This workstream will focus on:

- 1. Harmonization of workflows, methodologies of data collection, terminologies and guidelines
- 2. Working on a synchronized tool and questionnaire

- 3. Capacity building of different agencies on data collection in close coordination with the inter-agency coordination team
- 4. Coordination of geographical coverage to reduce the duplication of efforts and expanding the scope to cover whole of Poland
- 5. Setting up a good data management plan (Cleaning, Triangulation, Analysis, Sharing)
- 6. A concrete data stream to RIDL that will populate the OPSMaps.

The presentation has focused on the following details:

- Level of data collection and geographical distribution;
- Definitions of locations and typology of sites, including various attributes;
- Harmonized tool;
- Standards for capacity building;
- Data flow.

Additional comments and considerations:

- The site typology and attributes will take into account the regional approach and harmonization from regional perspective;
- Focus for now on the locations that provide accommodation (sleeping overnight), mid to long term. This does not exclude the transit site with bed capacity, but the approach to those due to the nature and their purpose.
- Aligning with the European Union Agency for Asylum assessment on RCs;
- The name of the site should be separate from the typology and attributes: the site can be called various names which does not necessarily follow the agreed definitions for the attributes and typology.
- Given the potential high number of sites, it might prove difficult to make sure that all sites are assessed at the same time or in similar rounds. So the way to go about it could be to have always the date of the site assessment indicated and ensure the standard to follow up on the assessment and monitoring of those sites that are becoming outdated.
- Pushing out the data to RIDL and subsequently OPS maps as quick as possible will be a priority to ensure availability of such data for the humanitarian community.
- All agencies that have information about the sites they visited are invited to share them with UNHCR for the subsequent inclusion in the master list of sites (this means the data would be published as part of the COD). This would help build the initial dataset.
