Sector	Updates	Key Concerns
<b>Camp Coordination and Camp Management</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Department of Social Welfare provided 5 old Tuk Tuk (three wheelers) to CMC. In addition to that government provided MMK 250,000 to repair the Tuk Tuk. CMC is using these vehicles for transportation of students from camp to Thet Kya Pyin School and for medical attention to the IDPs taking nominal charge.</li> <li>CMC meeting conducted on 12th January and was participated by 31 (9 Female) CMC members and representatives from WDG, Disable persons, Elderly and Camp Incentive Workers. IDPs and camp management issues were discussed.</li> <li>Inter-agency meeting was conducted on 29<sup>th</sup> January and attended by 28 (13 Female) representatives from CMC, WDG, Disable persons, DRC, CDN and LWF.</li> <li>On 5<sup>th</sup> January, 5 CRM boards installed in the OTG South camp.</li> <li>5 letters were received through complaint box during the month. The complaints were for UNHCR and government offices. LWF submitted letter to UNHCR for further response.</li> <li>On last week of January, analyzing of household's survey had completed for update of January by CCCM/LWF.</li> <li>27 (15 Female) birth and 6 (4 female) death cases reported during the month.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Disputes between IDPs and land owners (host community) regarding construction works in camp and profit sharing are reporting verbally.</li> <li>Incentive staffs requested to increase their monthly incentives.</li> <li>Participation in CMC meeting and Inter-Agency Meeting are improving but still there are rooms for improvement for active participation and sharing information.</li> </ul>
<b>Education</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>LWF implementing education program.</li> <li>CMC reported that some teachers were absent without information during the month.</li> <li>IDPs and Community Teachers requested to provide adequate Myanmar text books for students and furniture to have appropriate learning environment.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Incentive community teachers are not taking their responsibility sincerely.</li> <li>Furniture in TLSs is damaged.</li> <li>Requested to construct school building in OTG South.</li> </ul>
<b>Food and</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>State Government distributed 300 bags of rice, 140 gallons of Oil</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Baw Dhu Pha 20 Longhouse (OTG-</li> </ul>

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<b>nutrition</b>	<p>and 60 bags of beans on 12<sup>th</sup> January.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On 23rd January, PLAN and Food Distribution Committee distributed food ration.</li> <li>On 29th January, CDN distributed food ration 259 Household in the OTG (1)/35 Longhouses of OTG South.</li> <li>On 31st January, MRF distributed 5 items of food (a bag of rice, 5 liters of oil, a vessel of salt, 3 vessel bean and 12 vessel dried fish for 1,029 Household of non-registered IDPs in OTG 4 and 5 (OTG South).</li> <li>IDPs requested to provide ration in beginning of the month.</li> </ul>	<p>South) IDP mentioned that there are 1,188 IDPs and 200HHs in Baw Dhu Pha Camp and would like to receive food ration from OTG South food distribution centre.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>IDPs and CMC requested cooperation between CMC and Food Distribution Committee for effective camp management. Till now all the camp sub-committees are working separately and lack of coordination.</li> </ul>
<b>Health</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Health service is providing by Mercy Malaysia from 9 to 12 am. There is a health clinic in OTG North for both South and North residents. That clinic service is not enough of drugs for the population of the camp. Doctor could check very few patients during opening hours from 9:00 to 12:00 A.M.</li> <li>Myanmar Health Assistant Association distributes Nutrition for children 2 days per week.</li> <li>Mercy Malaysia explained that, there are about 180-200 people are visiting for health checkup daily. Around 30% of above clinic visitors found serious health conditions. There isn't enough clinic staff, according the number of persons need medical attention.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>If there is an emergency medical patient, they have to go to the Dar Paing Clinic or Thet Kya Pyin hospital. IDP says that it is expensive.</li> <li>Mercy Malaysia explained that, they have to support as transportation charges, medical allowance and meal costs for the sick person in a hospital.</li> <li>CMC requested to provide health promotion training to IDPs.</li> </ul>
<b>NFIs</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>None to report.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>IDPs requests NFI Kits (Mosquito net, Warm Clothing, Blanket, Cooking pot and Family kits) as soon as possible.</li> </ul>
<b>Shelter</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>LWF has a plan to renovate damaged shelter.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>According to shelter assessment, all of shelters had repaired of roofs within December 2014, but longhouse's floors have damaged again in Baw Dhu Pha section. So, IDPs are staying on the ground in shelter.</li> <li>CMCs requested to renovate existing warehouse to store food.</li> </ul>

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<b>WASH</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• DRC implements WASH activities.</li> <li>• On 27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> January, DRC distributed 4 items of family hygiene kits.</li> <li>• On 30<sup>th</sup> January, MRF distributed toilet soap, detergent, toothpaste, tooth brush, towel and nail cutter to the 1,029 HHs in the camp OTG (4&amp;5).</li> <li>• There are many damaged latrines and water points. DRC has a plan to renovate latrines and water points.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Open defecation is in everywhere since latrines are damaged.</li> <li>• CMC requested to repair women bath rooms, latrines, and water points.</li> <li>• No proper solid waste management in the camp.</li> </ul>
<b>Protection and Community Service</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• LWF supplied books for general knowledge, Journals and Magazines Newspaper (daily &amp; weekly) to the community library.</li> <li>• LWF reformed social groups, WDG, YDG and CDG. MC and WDG jointly finalized the selection of tailoring/dress making training participants, facilitators and training venue.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• CMC and social groups requested for sports and recreational activities and livelihood program.</li> </ul>
<b>Disaster preparedness and fire safety</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• LWF installed 5 fire safety bill boards during the reporting period.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Since summer is approaching, CMC requested to replenish fire safety kits/points.</li> </ul>
