

Highlights

- On 09 January 2014, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 22 camps located in 10 provinces was 210,919 including 100 Syrians receiving medical treatment in hospitals. AFAD reported that during the 24hrs of 08-09 Jan 2014, a total of 466 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 108 Syrians have voluntarily returned to Syria.
- UNHCR Field Team in Sanliurfa was informed by local officials of AFAD that during the last few days, over 5,000 Syrians with and/or without passports have crossed the border to Turkey via Akcakale border gate. Reportedly on 09 Jan 2014, about 1,500 new arrivals were admitted from the border. Local officials also stated that because of the intensified fights in Telabiyad more people are expected to come.
- UNHCR is in close contact with the local officials in Sanliurfa and following up the influx. Reportedly while many of these new arrivals are accommodated with the local host community and with their relatives in Akcakale and Sanliurfa province, provincial AFAD officials with the local governorate also preparing alternative accommodation options including the sports halls, communal facilities, guesthouses etc. The officials also informed that they have established tents at the border to do the basic registration (pre-registration) of the new arrivals.
- In order to be able to respond to the basic needs of the new arrivals, provincial authorities met with the local NGOs and the UNHCR Field Team to identify the resources available for the needed NFIs such as blankets, mattresses, heaters, winter clothes, hygiene packages, as well as food packages ready to eat for up to 30,000 persons in order to respond the influx. UNHCR will continue to be in close contact with local officials to monitor the trend of new arrivals and follow up with the authorities on their needs.
- Although it was reported in the media that Karkamis border gate was closed, local government officials confirmed UNHCR Field Team that the border is open. In Kilis local officials also informed that the border is open and there is no influx to Oncupinar border gate however during the recent days, there is a significant increase in the number of arrivals through official and unofficial crossings. Reportedly there no influx towards both Jarablus/Karkamis and Bab Al Salame/Oncupinar border gates.
