

2017 Highlights - Registration

 All new arrivals were registered and provided with shelter and core relief items

- 65% were children, including
 14,265 unaccompanied & separated minors
- 87% were women and children







2017 Highlights - Relocations

 Gure-Shembola camp was opened in May 2017 in Benishangul-Gumuz Region to ease the pressure on Gambella



 3,138 new arrivals voluntarily relocated to Gure-Shembola over a 3-day road trip covering 844km





2017 Highlights - Camp expansion

- Expansion of Nguenyyiel Camp from original threshold of 60,000
- Currently accommodating over
 83,000 refugees (in 2018, the camp will be split into two administrative zones both supporting 50,000-60,000 refugees)
- Trend of refugees arriving with livestock indicates the Gambella Region will continue to host the majority of new arrivals







Challenges

- Funding constraints hampered provision of full food ration of 2,100 kcal/ day
- Global Acute Malnutrition rate was 23.5% against 15% minimum standard
- Minimum standard of one health unit/10,000 individuals not achieved due to resource constraints.
- Fundamental gaps in the provision of shelters, WASH, education and livelihoods services due to critical resource constraints.
 - 37% of households were afforded transitional shelters.
 - 54% of school aged children able to enroll in primary and 12.5% in secondary education.
 - Lack of vocational skills trainings programmes for the youth.






2018 Overview

- Peace process not yet fully enforced
- Violence and food insecurity projected to result in 35,000 new arrivals
- Ethiopia to host 485,000 South Sudanese refugees by end of 2018

(The 485,000 target was premised in October 2017 on reaching 450,000 by the end of 2017 which was ultimately not reached. 421,867 arrived by 31 December 2017).

- 24 participating organizations
- Total funding requirements:
 US\$ 342,109,266



Operational Priorities

- Provide life-saving protection support in line with the comprehensive protection and solutions strategies for South Sudanese refugees
- Preserve and enhancing the protection environment and living conditions for refugees and promotion of peaceful coexistence;
- Strengthen refugee protection through the expansion of improved community-based and multisectorial child protection and SGBV programmes;
- Strengthen access to basic services;
- Expand labour opportunities; supporting the implementation of the GoE's Pledges to expand access to rights, services, and self-reliance opportunities in the longer-term.
- Expand existing community facilities in line with the whole of society approach.
