



E-Food card programme reached **216,500** beneficiaries.

## JULY HIGHLIGHTS:

In July, the WFP and Turkish Red Crescent e-food card programme reached approximately 216,500 beneficiaries in camps in conjunction with the cost-sharing agreement with AFAD.

In July, direct transfers to beneficiaries' e-Food cards in refugee camps amounted to about US\$ 5.9 million.

Price monitoring committees have been established by WFP and are active in 18 of the 21 camps being supported by the e-food card.

Joint WFP/TRC teams assessed and contracted 6 new shops in urban areas in the Ceylanpinar, Akcakale and Nizip regions. Increasing the number of shops creates healthy market competition and provides shops with incentives to stabilize prices, provide better service and follow programme regulations.

The Government of Turkey takes the lead role for determining and implementing assistance provided to Syrian refugees, through the Prime Ministry Disaster and Emergency Management Presidency (AFAD). AFAD reports spending 3,5 billion USD on the Syrian Refugee Response in Turkey.


## NEEDS ANALYSIS:

Provision of food assistance in camps (and if requested by the Government to vulnerable Syrians outside of camps) is considered to be a key priority of the response, as it is life-saving and prevents immediate risk of harm to health.

The entire population living in camps is expected to be vulnerable and will be assisted with a monthly ration of 80 Turkish Liras per person from WFP and GoT. In addition, assistance will be extended to some of the most vulnerable Syrians, living outside of camps in Turkey, with a pilot programme, if requested by Government. This population will be selected based on need and only households that are highly vulnerable to food insecurity will be targeted.

Key intervention areas include:

- Provision of assistance to the full estimated camp population of 300,000 refugees during 2014 with the existing modality of electronic food card assistance.
- Provision of food assistance for vulnerable Syrians living outside of camps in Turkey through a mechanism to be worked out between GoT and WFP.
- Through collaboration between GoT and FAO, implementation of a micro-gardening project, with the objective of improving refugees' diet through a holistic approach that takes into account production, preparation and composition of nutritious food.



## PROGRESS AGAINST TARGETS:



Targets based on expected population of 1,000,000 Syrian refugees in Turkey by end-2014. There are currently 815,413 registered refugees in Turkey.



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
