POPULATION UPDATE

NEW ARRIVALS

- Between 1-15 March, over 10,000 South Sudanese refugees fled into Sudan, arriving in the border states of White Nile, South and West Kordofan and East Darfur at an average daily rate of nearly 690 refugees per day.
- Since 1 January, over 46,000 refugees have arrived in Sudan in 2017, which exceeds average arrival trends observed in January through March in 2014-2016. This brings the total number of South Sudanese refugees to over 351,000 who have fled to Sudan since the start of the conflict in December 2013 (see updated map on p.2).
- Given intensified localized fighting in Upper Nile and parts of Unity states, and ongoing deterioration of the food security situation in Unity, Warrap and Western and Northern Bahr el Ghazal, high new arrivals are anticipated throughout 2017.

- UNHCR is working with COR across affected states to ensure refugees are registered
 at the household level upon arrival, and have timely access to NFIs, emergency food
 rations, nutrition screenings and medical services. Biometric registration is ongoing
 across White Nile refugee sites and at the Kario site in East Darfur, for both new and
 existing caseloads.
- Following reports of cholera cases at the Malakal POC site, the state Ministry of Health
 in White Nile is preparing health screening and vaccination campaigns for cholera and
 measles at border entry points and for existing caseloads at refugee sites.


OTHER INCREASES

- An inter-agency mission to Al Lait, North Darfur (12 16 February) estimated that
 there are 19,531 South Sudanese refugees living across ten locations. The refugees
 entered Sudan through West Kordofan and have transited to North Darfur since May
 2016, and are currently being supported by local host communities. This brings the
 total population in North Darfur to over 20,000, including approximately 1,000
 refugees living in Al Taweisha locality.
- In East Darfur, over 23,000 South Sudanese refugees living in remote areas of Abu Jabra, Abu Karinka, Adila, Asalaaya, Sheiria and Yassin localities were recently identified by HAC and COR. An inter-agency mission to Adila is currently underway to verify reports and assess refugee and host community needs. Additionally, a UNHCR-COR fact-finding mission to Khor Omer IDP camp (21 February) reported that the refugee population at the camp has been reduced from over 24,000 individuals to approximately 7,600. This brings the total population in East Darfur to nearly 79,000.
