



Arrivals from Yemen by year





WORKING WITH PARTNERS

- **KS-Relief field visit:** From 22-26 April, the King Salman Center for Humanitarian Aid and Relief (KS-Relief) conducted their fifth field visit to Somalia to monitor progress on projects funded by them. The delegation visited sites in Bossaso and Hargeysa where they met with local authorities and partners. The delegation acknowledged the improvement of health and education projects, visibility of the KS-Relief contribution, the complexities in implementing programmes in Somalia, and expressed an interest to provide support to individuals affected by the drought.

MAIN ACTIVITIES

Protection

- **New arrivals:** In April, a total of 676 individuals (530 Somalis, 142 Yemenis, three Ethiopians and one Egyptian) arrived by sea from Yemen to Somalia. Seven boats carrying 386 new arrivals (310 Somalis, 74 Yemenis and two Ethiopians) arrived to Bossaso and three boats carrying 290 new arrivals (220 Somalis, 68 Yemenis and one Ethiopian and one Egyptian) reached Berbera.
- **Reception assistance:** Of the 676 new arrivals, 566 individuals (455 Somalis and 111 Yemenis) went to the reception centre (288 in Berbera and 278 in Bossaso) where they were provided with water, hot meals, accommodation and information counselling.

- **Registration:** In April, UNHCR and partners Puntland Ministry of Interior (MoI) and Ministry for Resettlement, Rehabilitation and Reconstruction (MRRR) in Somaliland registered a total of 387 people of concern; 235 Somali returnees and 152 Yemeni refugees.
- **Legal assistance:** UNHCR partners Legal Clinic (LC) and KAALO Aid and Development (KAALO) provided legal assistance to 14 people of concern; 13 Yemeni refugees and one Somali returnee.

Education

- During the month of the April, UNHCR partner African Action Help International (AAH-I) enrolled nine Yemeni refugees in school in Mogadishu.
- Students who were enrolled in school in September 2016 in Somaliland and Puntland will finish their courses in May 2017. New enrollments for 2017 will start in September.

Health

- UNHCR through partners Gruppo per le Relazioni Transculturali (GRT), Hanano Medical Center (Hanano) and Hargeisa Group Hospital (HGH), provided access to health care to 903 Yemeni refugees; 622 in southern and central Somalia, 183 in Puntland, 98 in Somaliland.

Core Relief Items

- UNHCR distributed 157 Core Relief Items (CRIs) to 152 households (280 individuals) in April; 90 CRIs were provided to 85 Somali returnee households (160 individuals) in Mogadishu; 67 CRIs were provided to 49 Yemeni refugee households (69 individuals) and 18 Somali returnee households (51 individuals) in Hargeysa. While in Bossaso, UNHCR provided conditional cash grants in amount of US\$ 50 per household to 36 Somali returnee households (107 individuals) to enable them to purchase CRIs in the local market.

Cash Assistance

Subsistence allowance

- UNHCR provided subsistence allowance to 1,675 Yemeni refugee households (4,481 individuals) across the country; 950 households (2,920 individuals) in Somaliland, 660 households (1,304 individuals) in Puntland, and 65 (257 individuals) in south central regions to meet their basic needs.
- UNHCR partner International Refugee Committee (IRC) completed vulnerability assessments in southern and central Somalia which resulted in 267 Yemeni refugee households being identified to receive subsistence allowance.

Reinstallation grant

- UNHCR provided a one-time reinstallation grant in the amount of US\$ 200 per person to 318 Somali returnees (160 in Mogadishu, 107 in Bossaso and 51 in Hargeysa).

Community Empowerment and Self Reliance

Technical and vocational training

- UNHCR, through partner AAH-I in Hargeysa, continued with technical and vocational training in carpentry and joinery, plumbing, tailoring, beauty therapy, hair dressing, tie dying, bar and liquid soap production and cooking, targeting 139 Somali returnees.
- In Puntland, UNHCR partner Danish Refugee Council (DRC) began a technical and vocational training programme in the areas of tailoring, beauty therapy and electrical training, targeting 40 Yemeni refugees.

Small-business management

- UNHCR partner National Committee for Refugee and IDPs (NCRI) continued a training on small-business management targeting 65 Yemeni refugees. In the month of the April, the remaining 45 Yemeni refugees have received a business grant in amount of US\$ 1,000 to start-up their business.
- After an assessment, UNHCR partner Action Semi-Arid Land (ASAL), identified and registered 555 beneficiaries (444 Somali returnees and 111 host community) in Puntland (380 beneficiaries in Garoowe and 175 beneficiaries in Bossaso) to be trained in small-business management and to be provided with business cash grants to start-up their business.

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
