Context

- Government's progressive refugee policy and settlement approach
- Nature of displacement is becoming protracted
- Uganda hosts approximately 983,000 refugees and asylumseekers (as at 31 December 2016)
- Refugee-impacted areas remain particularly vulnerable and presence of refugees can have a dramatic impact on host communities
- Host communities needs are not systematically address when programming for refugee
- Refugees are included in the national development plan (NDPII) through the Settlement Transformation Agenda (STA)

Overview

- Platform for bridging the humanitarian-development response as a key building block for sustaining response
- Transiting humanitarian response in a coordinated manner and lies within developmental framework
- Brings together a wide range of partners to support the implementation of the Government's Settlement Transformation Agenda (STA)
- It also contributes to the Government's 2040 Vision and the Sustainable Development Goals/Agenda 2030)
- Traditional humanitarian response is not addressing sustainability and ownership
- Mostly supply driven than demand driven hand out model
- Different approaches of programming in host communities and refugee
- Two parallel set of co-ordination

Objectives

- Ensure the humanitarian action is embedded in long term development approach
- Provides the basis for common programming, principles, frame work between GoU, UN Agencies, DPs and private sectors
- Strengthening ownership and capacity of local government and community institutions
- Improving basic social service delivery in terms of access, quality and efficiency
- Expanding economic opportunities and sustainable livelihoods, with focus on women and youth
- Addressing environmental degradation in refugee-hosting areas
- Building peace, security and harmony between refugee and host communities

ReHOPE with WASH Prospective

- Government in lead role Technical Ministry like MoWE/MoH/ MoES and DLG are leading the sector and carry out monitoring and supervision
- Common Programming align with SDG/NDP II— eg. Sector wide approach
- Strengthening ownership and capacity of local government Humanitarian response is embedded in district development plan and part of budget conference
- Strengthen capacity of community institutions Formation and training of users group and rollout of CBMS
- Community engagement and empowerment CLTS Approach
- Build on existing programmatic blocks USF, National handwashing Initiatives
- Build on and strengthen existing coordination structure District Water and Sanitation Coordination Committee
