


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

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## 1. DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIAL PROFILE

*NB: Figures and values in the profile only represent the population surveyed in household survey, not the total Afghanistan population, unless stated otherwise.*


### Summary

Qizil Sai is a hillside village located 31 km from Kunduz City and 6 km from Ali Abad District. A total of 420 families reside in the village, all of whom currently live in mud houses. Approximately half of village residents sought refuge in Pakistan and Iran, with the remaining half being displaced to neighbouring districts and to Kunduz City. Following the collapse of the Taliban regime in 2002, all IDPs spontaneously returned home. This was followed by the return of villagers that had sought refuge in Pakistan and Iran.

Of the 135 households surveyed in Qizil Sai, 104 (77%) were returnee households, 30 (22%) were local community households and 1 household reported to be IDPs. The households encompass a combined total of 1,246 individuals with a gender ratio of 1.1 males for every female.

The average household size was revealed by the survey to be 9.3 persons among returnees and 8.9 persons among the local community. The sole IDP household surveyed was found to have 9.0 household members. Children (0-17 years) represent over half the average household size among local community and returnee households, and over three-quarters of members within the IDP household, with a gender ratio of 1.1 boys for every girl.

The elderly (aged 60+) were found to constitute 8% of the local community population and 4% of the returnee population, with no elderly persons belonging to the IDP household. Approximately 2% of the population reported to be widowed with three times as many widows as widowers.




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**2. MIGRATION PROFILE**

**Summary**

Among the households surveyed, the year 1387 (2008/09) witnessed the largest number of returnee arrivals in HRA with 16 returnee households choosing to settle in Qizil Sai. Prior to and since 1387 (2006/07), on average, approximately 10 returnee households per year have chosen to settle in the area.


Of returnee and IDP households that have settled in Afghanistan in the last two years, 86.7% of returnee households stated that they did so voluntarily. Of these, all of returnee households stated that they intend to remain in the area.

All returnee households had sought asylum in either Pakistan (89.5%) or Iran (9.5%) with 89.4% stating that they did so for safety due to conflict. Over four-fifths also cited economic reasons and over three-quarters cited family reasons. A further, one-fifth of returnee households stated that they sought asylum due to harassment/discrimination reasons.


Among IDP households, all has stated family, harassment/discrimination and escaping personal violence as the main reasons for having fled their districts of origin.

Over two-thirds of households stated that legal difficulties reasons were the main reasons of returning back to Afghanistan. Further, over two-quarters stated owning property as having influenced their decision to return. A further two-quarter of households returned to Afghanistan because of economic reasons.


**2.1 Year households settled in current location**






**2.2 Percentage of HHs that settled in last 2 years and intend to remain**

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



**3. HOUSING STATUS PROFILE**





Survey findings reveal that all IDP households, 80% of local community households and 77% of returnee households currently occupy single family homes. The remaining 20% of local community households reside in part of a shared house and remaining returnee households reside in either part of a shared house (16%) or in a temporary shelter/shack (5%). Almost all dwellings were mud-brick or mud constructions with wooden roofs.

The majority of local community households were found to be residing in either a two-room dwelling (33%) or a three-room dwelling (33%). The majority of returnee households reside in either a two-room dwelling (45%), a three-room dwelling (19%) or a single-room dwelling (19%). Two-thirds of IDP households occupy two-room dwellings with single-room dwellings (22%) being the second most common dwelling type for this group.

With regard to cooking facilities, 39% of returnee households and 30% of local community households have a separate kitchen within the home. All IDP households, 33% of local community households and 27% of returnee households cook in a separate room outside the home. A further 33% of local community households and 24% of returnee households cook in the open.



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**4. WATER, ELECTRICITY, FUEL AND SANITATION**

**Summary**

**Water:** Open body of water is the main source of water for all of the local community and IDP households and 97.1% of returnee households. It is located on average 31 minutes away from local community, 23 minutes away from returnee households and 10 minutes away from IDP households. A further 1.9% of returnee have access to hand pump and 1.0% have access to open well. Hand pump is 15 minutes away from returnee households and open well is 20 minutes away.

**Electricity:** Of the 150 households surveyed, a total of 80 (59.3%) reported to have had access to an electricity supply in the 30 days prior to being surveyed. Solar power is the main source of electricity for all of local community households, 96.7% of returnee households and 97.5% of IDP households. The remaining 3.3% of returnee is using battery for electricity.






**Fuel:** During the winter months, animal dung provides heating source for 76.7% of local community households, 86.5% of returnee households and all of IDP households. A further, 13.3% of local community and 10.6% of returnee households use firewood for heating. The remaining households use bushes, twigs/branches and straw and crop residue, trash for heating.

Animal dung provides cooking fuel for 76.7% of local community, 85.6% of returnee and all of IDP households. Proportionally, local community households (16.7%) use less bushes, twigs/branches and straw for cooking than returnee households (73.7%). Furthermore, 6.7% of both local community and returnee households are using firewood.





**Sanitation:** 66.7% of local community and 73.1% of returnee households use traditional covered latrine. A further 30.0% of local community households, 19.2% of returnee households and 100% of IDP use open field, bush and sahrabi for toilet. The remaining households use improved latrine and open pit.

Surveyors took note of whether any garbage or pools of stagnant water were observed in close proximity to the households they interviewed. 30.0% of local community households and 28.8% of returnee households didn't have any garbage near their dwellings. A further, 66.7% of local community households, 69.2% of returnee households and 100% of IDP households had little garbage near their dwellings. Furthermore, 3.3% of local community households and 1.9% of returnee households had a lot of garbage near their dwelling. Also, all of both local community households and IDP households and 98.1 of returnee households didn't have any stagnant water near their dwellings. In addition, 1.9% of returnee households had little stagnant water near their dwellings.

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
**5. LABOUR & LIVELIHOODS**


According to survey findings, 37.3% of local community members, 36.1% of returnees and 33.3% of IDPs are engaged in work for the family. Of those working for the family, all IDPs, 69.0% of local community members and 61.1% of returnees are female. A further 22.2% of IDPs, 15.0% of returnees and 13.4% of local community members reported to be working for a salary with males accounting for all local community members and IDPs as well as 95.9% of returnees. The majority (61.8%) of returnees reported to be employed in industry, with the remainder working in either the government sector (16.0%), in agriculture (11.8%) or the service sector (10.4%). Local community members were most likely to be working in either the government sector (47.2%) or in industry (44.4%). All salaried IDPs reported to be working in agriculture.

Among those aged 12-17 years, nine returnees, one IDP and one local community member also reported to be in work.


**5.1 Percentage of household members working**




### Summary

**Income:** Average household income in 1390 was USD 3,315 among local community households, USD 2,992 among returnee households and USD 2,600 among IDP households. For returnee households, the main sources of annual income were wage labour (47.1%), agriculture (21.2%) and government services (15.4%). Similarly, for local community households the main sources of income were government services (40.0%), livestock (16.7%) and wage labour (16.7%). The sole IDP household surveyed derived household income from agriculture.







Average household debt was revealed to be USD 561 among returnee households and USD 412 among local community households.

**Expenditure:** Average household expenditure in the month prior to being surveyed was USD 244 among local community households, USD 214 for the sole IDP household, and USD 204 among returnee households. A larger proportion of monthly expenditure was spent on food supplies by the IDP household (93.5%) than by returnee (88.2%) and local community (76.2%) households.

**Assets:** With regard to ownership of key household assets, over three-fifths of local community and returnee households own a stove/gas balloon, and two-fifths in both household types own a radio. Similarly, over 85.0% in both groups own a mobile telephone. The sole IDP household surveyed owns all three assets. Only local community (23.3%) and returnee (8.7%) households reported owning a car.



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










**Summary**

**Agriculture:** Of surveyed households, the sole IDP household, 62.5% of returnee households and 53.3% of local community households have access to agricultural land. In 1391, on average, 16.1 jeribs were cultivated by local community households, 13.8 jeribs by returnee households and 10.0 jeribs by the IDP household with access to agricultural land. The main reasons for not cultivating more land were landmines, a lack of fertile land, and a lack of water. Wheat was the most important crop for the IDP households and for 93.8% of local community households and 86.8% of returnee households. Access to a garden plot was only reported by local community (13.3%) and returnee (11.5%) households.







**Livestock:** Some form of livestock is owned by the sole IDP household surveyed and by 90.0% or more of local community and returnee households. The sole IDP household owns donkeys, goats, chickens, cows, and oxen. Among other households that own livestock, 96.3% of local community households and 89.6% of returnee households own donkeys, while over two-thirds in both groups own goats and three-fifths in both groups own chickens. Comparable proportions of both local community and returnee households own cows (37.0% approx.), sheep (28.0% approx.) and oxen (15.0% approx.). Local community households were significantly more likely to own horses and cattle than other household types.








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



Over 96% of local community households and all of returnee and IDP households stated that the Provincial Centre is too far to walk to. In the last three months, the main reasons for travelling to the Provincial Centre for all three household types were to visit a government office or to purchase goods or service. Moreover, all three household types stated that the nearest police station is 15-60 minutes away.

Over 95% of all three household types stated that public health Centre is too far to walk, must use transport. For the vast majority in all three community groups, the nearest private health clinic is too far to walk, must use transport. The nearest hospital is too far to walk, must use transport for all household types.


Over one-third (36.7%) of local community households and over two-quarters (53.8%) of returnee households stated that their employment area is too far to walk, must use transport while, for all of IDP households, it is less than 15 minutes away. 96.7% of local community households and all of returnee and IDP households stated their access to transport is 15-60 minutes away.

The nearest boys' primary school among local community and IDP households is 15-60 minutes away, while for returnee households the nearest boys primary school is less than 15 minutes away. In addition, the nearest girls' primary school among all three household types is less than 15 minutes away. Furthermore, the nearest boys and girls secondary school among local community and returnee households is less than 15 minutes away while for IDP households, it is too far to walk, must use transport. The nearest boys and girls high school among all three household types is too far to walk, must use transport.






**8.1 Average time taken to walk one way to Province Centre**










**8.2 Average number of times a HH member has travelled to Province Centre in last three months**






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**9. EDUCATION PROFILE**

**Summary**

Among those aged five years and over, 40.6% of the local community and 38.0% of returnees reported to be literate. Of these, 55.9% of local community males and 53.9% of returnee males reported to be literate. Similarly, 23.8% of local community females and 20.8% of returnee females reported to be literate.

Among adults aged eighteen years and over, 95.3% of local community males, 98.3% of returnee males and all of IDP males did not achieve any school grade. Similarly, approximately all females across all three households had not achieved any school grade.

Among males aged 6 to 24 years, 66.7% of local community males and 47.3% of returnee males reported to be currently attending school. Among females aged 6 to 24 years, 35.3% of local community females and 26.4% of returnee females reported to be currently attending school. The main reason for not attending school given by those aged 6 to 24 years across all three groups was because they didn't like school or didn't learn enough. Furthermore, 17.9% of local community members and 14.5% of returnee members of those aged 6 to 24 years didn't attend school because there was no female teacher. A further, 13.8% of those aged 6 to 24 years across all three groups didn't attend school because there was no school or it was too far.



**9.3 Age distribution of literate household members**




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


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
**9.10.1 General reasons for not attending school**






**9.11 Age distribution of males who received education in another province**




**9.12 Age distribution of females who received education in another province**

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

**10. HEALTH PROFILE**

**Summary**

20.0% of local community households and 19.2% of returnee households had between one and two household members admitted to a health facility as an inpatient over the course of the previous month. 43.3% of local community, 60.6% of returnee and all of IDP households also had at least one member receive care from a health provider, a pharmacy or traditional healer without having to stay overnight. The private health facility was visited most by all three household groups, followed by the Regional Hospital and district hospital. The most common reasons for seeking medical treatment by local community households were respiratory problems (27.8%), cardiovascular problems (16.7%), digestive problems (11.1%) and communicable problems (11.1%). Similarly, for returnee households the most common reasons were digestive diseases (22.1%), respiratory problems (18.6%), and treatment of other communicable problems (12.8%). For all IDP households, the main reasons for seeking medical treatment were communicable diseases


Of the 287 females aged 13-49 years that were included in the survey, a total of 43 were reported to be married among local community households (n=7), returnee households (n=35) and IDP households (n=1). Based on this data, the average number of births stands at 7.4 for local community females, 5.2 for returnee females and 11.0 for IDP females. Correspondingly, the average number of infant/child deaths is 1.1 for local community females, 0.5 for returnee females and 1.0 for IDP females. Of the 40 females aged 13-49 years that have given birth, 85.7% of local community females, 71.9% of returnee and all of IDP females received antenatal care during their last pregnancy with an average of 3.37 antenatal care visits per mother, and 15.0% had the assistance of a midwife during delivery.

With regard to children under the age of five, all of local community children, 71.4% of returnee children have been registered with the civil authorities. Over the course of the previous month, 37.5% of local community under-fives and 79.6% of returnee under-fives have received a Vitamin A capsule, and no child of local community and 22.4% of returnee children have suffered from diarrhea. Furthermore, 12.5% of local community children and 14.3% of returnee children have a persistent cough.




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
**10.1.3 Percentage of HHs with at least one member who sought treatment from a health provider, a pharmacy or traditional healer without staying overnight**




**10.1.4 Reasons for seeking treatment**




**10.2.1 Number of married women who completed survey**




**10.2.2 Age distribution of married women who completed survey**









**10.2.3 Percentage of overall number of married women aged 13-49 years who completed survey**






**10.2.4 Average number of births per woman by age group**


**Summary**

All of local community households have been affected by reduced drinking water quality. A further, 30.0% of local community households were affected by unusually high increase in food prices, 20.0% by severe winter condition, 16.7% by flooding and 10.0% by late damaging frosts. Over four-fifths (83.3%) of local community households did not need to do anything to compensate for coping with shocks. A further, 20.0% of local community households decreased expenditures and some small number of households reduced quality and quantity of diet and took loans in order to cope with shocks.


92.3% of returnee households have been affected by reduced drinking water quality. A further, 51.9% of returnee households were affected by unusually high increase in food prices, one-third (33.7%) by severe winter condition, 16.3% by flooding and 13.5% by late damaging frosts. Over three-fifths (65.4%) of returnee households did not need to do anything to compensate for coping with shocks. A further, over one-quarter (27.9%) of returnee households decreased expenditures and (7%-18%) of households reduced quality and quantity of diet and took loans in order to cope with shocks.

All of IDP households were affected by reduced drinking water quality, unusually high increase in food prices and severe winter conditions. All of the IDP households responded with decreasing expenditures to cope with mentioned shocks.




**11.2 Specific household shocks in 1390**




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**11.3 General coping strategies employed in response to household shocks in 1390**

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**12. PROTECTION PROFILE**

**Summary**

Of the 135 households surveyed, 69.6% had an adult male aged 18-59 years as head of household. The head of household of one returnee households were a male aged 12-17 years. A total of 40 households had an elderly (aged 60+) head of household of whom none were female. Three returnee households were headed by a widow or widower.

One returnee male and four females aged 15-17 years were reported to be married. Among married adults, a total of four local community females, 19 returnee and one IDP females reported to have been under-18 years of age at the time of marriage.


Five returnee households contained more than one wife.

The survey found 27 people living with a disability of which 70.4% were male. The most common disabilities were reported to be either physical (40.7%) or sensory (25.9%) in nature. 66.7% of disabled local community and 38.1% of disabled returnees were adults aged 18-59 years. 16.7% of disabled people in local community households and 33.3% of disabled people in returnee households were aged 60 years and over.




**12.1.1 Age distribution of male heads of household**



**12.1.2 Age distribution of female heads of household**



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**13. Child Labour**


**Summary**

Among households surveyed, a total of 11 children were reported to be working and include 1 child aged 12-17 years among local community households, 9 children aged 12-17 years among returnee families, and 1 child aged 12-17 years among IDP families.

The only one child worker belonging to local community households was reported to be working on average of 10.0 hours per day and he is reported to be day labourer. Child workers belonging to returnee households were reported to be working an average of 8.7 hours per day with 44.4% of returnee child workers reported to be self-employed and 44.4% were day labourers. The only child of IDP families works an average of 10.0 hours per day and he is reported to be self-employed.

The only child in local community and five children in returnee households are engaged in industry sector. A further, three children in returnee households are engaged in agriculture sector. Agriculture sector also provides job opportunity for the only child working in IDP households.

**13.2 Distribution of male child workers by age and sector**






**13.4 Average number of hours worked daily by male and female child workers**




**13.5 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers by economic sector**



**13.6 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers aged 12-17 years by economic sector**




**13.7 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers aged 5-11 years by economic sector**



**14. SAFETY AND SECURITY**

**Summary**

The security situation in the district was described as “moderately secure” by the sole IDP household surveyed as well as by 86.7% of local community households and 73.1% of returnee households. A further 24.0% of returnee households and 13.3% of local community households consider the district to be “not secure, not insecure.”


With regard to safety, 56.7% of local community households and 43.3% of returnee households “never” fear for their personal safety and security or that of their family. A further 30.0% of local community households and 29.8% of returnee households “sometimes” do so. The sole IDP household surveyed reported to “rarely” fearing for safety, along with 26.0% of returnee households and 10.0% of local community households.

On the subject of policing in the district, the sole IDP household, 60.6% of returnee households and 53.3% of local community households are “moderately satisfied” with the police. A further 43.3% of local community and 34.6% of returnee households reported being “not satisfied, not dissatisfied.” Small proportions (<4.0%) in both of these groups also reported to be “very satisfied” with policing in the district


Of the 135 households surveyed in Qizil Sai, two returnee households had experienced some form of violence in the three months prior to being surveyed.
