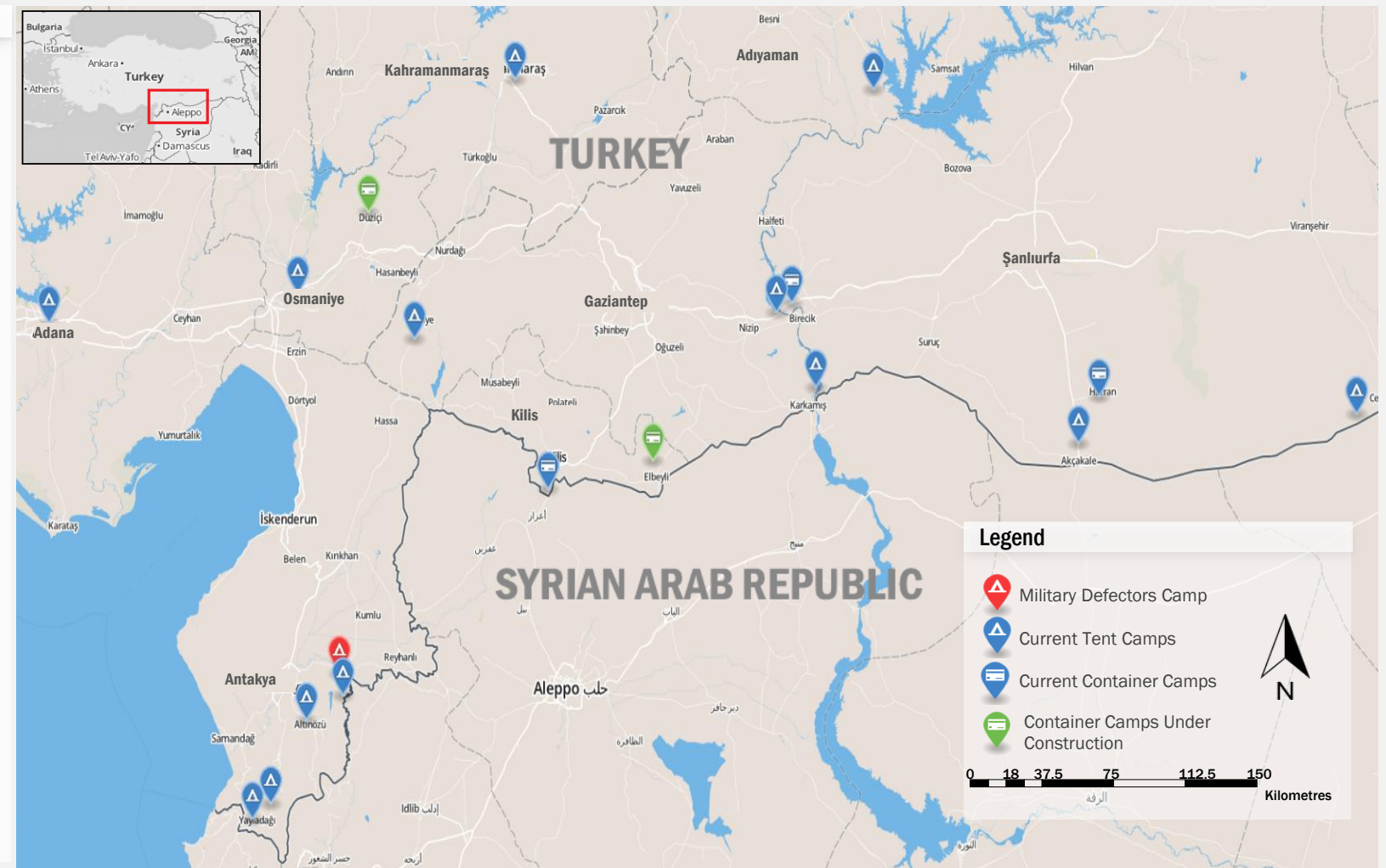


Age & Gender of Registered Syrian Refugees



Highlights

- On 04 June 2013, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey announced that the total number of Syrians registered and accommodated in 17 camps in 8 provinces has increased to 196,759, including 386 Syrians receiving medical treatment in hospitals. AFAD reported that during the last 24hrs of 03-04 June 2013, 566 new arrival Syrians were registered and accommodated in the camps and 319 Syrians voluntarily returned to Syria.
- During the visit to Kilis, UNHCR Team observed that the number of Syrians in the makeshift camp in the park has increased. This was confirmed by NGOs who are present in the area and that reported there are more than 3,500 people in the park who hope to be placed in the new container site in Kilis Elbeyli. While sanitation continues to be a concern, food and health care are readily available. UNHCR was informed that the Turkish authorities have identified some 1,000 people in Bab-Al Salame IDP camp across Oncupinar border crossing to be relocated in the new Kilis camp. Reportedly, some IDPs were already transferred from Bab-Al Salame on Monday, 3 June to Turkey. The selection of IDPs was based on a vulnerability assessment and point-system criteria.
- The UNHCR Field Team visited the camps in Nizip as well as the Coordination Center to meet with some urban refugees. During the meetings with some of the Syrians living in urban in Gaziantep, Syrians reported their difficult living conditions. Reportedly one of the main challenges is to find housing, which has become more difficult since the Reyhanli bombing incident. Landlords are reportedly asking for deposits, insurance and high rental fees, and in some cases, refuse to accept Syrians as tenants.
- The Coordination Center managed by Governorate and AFAD in Gaziantep registered about more than 36,000 Syrians and some more than 27,000 Syrians were already given appointments to be registered. The Governorate estimates that the number of most vulnerable Syrians may be 10-20% of the total of approximately 60,000 Syrians who are living in Gaziantep Province.
