




Total Number of Refugees Registered and with Registration Appointments	<b>667,556</b>

## Highlights

- On 01 April 2014, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 22 camps located in 10 provinces was 224,373. AFAD reported that during the period of 31 March-01 April 2014, a total of 214 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 154 Syrians have voluntarily returned to Syria.
- According to the official statistics provided by local authorities in 11 provinces including Mersin, the number of non-camp Syrians registered in 11 provinces increased to 443,183 as of end of March 2014. When compared to end Dec. 2013, there has been an increase of 26,5% (92,853 persons) in the registration of the non-camp Syrians in the first 3 months of 2014. During the same period of 2014, the number of Syrians registered and accommodated in the camps increased 6,6% (13,977 persons) as of end of March 2014.
- UNHCR signed a partnership agreement with the International Medical Corps (IMC). IMC will set up a multi service centre (MSC) in Gaziantep to support vulnerable Syrian refugees living in urban areas. The centre will provide a range of services, including legal and social counseling, health referrals, mental health and psycho-social support activities, as well as information on and referral to other available services. UNHCR also signed an agreement with UNDP for a project targeting host communities in Kilis, Sanliurfa, Gaziantep and Hatay that aims to strengthen the resilience and absorption capacity of the communities.
- During the last week of March 2014, UNHCR trained 32 staff working for the NGOs Support to Life (STL), International Blue Crescent (IBC) and International Medical Corps (IMC). The group included management, protection and community services staff. The training aimed to give an overview of international refugee protection principles and the temporary protection regime in Turkey, while the main focus of the training was on identifying and working with refugees with special needs and vulnerabilities, including code of conduct considerations and do-no-harm principles. A session was also devoted to SGBV and child protection, including an overview of the national referral mechanisms.
