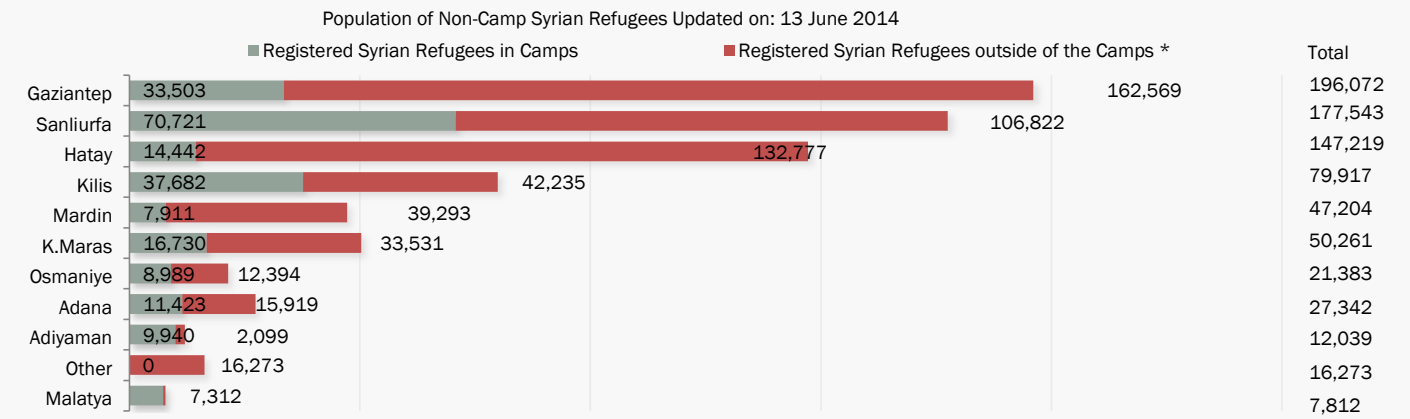
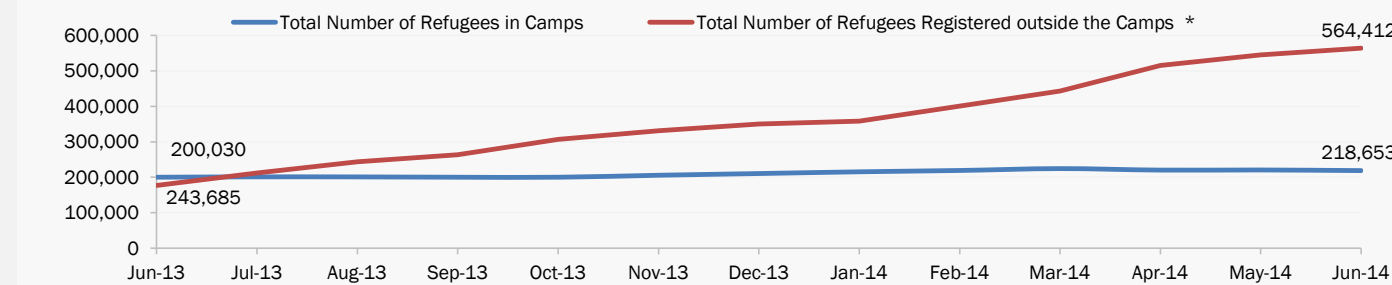
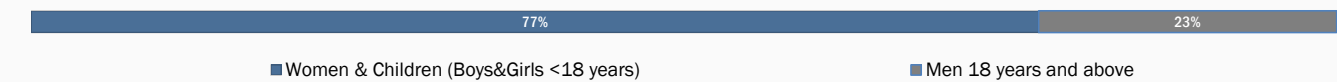

Highlights

- On 19 June 2014, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 22 camps located in 10 provinces was 218,653. AFAD reported that during the period of 18-19 June 2014, a total of 408 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 387 Syrians voluntarily returned to Syria.
- A UNHCR Team met with state hospital officials in Reyhanli. The hospital officials informed UNHCR that about 300-350 Syrians are receiving medical assistance (both inpatient and outpatient services) from the state hospital on a daily basis. Reportedly, this is almost one third of the daily inpatient and outpatient visits to the hospital. The officials stated that, except in emergency cases, they are requiring all the Syrians to be registered in advance in order to obtain medical assistance.
- In Reyhanli, UNHCR was informed that there are about seven schools providing education to approximately 7,500 Syrian children. These schools are reportedly supported by various NGOs and are implementing the curriculum provided by the Syrian education commission. A local NGO in Reyhanli is providing transportation for Syrian children living in the nearby villages to get to and from Reyhanli town.
- In Akcakale camp, AFAD social workers informed UNHCR that, upon request from the camp staff, they are going to provide a training on Communication Skills to all the private security guards employed in the camp. The social workers stated that, depending on the needs and requests, they may also consider training for other staff in the camp.
- In Akcakale, officials informed UNHCR that the number of Syrians waiting at the gate of the camp has increased to about 100-150 persons. Reportedly, these Syrians claim to be new arrivals and are requesting to be admitted to the camp, however due to shortage in capacity they cannot be admitted. Camp officials informed that about 160 Syrians of camp residents have signed up for voluntary return and departed from the camp this week, which will make some space available to admit those waiting at the gate. The camp officials are in contact with provincial authorities to find a solution for these people.
