GREECE Accommodation update



In Kilkis, a small city in northern Greece, families uprooted by conflict in Syria have found peace and a place to call home. The families are accommodated in dignified conditions in apartments, managed by Omnes voluntary association, in collaboration with UNHCR's partner lliaktida. Gradually they become part of the local community that had once welcomed refugees of Greek origin.

Overview

By the end of September, UNHCR had created 17,661 places in the accommodation scheme as part of ESTIA, in 2,806 separate facilities and 19 cities across Greece. 83% of these places were occupied.

Vulnerable asylum-seekers and refugees in Greece can avail of rented housing through the accommodation scheme.¹ Urban accommodation helps provide people with a sense of normalcy and facilitates their access to services, including education and health. People also receive support from social workers, interpreters, and guardians if they are unaccompanied children. The teams help them access medical services, employment, language courses and recreational activities.

Demographics of refugees and asylum seekers accommodated

In total, since November 2015, 35,941 individuals have benefitted from the accommodation scheme. 13,342 persons were accommodated as of the end of September 2017. Of those, 50% were children, 25% were women and 25% were men. The vast majority of those accommodated are families, with the average family size of four people. Almost 2,000 single individuals were also accommodated.

24% of the residents have at least one of the vulnerabilities that make them eligible for the accommodation scheme. The three most common vulnerabilities are:





¹ The scheme also facilitates the eventual integration of those who will remain in Greece, while the host population benefits from the renting of their apartments. UNHCR works with NGOs as well as a number of municipalities around Greece to provide rented accommodation in apartments, buildings, host families and hotels. The accommodation scheme commenced in Nov. 2015.


Demographics of refugees and asylum Type of accommodation seekers accommodated

90% of individuals in the accommodation scheme are Syrian, Iraqi, Afghan, Palestinian or Iranian. The individuals accommodated as of the end of September 2017 speak 31 different first languages.





Just over four in five accommodation units are apartments, followed by buildings and hotels (13% and 4% respectively).




Partners

At the end of September 2017, the accommodation scheme had 15 partners, seven national and international organizations and eight municipalities: Praksis, Iliaktida, CRS, Arsis, Solidarity Now, Nostos, Intersos, and the municipalities of Athens, Thessaloniki, Livadia, Trikala, Karditsa, and a consortium of municipalities in Crete. In total, partners managed by UNHCR provided 94% of the accommodation spaces in Greece. In September, two additional municipalities joined the scheme, those of Larissa and of Nea Philadelphia - Nea Chalkidona.



Location of accommodation

Accommodation for asylum-seekers and refugees is provided in 19 cities in Greece. 64% of the accommodation places are located in Athens, with 6% currently on the islands.
