

What is the Rapid Needs Assessment (RNA)?

The RNA is an Inter-Agency tool developed by UNHCR, UNDP, MoSA, OCHA and the Disaster Response Management (DRM) Unit of the Government of Lebanon to support disaster preparedness in Lebanon. The RNA forms part of the contingency plans of both the Humanitarian Country Team (HCT) and the DRM Unit. It is launched in case of any situation resulting in the displacement of Lebanese or refugee populations. The RNA offers a quick initial snapshot of the situation on the ground and identifies priorities.
