


## SITUATION OVERVIEW

Over 744,000 Rohingya refugees have fled violence from Myanmar's Rakhine state since August 2017 and are hosted in Bangladesh. Most of the refugees rely on humanitarian assistance, having left with few possessions and exhausted their financial resources during the journey.


Under 915,000 Rohingya refugee women, men, girls and boys are hosted in Cox's Bazar District, including 34,172 registered refugees who arrived in the 1990s (4%); and other unregistered Rohingya refugees who had settled in host communities prior to August 2017. Children make up 55% of the total refugee population and women and girls make up 52%. One in three refugee families have at least one easily identifiable protection vulnerability. While the pace of arrivals has decreased considerably, Rohingya refugees have continued to arrive in Bangladesh from Myanmar and other countries, particularly India, over the course of 2019.

The dashboard monitors the monthly achievements of selected indicators from the 2019 country operation plan for each strategic area of activity with cumulative key figures and monthly highlights.


## GEOGRAPHIC SITUATION




### POPULATION KEY FIGURES



### AGE & GENDER BREAKDOWN




### POPULATION TRENDS

- 43,185** refugees participated in the joint Government of Bangladesh-UNHCR registration exercise in this reporting month.
- 8,060** refugees and **1,554** community leaders attended awareness raising sessions while **49** monitoring visits to detention centers were conducted in this reporting month.
- 5,688** complaints and requests for information handled under community-based outreach mechanisms.
- 9** new community groups have been supported
- 845** adolescents and youth received services while **44** UASCs were identified and documented in this reporting month.
- 420** partners, government and UNHCR staff trained on SGBV prevention and response



- 1,144** WASH facilities constructed in this reporting month, including **851** tube wells and **293** latrines.
- 38,008** WASH facilities have been maintained in this reporting month, including **13,329** tube wells and **24,679** latrines.
- 24,287** WASH facilities have been assessed during the sweep survey in 2019, including **7,288** water points, **10,755** latrines and **6,244** bathing rooms.


**ACHIEVEMENT (DECEMBER 2019)**
