- Health and Nutrition






Where We Work


SCJ staff and volunteers work both in camps and host community settings in every governorate in Jordan.

In 2017, we reached **589,245** children and their families.





Achievements




-In 2017, Save the Children Jordan worked across the Kingdom in all thematic areas

-We reached **375,546** individuals directly (**57**% children and **43**% adults) and a total of **213,699** individuals indirectly.

Why Focus on Health & Nutrition

• Children under 5 are more likely to become ill and die from malnutrition and disease

 Mother and child malnourishment contribute to approximately 35% of deaths in children less than 5 years of age; 1.5 million under 5 deaths are due to severe wasting (acute malnutrition)

 First 1000 days (pregnancy till 24 months) are the critical window of opportunity for surviving





Infant & Young Child Feeding 'IYCF'

Started in December 2012

Initially started in Zaatari Refugee Camp

and expanded to cover Azraq and EJC

camps, as well as Raba AlSarhan (Mafraq),

new arrival area at Jordanian-Syrian

border, and 4 governorates; Amman, Karak,

Ma'an, Aqaba and Jordan Valley



Goals

- The overall goal for IYCF is reducing under-five mortality and under nutrition through the global IYCF recommendations / Optimal feeding practices :
- Early initiation of breast feeding (within I hour after birth)

- Protecting, promoting and supporting exclusive breastfeeding for six months
- Continued breastfeeding for 2 years or beyond
- Introducing of timely, safe, appropriate and adequate complementary feeding from six months on



Achievements

- 219,513 mothers benefited & reached by IYCF services
- A total of 188,099 children under 5 years reached and benefited by IYCF services
- 14,780 children under 5 screened and referred in Rabaa Alsarhan along with 2,897 mothers
- Co-chairing the national nutrition working group
- Ensure implementation of the BMS" breast milk substitute code
- Monitoring of infant formula prescription and distribution in all 3 camps incoordination with other partners in the provision of IYCF



Anemia component

- aimed at changing dietary behavior and reducing Anemia prevalence in Jordan
- 19,456 women and children have been screened
- 3,625 Anemic women and children have completed treatment
- Anemia component was integrated with the Infant and Young Child Feeding Program (IYCF), March 2016 - April 2017
- Screening & Management of Anemia for Women in Reproductive age between 15- 49 years targeting the Infant and Young Child Feeding Program beneficiaries in camps and host



Anemia

The Anemia program provided awareness sessions for women and treatment for those who are IDA patients (Iron deficiency anemia)

Pregnant women were not screened to avoid duplication

9,792 women of reproductive age were screened

1,334 women completed treatment



Supplementary Feeding Programme

SFP 2014 - 2017



SFP- under WFP funds

- The overall goal for SFP is to treat moderate acute malnutrition (MAM) for children 6-59 months and Pregnant / lactating Mothers with malnutrition
- The program also aimed to reduce the risk of child mortality
- Trained health clinics in camps to do the MUAC 'Mid-Upper Arm Circumference' in their clinics
- Trained the community health volunteers in camps to do the MUAC screening

SFP under WFP funds 'Za'atari camp'

- Between February 2014 August 2014
- Targeted Children from 6-59 months :
- 224 children enrolled in to SFP
- 96 Children treated from malnutrition
- 65 women enrolled into SFP
- 23 women treated from Malnutrition
- 11,464 Super-cereal Plus were distributed for children
- 301 Super-cereal plus was distributed to pregnant women after their first trimester



HSWG 20/12/2018

SFP under UNICEF funds '2014-2017'

- 3 refugee camps 'Zaatari –Azraq- EJ'
- distribute Plumpy Sup to Children under 5 years (6-59 months) who suffer from malnutrition
- Program achievements:
- 1310 children were enrolled into SFP
- 1035 children were treated for Malnutrition
- 337 PLW women were enrolled into SFP
- 165 PLW women were cured from Malnutrition



Community Health Services 2018

The objective of this project would be to improve the health status of the population in Za'atari camp through the provision of preventative and community based health care services. The project adopt a community based approach whereby volunteers from the camp are implementing a series of activities to achieve the main objective of the project.



Achievements

- 80 CHVs recruited and trained on monthly basis
- 14,925 of new HVs assessments completed and entered into SCJ /IRD database
- 17 trainings conducted for CHVs covering different Health, data management and communication topics
- participation in Health school program
- Conducted different campaigns.
- Follow up with immunization and RH defaulters


