MOI/ UNICEF	On 28 May, the Ministry of Interior, in conjunction with UNICEF, hosted a	

<p>consultation on CP issues</p>	<p>workshop on child protection in Jordan, which included the participation of key child protection stakeholders, including officials from Ministries of Interior, Social Development, Justice, Awqaf and Labour and UN agencies, national NGOs and International NGOs working in development and emergency context in Jordan. The meeting was also attended by Ministers of Interior and Social development. The purpose of the workshop was to identify existing gaps in Jordan’s approach to general child protection for Jordanians and child protection in emergencies focusing on Syrians and explore the way forward in response to these gaps. The participants and speakers came up with some concrete suggestions and recommendation to improve the plight of Jordanian and Syrian children.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Ministry of Interior should have dedicated police officers in police stations who are able to identify child protection issues like child labor, child abuses and have these officers trained on referral mechanism and the national framework for combating child labor.</li> <li>2. Transfer and posting system for officials working in Family and Juvenile Protection Departments need to be improved in order to ensure continuity of the work being done in those department. It was also recommended to update the overall procedures of both department.</li> <li>3. Ministry of Interior should consider including more female officers as part of the SRAD force in camps including as part of the community policing mechanism</li> <li>4. MoSD, FPD and other stakeholders to carry out a nationwide awareness campaigns on child protection issues</li> <li>5. Improve coordination between all stakeholders (including through decentralized mechanisms; linking with systems at local level) and engage relevant government department, NGOs and INGOs in respective coordination structures.</li> <li>6. Form Child Protection committees</li> </ol>	
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	<p>in coordination with directorates on the governorate level through the governors which will facilitate reaching out to communities and children.</p> <p>7. Identify/unify entry points in order to improve identification of vulnerable cases of children</p> <p>8. Support efforts to mainstream human rights standards into existing/new legislation (including Juvenile Law, Childhood Act, etc.)</p> <p>9. Decrease duplication of activities (such as hotlines)</p>
