


- Ensure unhindered and continuing access to asylum, freedom of movement and individual refugee documentation

### Expected beneficiaries in Dec.2015




2015 FINANCIAL REQUIREMENTS

## KEY MESSAGES

- The Nigeria Inter-Agency RRRP will address **three target groups**: Nigerian refugees in the three asylum countries; returning Niger nationals displaced by conflict; and host communities in the three countries.
- Refugee protection within the context of the Nigeria situation will have a particular focus on child protection activities and responding to cases of violence, abuse and exploitation including SGBV and child and youth association with armed groups.
- Local authorities, UNHCR and partners will focus on maintaining the **civil character of asylum** both in and outside of camps.
- The RRRP was drafted through a **participatory planning process** coordinated and led by UNHCR. It is the product of the combined efforts of Governments, UN agencies, other IGOs, international and national NGOs and refugee communities.

## ACHIEVEMENTS 2014

- The establishment and expansion of refugee camps in Cameroon, Chad and Niger: In Cameroon, Minawao camp has been expanded but UNHCR and the government are seeking a third site. In Chad, Dar Es Salam camp was established following the influx of refugees this year and in Niger three sites are being developed (Goudoumaria, Sayam Forage and Kablewa).
- Voluntary relocation to refugee camps at a safer distance from the border. Over 33,000 have been relocated to Minawao camp in Cameroon and nearly 5,000 Nigerians have been relocated to Dar Es Salam camp in Chad.
- UN agencies and NGO partners have accelerated multi-sectoral assistance to meet the urgent needs of the rapidly growing refugee populations in all camps. These efforts have contributed to a considerable improvement in living conditions, particularly in the areas of protection (transfer, registration and documentation), health and nutrition, food security, WASH, shelter, education, and livelihoods.

## RRRP OBJECTIVES—2015

### Protection:

- Ensure physical safety and protection of refugees maintaining the civilian character of camps, providing documentation and freedom of movement
- Protection of women, men, girls and boys from violence, abuse, neglect and exploitation
- Support and strengthen community based intervention among refugees and host community to increase self-resilience and peaceful coexistence

### Education:

- Ensure the right to education to school age children and young women and men is fulfilled in a protective environment

### Food security:

- Ensure food assistance is distributed in sufficient quality and quantity to refugees and identified host communities.

### Health and Nutrition:

- Ensure access to Primary Health services for refugees with particular attention to nutrition and vaccinations

### Logistic and transport:

- Ensure safe transport of refugees from border areas to safe places
- Ensure adequate material assistance is delivered timely and maintained in good conditions

### Shelter and NFI:

- Improve living condition and restore dignity to refugees through the provision of adequate shelter and material assistance

### WASH:

- Ensure refugees have access to sufficient quantity of water
- Guarantee and promote safe sanitary and hygienic living condition

### Environment and Livelihoods:

- Improve and strengthen livelihoods and environment programs
