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Border regulations: Humanitarian exception

- Current: UAM/SC under *age 16* with family in Lebanon to be considered.

- Current: Regulations only for Syrians.



Border regulations: Implementation

- MoSA presence at six (land) border crossings.
 - Plan: 24/7, 365 days.
 - Start Masha'a March 2015.
 - MoSA field/social workers to staff offices.
 - GSO to train on regulations.
- Proof at border: legal ID, HCR certificate.
- No quotas.



Border regulations: Implementation

- Currently GSO referring to MoSA
 - Agencies can refer humanitarian cases to MoSA
- GSO hotline for referrals: **1717**
 - 7am-7pm; voice recording off-hours

**NRC BIRTH REGISTRATION UPDATE:
THE CHALLENGES OF BIRTH REGISTRATION FOR REFUGEES COMING FROM SYRIA
IN LEBANON**

BACKGROUND INFORMATION- METHODOLOGY

- *Timeframe* - The data was collected between March and June 2014 .
- *Assessed Population* - Refugees from Syria (Syrians and Palestinians).
- *Quantitative data* - (797 persons interviewed).
- *Qualitative data* - 32 key informant interviews; 12 in-depth interviews; 11 focus group discussions (FGDs).
- *Locations assessed* – All areas of NRC ICLA operation, including Beirut/Mount Lebanon, the Bekaa Valley, the North and the South of Lebanon.



BACKGROUND INFORMATION - LIMITATIONS

- The quantitative survey included refugees from Syria in areas where NRC works, with one part of the sample representing refugees approaching NRC community centres and the other part comprising respondents who fit the assessment profile and who were accessible during ICLA outreach activities.
- Only teams based in the North and the South of Lebanon conducted assessments with PRS.



Birth Registration Procedure-Steps


- **Step One:** Obtain a Birth Notification (from hospital or a certified midwife).
- **Step Two:** Obtain a Birth Certificate (*Mukhtar* located closest to the place of birth).
- **Step Three:** Approach the Personal Status Department (PSD) to register the birth certificate. It includes 2 parts:
 - ✓ a. *Nofous* (local government registry office);
 - ✓ b. Foreigners' Register at the Personal Status Department of Governorate.

BIRTH REGISTRATION UPDATE -FINDINGS

➤ 92% of the Syrian refugees interviewed were not able to complete the possible legal and administrative steps to register the births of their children born in Lebanon.

Possible to register birth according to Lebanese law	Possible	174	22%



BIRTH REGISTRATION UPDATE - FINDINGS

- Almost all refugees (771 out of 797, or 97%) obtain a Birth Notification from the relevant birth attendant (hospitals, midwives, or doctors);
- The remaining 3% could not obtain a Birth Notification because they gave birth at home without a certified midwife;
- 70% of the refugees interviewed (554 out of 797) successfully completed the second step of the process and approached a *Mukhtar*;
- 18 % of the refugees interviewed (145 out of 797) successfully completed the third step, part a and approached the *Noufous* which allows to stop the one year period.

CHALLENGES TO BIRTH REGISTRATION FOR REFUGEES FROM SYRIA

- Documents required for birth registration;
- Valid Residency visa required for birth registration;
- Babies over one year old who were born in Lebanon;
- Registering at the Nofous;
- Challenges faced by Palestinian refugees from Syria;

Coping Mechanisms

- Returning to Syria:
 - ✓ To give birth;
 - ✓ To register the birth;
 - ✓ To get the identity documents
- Paying for identity documents from Syria;
- Using “Simsars” (brokers) to obtain fake documents;
- Using other people’s identity documents

RECOMMENDED NEXT STEPS

- Provide support (technical and financial) to the national and local Government authorities and health service providers in addressing the specific challenges;
- Strengthen access to quality and accurate information for refugees;
- Provide access to legal assistance for refugees;
- Ensure constant monitoring of birth registration for refugees.

RECOMMENDED NEXT STEPS

- Support the Ministry of Interior and the General Security Office to issue a Circular regarding the specific situation of refugees from Syria so that they are able to register the births of babies in Lebanon;
- The Personal Status Department within the Ministry of Interior should strengthen the standardisation of birth registration procedures for non-Lebanese among *Mukhtars* and *Nofous* across Lebanon.
