1	New additions to	the Terms of Reference				
	 Shombi Sharp presented the main innovations in the generic ToRs proposed by UNHCR for all the working group: the first one is to have an NGO representative to serve as a co-lead of the working group, the second one to create a core group, including NGO representatives, focusing on more in-depth review and guidance of the WG: strategy, oversight, monitoring and evaluation. A short discussion followed on whether other ministries should be involved. While there is a possibility to integrate the Ministry of Labour in the livelihood working group or Ministry of Interior for the social cohesion working group, there will be no structural change of the overall response. A suggestion was to appoint NGOs to participate in the core group on a rotational basis. Mercy Corps, SFCG, and World Vision expressed interest to participate in the core group – possibility to have each of the interested ones on a quarterly basis. A local NGO should also be represented in the core group. The representative of the LHIF considered that there is a need to identify all together as a Social Cohesion Group on the NGO representative and its role and responsibility. Action point: follow-up with the 3 organizations to see nature of interest (Co-chairs) Action point: finalize and circulate WG ToRs (Co-chairs)

	Local level conflict resolution mechanisms were identified as the priority topic for the first discussion, followed by CSPs, youth (as change agents), women (as change agents), conflict assessment and local leaders (as change agents).					
	 → Action Point: Send the final results of the priority selection and the topic for the next meeting so that participants can prepare/send questions (UNDP). The core group meeting will involve volunteer organizations to help structure the discussion (WG Participants). → Action point: Finalize and share the WG workplan (co-chairs) 					
3	Coordination in the field – experiences and recommendations					
	 In the Bekaa there are two separate working groups (one on livelihood, one on social cohesion). In Qoubayat there is only a livelihood working group. There is a need to clarify the structure that we recommend to have in the field: separate or common working group(s). There are no coordination structures in Tripoli, in Mt Lebanon and in the South. The Bekaa social cohesion working group is limited to information sharing but will aim to coordinate further to better target interventions. In Qoubayat the livelihood WG is slowly growing, and social cohesion topics are very much integrated in its work. Ana Leer emphasized the need to make sure that field inputs into thematic discussion at central level and that conclusions from central WG discussion are passed back. Action point: recommendation to keep one combined group and strengthen linkages between central and local level- pay attention at the issue at the chair and co-chair from NGO (Co-chairs). 					
4	Activity Info					
	 Almost all the participants seemed up to date on activity info. A participant pointed out the need to pay particular attention to specific vulnerable groups, for example Lebanese returnees. → Action point: participants to e-mail Shombi Sharp (shombi.sharp@undp.org) if they need more training. 					
5.	Mapping tools					
	The UNHCR map presented in an earlier WG meeting was not preliminary and comprehensive enough but will further be developed. UNHCR now has critical sources of information with protection monitoring partners who report on community and individual incidents. UNFPA will launch a report in February on youth, focusing on Lebanese-Syrians relations. One chapter will be on relations between Syrian and Lebanese youth, one on livelihood. UNDP is working on an incident map based on data provided by Internal Security Forces but needs to get additional data on incidents not involving Syrians to have a basis for comparison. The aim will be to integrate all these tools to get a more comprehensive and integrated conflict mapping.					
6	Ongoing and planned assessments: Mercy Corps, Save the Children					
	Mercy Corps: Please refer to the presentation attached. Save the Children is working with AUB to evaluate the impact of CSPs on social cohesion. This will entail focus group discussion and polling of 600 households (50% Lebanese, 50% Syrians).					
	 Action point: Save the Children will send their research proposals and indicators. Action point: Mercy Corps presentation will be presented with the minutes of the meeting. 					

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
