



In June 2017, UNHCR continued to provide counselling on legal and administrative- related issues for Syrian refugees. As a result, 24 cases were referred to UNHCR's legal partner for legal assistance. Throughout the reporting period the legal assistance continued to be extended for a variety of reasons. Nevertheless civil registration was the main reason for referrals in 2016 and remain the same during reporting period.

Throughout June, 187 children, adolescents and youth were assisted with structured and sustained PSS services provided by UNHCR's Partner Save the Children (SCI) across Greater Cairo and Alexandria, the majority of which are youth aged 10-17 years. In addition UNICEF partner Tdh operating in Cairo and Alexandria provided PSS services to 2,128 children, youth and adolescents. Around 55% of UNICEF beneficiaries were youth aged 10-17 years old, with a slight increase in the number of males over girl's beneficiaries by 6%.


In June, 16 children newly benefitted from UNHCR/SCI's multi-sectoral case management, all of them being separated or unaccompanied children. Under UNICEF's case management partner Tdh, 751 children newly entered into Tdh's case management process; the majority of which reported to be boys aged 10-17 years (21%).

During the reporting period, 3RP partners continued to focus on multi sectoral approach for prevention and response to SGBV incidents. 135 new Syrian SGBV survivors were identified and supported. Access to multi-sectoral response services including quality case management as well as emergency medical response and post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) kit has been continuously ensured for those reporting SGBV incidents in accordance with the survivor's rights, needs and wishes. During June 2017, 3RP partners reported that 320 people were reached through community-led activities which are a key component both in SGBV prevention of and response.


The SGBV inter agency coordination activities remained. The monthly SGBV Sub-Working Group session chaired by UNHCR SGBV Unit continued to offer a platform of exchange of SGBV activities, critical unfolding SGBV information on trends, programmatic initiatives and lessons learned. The focus of June meeting that was attended by 14 agencies was on challenges of refugee women in vulnerable situation. A constructive discussion on best practices and lessons learned on vulnerable cases followed and the referral pathway for those cases was put in place.

A workshop was delivered for 17 participants (12 women, and 05 men) representing 7 different Syrian community groups on how to undertake effective community initiatives. The groups stem from both recipients of funding from this year and the last one. The Community Empowerment project also concluded preparations for the delivery of capacity building workshops on project management, resource mobilization, and running community-based groups which are scheduled to start by mid-July 2017.

113,000 Syrian Refugees expected by end-2017




150,665 Refugees & Local Community Members Sectoral Target by end of 2017
