

## **SECTOR OVERVIEW**

Livelihoods support has become increasingly important under the 3RP to ensure Syrians under temporary protection and vulnerable host community members have an opportunity to become self-reliant. The work of the Livelihoods sector helps in improving social cohesion, both through specific activities and by mainstreaming social cohesion principles in programming and strengthen public institutions.

In the first quarter of 2019 on the supply side of the labour market Livelihoods Sector partners continued to provide support to Syrians under temporary protection and host community members through the provision of Technical and Vocational Training and Education, skills and language trainings to increase access to formal employment opportunities, on the demand side to facilitate job creation and strengthen the capacities of relevant national and local public institutions.

In the first quarter of 2019, 11,586 beneficiaries from the Syrians under Temporary Protection and host community members have been supported in 13 provinces. Of the total number of beneficiaries, 10,317 Syrians under temporary protection and host community members received technical, vocational and language training and 498 have accessed income generating and self-employment activities through job placements in service and industry sectors or started/ expanded a business. In addition, 324 SMEs have received business support through training as well as financial and non-financial services.

Livelihoods Sector continued to strengthen institutional capacities of partners, awareness raising, knowledge management and coordination. Furthermore, partners provide support to public institutions to address the challenges to access work permits, facilitate job creation and increase employability and self-reliance.
