Background

Ajuong Thok refugee camp was established in **March 2013** to accommodate an refugees from **South Kordofan** in Sudan. With an initial capacity of 24,000, the camp is now able to **accommodate up to 55,000 people**. The camp is 70 km distance by road from Yida refugee settlement.

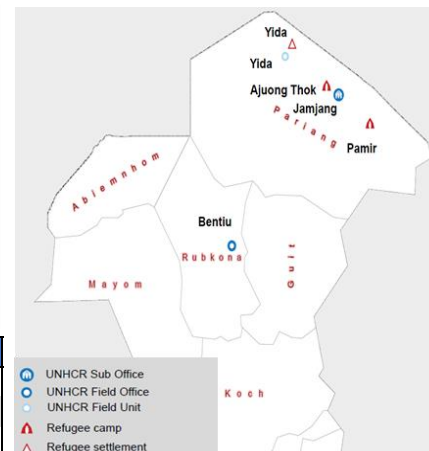
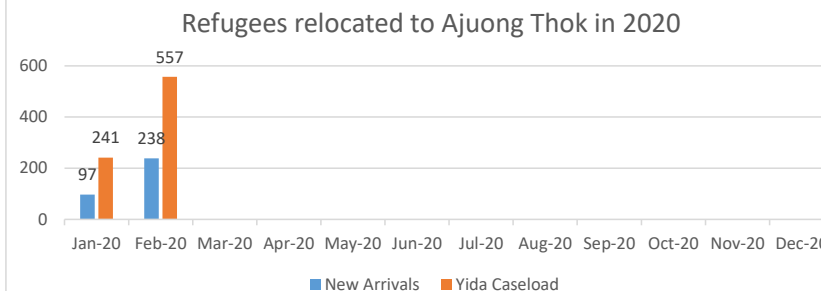

Highlights

- The new school year started in Jamjang camps in February 2020. The enrollment of students is currently ongoing - the # of students enrolled and # of pupils per teacher will be available in March 2020.
- Currently, refugees are receiving 70% of the food basket due to lack of funding to provide the complete ration (an average of 1470 kilocalories per day out of a standard of 2200 kilocalories).

This tournament has 17 teams from the refugee community and 3 teams from the local community and aims at promoting peaceful coexistence. The tournament is organized by DRC and the camp youth leadership. The first match was attended by hundreds of people from both communities.
