UNHCR (8/2016):

- **81,009**  of secondary school age (15 - 18)



- approximately **42%** of the compulsory school age (6-15 years old) are enrolled in formal education.


Displacement Evolution



Second shift schools





2014/2015: 144 schools






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SECTOR BUDGET AND TARGETS

LCRP Education Chapter based on RACE II aims to contribute to furthering the equitable right to a quality and relevant education for all children and youth between 03-18 years of age in Lebanon, by addressing **policy, systems, quality service-delivery** and **demand bottlenecks** at the national, subnational and community levels

CHALLENGES TO OVERCOME

- ✓ Changes in the **population distribution** of refugees and its impact on **supply** of public schools provision.
- ✓ 50 % of public schools in Lebanon are **rented** spaces; most of which do not comply with Effective School Standards
- ✓ The **socio-economic needs** of refugee families impact the demand for education
- ✓ The need for **psychosocial support** for refugee children and child protection.
- ✓ Impact of displacement on children's learning and skills' development
- ✓ **Foreign language** learning
- ✓ Traditional/old **curriculum**
- ✓ Training teachers on **differentiated instruction/learning**
- ✓ The need to set-up inclusive schools for children with **special needs**.
- ✓ The need for **predictable, long-term and flexible funding**
- ✓ The importance of strengthening the **National Lebanese Education System** (data management, measurement of learning achievement, policy frameworks...)
- ✓ How to move the sector **from a protracted crisis to development**

SECTOR STRATEGY 2017 - 2020

- ✓ A significant increase in the number of students enrolled into formal education
- ✓ Regulating NFE opportunities as a pathway to formal education
- ✓ Improving the curriculum, teaching quality, learning environments, and learning materials
- ✓ Increasing transition rates and decreasing dropout rates in formal education
- ✓ Improving efficiency and accountability of MEHE's institutions
- ✓ A transparent accounting of monies and progress of RACE II through periodic reviews

PRIORITY INTERVENTIONS for 2017

- ✓ Support education opportunities throughout children's educational cycle
- ✓ Increase demand for formal education and regulated non-formal education
- ✓ Focus on equipping children and youth with effective life-skills
- ✓ Contribute to inclusive, healthy, safe and protective school environments
- ✓ Improve access to appropriately equipped public schools / Rehab, Equipment, Construction / availability of lands owned by MEHE
- ✓ Enhance the quality of education services and learning environments
- ✓ Revise and develop new interactive curriculum /Train Teachers and education personnel
- ✓ Unify Non Formal Education programs / train educators
- ✓ Enhance the MEHE managerial capacities
- ✓ Endorse policy frameworks to regulate Education programmes and services, strengthen school management, and professionalise teaching services

SECTOR OUTCOMES

- Outcome #1 Enhanced access to and demand for equitable formal education or regulated non-formal education for children, youth and their caregivers
- Outcome #2 Enhanced quality of education services and learning environment to ensure grade-appropriate learning outcomes for children and youth
