



Total Number of Refugees Registered and with Registration Appointments	736,087

Highlights

- On 07 May 2014, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 22 camps located in 10 provinces was 220,323. AFAD reported that during the period of 05-06 May 2014, a total of 277 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 230 Syrians have voluntarily returned to Syria.
- In Osmaniye, the local authorities informed that the number of registered non-camp Syrians in Osmaniye and its towns reached 10,500 persons, while 294 Syrians were issued ikamets (temporary residence permit). The officials informed that recently they have started to register Syrians living in Duzici town and they will soon complete the registration of all those who had been enumerated before. Reportedly the total is expected to be less than the estimation which was over 15,000.
- In Batman local officials informed that while they are still working on technical issues to start the registration of non-camp Syrians living in Batman province, they continue to provide food packages to vulnerable and needy families. Reportedly they have enumerated 3,562 families totaling more than 18,000 people. Local officials in Batman stated that during this week they started to deliver the food packages to the houses of the families identified as in-need of assistance. Officials stated that in addition to food packages, they also provided NFIs (blankets, heaters etc.) during their initial visits.
- STL - Support to Life, is planning to open its Community Center in Sanliurfa for non-camp Syrians within the coming weeks. STL is planning to organize focus group discussions with the Syrian community to decide on the types of activities to be organized in the center. Prospective ideas are Turkish and English language classes, computer courses, various types of vocational courses and intercultural activities.
- The border crossing point in Senyurt/Kiziltepe in Mardin province continues to be a preferred safe crossing point for the Syrians who return to Syria voluntarily. The Syrians approach officials in Senyurt who process their safe crossing to Syria through Senyurt to Derbasiyah. Reportedly during the month of April 2014, and the first week of May about 1,700 Syrians' crossings were processed through the Senyurt gate.
