# **EXPLANATORY NOTES:**

#### SUMMARY:

This matrix is prepared and published monthly, representing what happened in various sectors in the particular reference month. This indicators matrix is a step towards showing a comprehensive picture of the current situation in Gambella region and establishing a basis for initial trend and gap analysis. In order to better understand the matrix, following are the explanatory notes on some of the sector indicators:



### **NUTRITION:**

- Performance indicators are within sphere standards for all the camps (Jewi, Kule, Tierkidi, Pugnido, Pugnido 2, Nguenyyiel camps) s with curate >75%, defaulter rate <15%. death rate < 10% for OTP and <3% for TSFP.</li>
- Focus on quality of care and monthly 2 stage facility BSFP MUAC/ WHZ screening and community Mass MUAC screening.



### SHELTER:

- The % of households in emergency family shelter indicates the need for continuous shelter intervention in all the camps.
- 'Transitional shelters' refers to those that have been completed with mud plastering.
- Transitional Shelter Construction continued in Kule, Tierkidi, Jewi., Pugnido I and II during thge reporting period
- Emergency Shelter Construction continued in Nguenyiel (new camp) during the reporting period



# WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE (WASH):

- Average per capita amount of water supplied during the month of October 2016 was
  within and above sphere standards (15 lppd) across all the camps. With the ongoing
  development of the new camp (Nguenyiel) and earlier settlement of the new arrivals
  within Kule, Tierkidi and Jewi Refugee Camps, daily pumping time has been stepped
  up from 10 -15 hours to meet the increased water demand in both the new and
  existing camps.
- Latrine access level has generally stayed within sphere standards across all camps with coverage rapidly improved in the new camp and within areas where new arrivals were settled in the old camps.
- Access to water collection points is being improved in the new camp on an ongoing basis as additional tap stands are being installed as more emergency shelters are constructed
- Number of persons visited per hygiene promoter per day/week/month still below standards in most camps. Efforts are being made to integrate community outreach activities with the Health and Nutrition sector as a way of increasing coverage of hygiene promotion activities.

### **EDUCATION:**

- Gross Enrolment rate in at preschool is still very low at 37%. Reasons for low enrolment mentioned by
  parent are: Inability of schools to provide a feeding programme for the children; Accessibility to
  preschools; Lack of proper awareness on the importance of early childhood education for children;
  Security reasons; and children not interested in Early Childhood Care and development activities.
  Partners are continuously mobilizing parents to escort children to ECCD centres and there has been
  reassurance of protection on the way to the centres.
- The pupil /facilitator ratio is at 84 for preschool and 90 for primary school, way above the recommended standards of 30. Due to funding challenges, partners have been unable to meet this crucial indicator at the required standard.
- The Gross Enrollment Ratio (GER) at primary education is 63% which is slightly above the average.
- Secondary education remains low despite construction of secondary school in Kule and Tierkidi, however the ongoing construction of secondary school in Jewi, is likely to improve the enrollment rate slightly above the 7 percent.
- class room attendance improved as a result of the on going construction of semi permanent and permanent classrooms



### **HEALTH:**

### Mortality:

Crude and Under 5 mortality rates have been within the SPHERE standards of <1 death/10,000 population/day and <2deaths/10,000/population/day for CMR and <5MR respectively for several months. Good case management by partners for diseases such as severe malaria, watery diarrhea and complications of severe malnutrition contributed to reduction in mortality.

Diarrhea: The incidence of diarrheal diseases remained high in Kule and Pugnido II refugee camps due to multiple factors including inadequate water supply, lower latrine coverage and poor hygiene practice.

#### Malaria:

Malaria incidence rates have increased in all refugee locations. Kule camp was the only location being affected the most with crude incidence of 133.2 cases/1000 population/month. The malaria prevention and control effort such as mosquito net distribution was undertaken back in 2015 and now vulnerable groups such as children under 5 years of age and pregnant women are receiving mosquito bed nets in all camps. Environmental management such as bush clearing around home environment was done to reduce mosquito breeding near homes. Indoor residual spraying was also conducted in the camps including Kule to reduce mosquito population.

#### Vaccination:

Arrival vaccination is only active at Pagak entry point with all indicators reaching the targeted standard.
