COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION

The camp community organization is structured around three administrative layers, which are Zones, Villages and Blocs. Each organizational level has its representatives with currently 1397 bloc leaders, 93 Village leaders and 10 Zonal leaders. All Zone Leaders are headed by the Camp Chairman and his The camp was opened on 14th, January 2016, as an emergency response to receive 40,000 Burundian Refugees relocated from Nyarugusu camp to Nduta and Mtendeli. The camp suspended relocation for short time early Feb, 2016 due to land issue and water shortage then resumed on 8th April 2016 to stopped again in May to receive new arrivals. The camp ceassed to receiving new arrivals from Burundi on 3rd October 2016, when the population reached 50,000 individuals. The camp is now on care and maintenance phase and water shortage remain an issue while 80% of the population is still leaving in emergency shelters.





Biometrically Registered Population Growth






















