





Key achievements

- During the fourth quarter of 2018, the Food Security Sector received funds that enabled it to support over 500,000 Syrian refugees in camps and communities. The sector also supported vulnerable Jordanian households through in-kind food assistance complementing efforts with the local NGO, Tkiyet Um Ali.
- WFP expanded its unrestricted cash in support of Syrian refugees in 11 out of 12 governorates. Assistance can be withdrawn from ATMs, food vouchers redeemable at WFP-contracted shops, or a combination of both. The introduction of unrestricted cash has provided refugees with the opportunity to hunt for bargains, reduce on-selling of food commodities, and allocate assistance to cover other essential and immediate needs, with positive longer-term effects on food security. According to the Food Security Outcome Monitoring, dietary diversity of Syrian refugees receiving unconditional cash transfers improved. Refugees also reported higher purchasing power.

Challenges faced during the reporting period

- Sustainable funding remains one of the challenges facing the FSS. Flexible, un-earmarked, multiyear funding will allow the sector in Jordan to implement its activities targeting vulnerable Jordanians and Syrian refugees using innovative modalities.

Gaps and key priorities foreseen in the next quarter


Key priorities:
