2021 indicators and RRP/ Q4 2020 reporting	Discussion on current 2021 indicators:  1) Challenges have been identified in calculating some of the achievements and setting targets; co-chair has discussed the current agreed-upon CP RRP indicators as per the log frame. Information on the total number of children receiving services seems inaccurate and therefore it was suggested to use a more concise figure such as the # of BIAs. In line with case management standards and procedures, each child should have (at least) one BIA and it is rather rare that a child would have two. Therefore, the number of BIAs should correspond to/equal the # of children who have received case management services.  It was also outlined and reminded that in the refugee context of Uganda, we have aligned sector wide standards on case management targets to global standards. As per the global standard, a case manager should have no more than 25 cases open at a time. Behind this background, a case manager in one year is assumed to manage roughly 75 cases which was agreed as the sector standard.  2) Number of open cases is kept as is  3) Number of CFS will be amended to separate in CFSs managed by agencies and community-based CFS management  4) CPCs: a lengthy discussion was held to discuss calculations on the # of CPCs.
