



Total Number of Refugees Registered and with Registration Appointments	804,602

Highlights

- On 16 July 2014, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 22 camps located in 10 provinces was 219,295. AFAD reported that during the period of 15-16 July 2014, a total of 33 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 497 Syrians voluntarily returned to Syria.
- The Provincial Director of AFAD in Mardin informed UNHCR that before the police started the registration of non-camp Syrians, AFAD had enumerated about 58,000 Syrians living in Mardin province. Out of this total, about 50% are living in Kiziltepe town of Mardin, while Nusaybin, Mardin city center and Midyat towns are also hosting several thousands of Syrians.
- According to the provincial AFAD officials, the major needs of non-camp Syrians living in Mardin province are shelter and food, but there are also several thousands of children who can not attend school due to lack of capacity. Officials also informed UNHCR that while the vast majority of Syrians in Mardin province are of Kurdish origin, there are also a few hundred Assyrian Christians living in Midyat town as well.
- The office of the Social Assistance and Solidarity Foundation (SASF) in Midyat town reported that they have about 500 families (approx. 3,070 persons) of vulnerable non-camp Syrians in their records and that they are providing food and NFIs to these families depending on their funds and donations they receive from local donors. Among these vulnerable families, 28 are Assyrian-origin Syrians.
- Upon invitation by the local authorities in Adana, a UNHCR field team also participated in the meeting called and chaired by the dept. governor of Adana, with the participation of state institutions such as the Provincial Directorates of Family and Social Policies (MFSP), Child Police, provincial directorates of Education, Health and Security, representatives of AFAD, Office of the Religious Affairs, and a local NGO. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the situation of Syrians and how to facilitate the services for camp and non-camp Syrians. A UNHCR field team shared its experiences and technical advice as well as the best practices of existing implementations of community centers in various locations, such as in Hatay and Gaziantep.
