



Gender Breakdown





Transition to Formality Programme TFP



Provinces: Adana, Bursa, Hatay, İstanbul, Konya

Budget: 13.5 million TL

Duration: March 2019 – December 2019

To be expanded until 2021 and to include Izmir, Manisa, Gaziantep, Kocaeli, Sakarya...

Objective: Increasing the registered employment of Syrians Under Temporary Protection and Turkish citizens through provision of financial and technical support to employers.



Transition to Formality Programme TFP



- Work permit fee support for Syrians Under Temporary Protection (372.20 TL)
- Social security premium support for newly hired Syrians for maximum of 6 months (950,00 TL)
- Social security premium support for newly hired or already employed Turkish citizens for maximum of 6 months (950,00 TL)

Developments in Istanbul

- As of 12 July, stricter controls for checking of ID documents have been put in place in Istanbul.
- On **July 18**, DGMM issued a public announcement urging all Syrians to comply with the requirements set forth in Article 33 of the Temporary Protection Regulation emphasizing that any acts that run contrary to the Article would constitute a ‘violation of public order’ and would result in the cancellation of the TP status.

Developments in Istanbul

- On 1 August, Istanbul Governorate issued another press statement (*Irregular Migration, Informal Employment, Unregistered Syrians; 2019-45*)

12-31 July 2019, under the coordination of the Governorate:

- **7.743** workplaces were visited, and counselling services were provided to employees and employers.
- Regularization of signboards - 5.866 workplaces have benefited from consultancy
- YIMER 157 hotline for complaints, inquiries, views and suggestions in combatting irregular migration.

Developments in Istanbul

- On 20 August, a Migration Evaluation Meeting was held under the chairmanship of the Minister of Interior. While the details of the meeting was not made publicly available, the **extension of the grace period from 20 August to 30 October** was announced by the Minister.
- On 21 August, a press briefing was organized for foreign media representatives where the Minister made further statements related to Istanbul –
 - extension of the grace period; and
 - assurances against forcible returns to Syria noting Turkey's obligations under international law.

Developments in Istanbul

- On 27 August, Istanbul Governorate issued another press statement (*Irregular Migration, Unregistered Syrians, Informal Employment*,; 2019-48)

Between 12 July – 25 August 2019 under the coordination of our Governorate:

- Of Syrians who are registered in other provinces:
 - Students in primary and elementary schools in Istanbul in 2018-2019 academic year and their families,
 - With a view to the provision of the unity of family and humanitarian reasons, members of families registered elsewhere,
 - Children under the protection of their relatives who have lost their mothers or fathers (orphans),
 - Who have investments and provide with employment in Istanbul, owners of businesses and their family members who have been officially determined to be actively working three months prior to the application,
 - Students continuing their university education,

Will be registered in Istanbul as long as they document their situations and as long as they meet the conditions as foreseen in the legislation.

Developments in Istanbul

- Units composed of the representatives of the Provincial Directorate of Social Security Institution and related institutions continue their counselling activities towards the prevention of informal employment.
 - 23,344 businesses have been visited and employers and workers were provided with counselling services.
 - Based on the requests of our artisans' chambers, counselling services initially indicated to be implemented until 25 August 2019 by our Governorate have been extended until 30 October 2019.
 - In the works towards rendering business signs in compliance with the legislation, 12,224 businesses were provided with counselling services.
- 437 business signs that were not compliant with the legislation were made compliant. Works towards rendering 1,681 business signs in compliance with the legislation continues.

Developments in Istanbul

- On 14 September, Istanbul Governorate issued an announcement:
 1. During working hours at Kumkapi Coordination Center
 2. During working hours at Sultanbeyli Coordination Center
 3. With a working principle of 08.00-23.00 at Esenler 15 July Democracy Bus Terminal (in front of the police station building)
 4. During working hours at Esenyurt District Working Group
 5. With a working principle of 7/24 at Istanbul Airport and Sabiha Gokcen Airport (in departures section)

Developments in Istanbul

- Procedures and implementation
 - Processing at two minivans belonging to DGMM at Esenyurt and Esenler bus terminal; and in Sultanbeyli PDMM
 - Issuance of travel permit for those registered.
 - Fingerprinting, recording of the basic bio data and issuance of a document to enable travel and referral to provinces of those unregistered.
- Referral of unregistered Syrians to 52 provinces.
- New registration in Istanbul – exceptional categories.

Developments in Bursa

Similar measures like in Istanbul – announced by the Governorate of Bursa on 6 September.

During the inspections that will be done through the teams that will be established towards the purpose:

- Syrian nationals under Temporary Protection who do not have work permits are not informally employed;
- Signs in foreign languages of these businesses are made compliant with the legislation;
- Gaps in business registrations, tax liabilities and work permits are addressed.
- Foreigners who are registered under temporary protection in provinces other than Bursa will be directed to their provinces of residence or to one of the provinces they will be able to choose from.

Developments in Bursa

- Exceptional registration
 - Out of only those who have approached the Provincial Directorate of Migration Management for change of residential province, those who can document that their children are registered in schools in Bursa province for the 2018-2019 academic year,
 - Those who are considered under family reunification per their non-adolescent children and dependent adolescent children, those who are accessing higher education,
 - Those who have been issued work permits and their spouses, non-adolescent children and dependent children,
 - Those children who are under the care of their relatives and separated from their families Those who due to their medical condition are hospitalized in Bursa or whose medical cares will be negatively impeded by transfer to another province as well their companions will be reassigned to Bursa as their province of residence.

Developments in Bursa

- In case unregistered Syrian foreigners PDMs themselves, they will be referred to designated provinces for temporary protection registration procedure.
- Unregistered Syrian foreigners apprehended by the law enforcement will be referred to temporary accommodation centers for registration procedures.
- Unless in exceptional circumstances, Syrian foreigners will not be issued travel permits to Antalya, Aydin, Bursa, Canakkale, Duzce, Edirne, Hatay, Istanbul, Izmir, Kirklareli, Kocaeli, Mugla, Sakarya, Tekirdag, and Yalova provinces.

Developments in Istanbul

UNHCR support

UNHCR will deploy approximately 50 staff (receptionists, interviewers, security guards) to Istanbul and Oncupinar TAC (interviewers and protection desk staff).
