Protection Cluster Objectives

Parties increase measures to protect civilians based upon further harmonized protection of civilians/International Humanitarian Law advocacy by protection actors

Child rights violations are monitored and verified to prevent and respond to the needs of children affected by emergencies

Gender Based Violence incidents in emergencies are identified and survivors' multi-sectorial needs are adequately responded to

Vulnerable displaced persons are able to claim and exercise housing, land and property, as well as legal identity rights vital for achieving durable solutions

Reduce deaths and injuries from mines/ERW and promote inclusivity and rights of persons with disabilities, through education and clearance of high-impact mine/ERW and spot ERW contamination

Protection Cluster activities in 2018



70,000 refugee returnees will receive cash grant and additional services at Encashment Centres
7,000 undocumented returnees will be prioritised for the assistance to persons with specific needs

180,000 undocumented returnees will receive post-arrival assistance

21,054 unaccompanied and separate children will be registered upon identification and provided with family tracing and reunification services
23,958 affected children will be enrolled into child protection case management and referred to relevant service providers
91,905 children and parents will receive psychosocial support
3,383 children victims of violence will receive specialized assistance and care
3,956 child protection in emergencies specialists will be trained
1,472 children will receive targeted assistance to address child recruitment
114,308 people will be sensitized on child protection issues in communities



75,724 people in communities will be sensitized on Gender Based Violence (GBV) through community dialogues and GBV nationwide assessments
24,953 survivors of GBV will receive services and support, including medical, psychosocial, legal and material assistance, as well as safe spaces where needed
14,880 women and girls of reproductive age will receive a dignity kit
7,514 health workers will be trained on GBV response

14,800 persons will receive legal assistance and counselling for Housing, Land and property (HLP) cases



19,200 persons will be provided legal assistance and counselling for legal civil documentation (LCD) cases

20 communities will be profiled for the purpose of developing a durable solutions plan

30 housing and property damage assessments planned
45,000 persons will be sensitized on their HLP rights
450 HLP rights training to displaced persons planned
900 duty bearers will be trained on HLP and LCD



1,103,348 conflict affected persons will be provided Mine/Explosive Remnants of War (ERW) Risk Education

198,242 people will benefit from Mine/ERW Surveyance and Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) including response to hotline calls

87,705 persons living in contaminated areas will benefit from ERW and unexploded ordnance (UXO) clearance

203,916 persons will be trained on rights of victims
