



Key achievements

- By the 3rd quarter of 2019 USD 11,439,525 was provided in basic needs (social transfer) monthly assistance to vulnerable individuals who live outside of camps under the Refugee pillar.
- The Winter Task force, an interagency group developing standards for the 2019-2020 winter assistance program, began meeting in August 2019.
- More than 84,000 cases who live outside of camps were identified as eligible for Winterization Assistance using the Vulnerability Assessment poverty scoring.

Challenges faced during the reporting period

- Failure to meet sector's fund requirements under the refugee pillar in 2019 is the main challenge, with X% of a funding gap.
- By the end of the 3rd quarter, the Jordan Humanitarian Fund had still not identified a pool of funding for winter assistance. Few other agencies and organizations had identified funding. Early identification of funding is critical for a timely response to winter needs

Gaps and key priorities foreseen in the next quarter

- ♦ Gaps:
- Due to limited funding, the basic needs sector covered only 61.1% of the planned target with cash based intervention.

Key Priorities:


• The identification of winter assistance funding to start assistance to beneficiaries in November 2019.
