Introductions

UNHCR, DRC and FAO co-moderated a session which specifically focused on rural economies and agricultural livelihoods and opportunities for refugees, asylum-seekers, and displaced persons in rural areas as well as host communities living around them.

Overview of presentations

The session brought together different approaches for fostering economic inclusion of refugees and displaced persons and host communities in rural economies and agricultural livelihoods as well as creating enabling environments to become self-reliant and live dignified lives. The presentations have been uploaded to the Regional Livelihoods Working Group Portal.

FAO – FAO in displacement settings in East Africa FAO has been assisting refugees' integration and host communities' rural economies through increased livelihood opportunities in agriculture and access to market, livestock and agriculture value chain investment, peacebuilding cross border voluntary return and labour skill development interventions. Elaborated on UNHCR/FAO 2020 joint collaboration programmes including inclusion of refugees and other persons of concern in FAO's projects and programmes; Inclusion of refugees in existing Food Security Assessment Tools and Joint external visibility and information sharing initiatives. Examples of support to country operations in joint project

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development were also highlighted; including the presentation of the Comprehensive Value Chain analysis of refugee hosting areas in Ethiopia; and the Kenya experience on enhancing self-reliance for refugees and host communities in Kalobeyei. Ongoing collaboration leveraging on WFP's expertise on harvesting surface water and storing it in water pans and earth dams to make water for crop and animal production available was also cited. The Kalobeyei setup is an example of how agencies, governments and communities can work together to transform the lives of communities and persons of concern.

NRC – Land and Livelihoods – lessons from the field Economic Inclusion and self - reliance have no meaning without a focus on land and sustainable livelihoods. These linkages need to be enhanced in order to provide real benefits to displacement affected communities. Land rights and sustainable livelihoods in practice were demonstrated through Somalia and Uganda case studies. Within the context of displacement, self-reliance is important for sustainable durable solutions and creates several avenues for advocacy around local integration. Registering property tenure rights remains an important subject, underpinning livelihood success. Issues of 'transferability' of these rights within the households, households (particularly looking at gender dynamics), and collateralizing land rental agreements for financial access to invest in their livelihood activities (linking land rights to financial access) are however context specific and vary from country to country. Key considerations, challenges and recommendations when programming for land and livelihoods were also discussed.

DRC – Restoring Community Agroecosystems Working with communities to create abundant food systems while buffering them from extreme weather events such as flood, drought, flash floods, landslides and others. Presented DRC's work with refugees, internally displaced communities (IDPs), returnees and host communities to create resilient households, farms and landscapes and agroecosystems using Permaculture. Permaculture is a systems-based design science applicable to the architecture, infrastructure, town planning, agroecology, agroforestry and land restoration. It is about designing to optimize all resources and flows around you. The presentation highlighted the importance of using design, tools and skills to buffer communities from extreme climate and weather events while strengthening economic opportunities and mitigating the risk of displacement, showcasing examples from Burundi, DRC, Rwanda and Uganda.

Guidance to put forward Sustainable Forestry Interventions in Displacement Settings in Kenya - This guidance document aims to support countries, FAO and other partners and stakeholders in developing sustainable natural resources management solutions in order to secure environmental conservation, restoration of degraded land and a sustainable supply of tree and forest products in the context of displacement settings in the country. As well as leveraging opportunities to address environmental degradation, such initiatives should address the constrained access to energy while also building livelihood resilience in situations of displacement that encompass both displaced and host communities.

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<u>KISEDP Framework</u> - FAO provided agricultural insights for KISEDP 2018. FAO is a key member of Agriculture, Livestock, and NRM - Component 6 of the KISEDP Framework.

<u>Nutrition-sensitive Farmer Field Schools in Kenya's Kalobeyei settlement</u> - In collaboration with Turkana County Government, WFP, UNHCR, and KISEDP Agriculture, Livestock, and NRM task force member agencies, FAO is using Farmer Field School extension methodology to reach masses in Kalobeyei & Host locations to benefit from Crop and Livestock production, Livelihoods, and Natural Resource Management (NRM).

Follow up areas for discussions: Strategy formulation to 'green refugee settlements' and driving cleaner energy use; How do we engage private sector players and how to loop in financial institutions;
