# Legal Protection

## Emergency stay

- On the 18th of May 2022, the Commission for Exceptional Situations (CES) adopted the Decision no.21 that provides that: “**during the state of emergency, it is allowed to stay on the territory of the Republic of Moldova of Ukrainian citizens and their family members who entered the Republic of Moldova in during the state of emergency, as well as those who were legally in the Republic of Moldova at the date of emergency establishment, without complying with the 90 calendar day period during any period of 180 calendar days.**”
- Earlier, on the 21st of April, during the plenary session, the deputies voted to extend the state of emergency in the Republic of Moldova by another 60 days (beginning from 25<sup>th</sup> of April), in connection with the armed conflict in Ukraine.

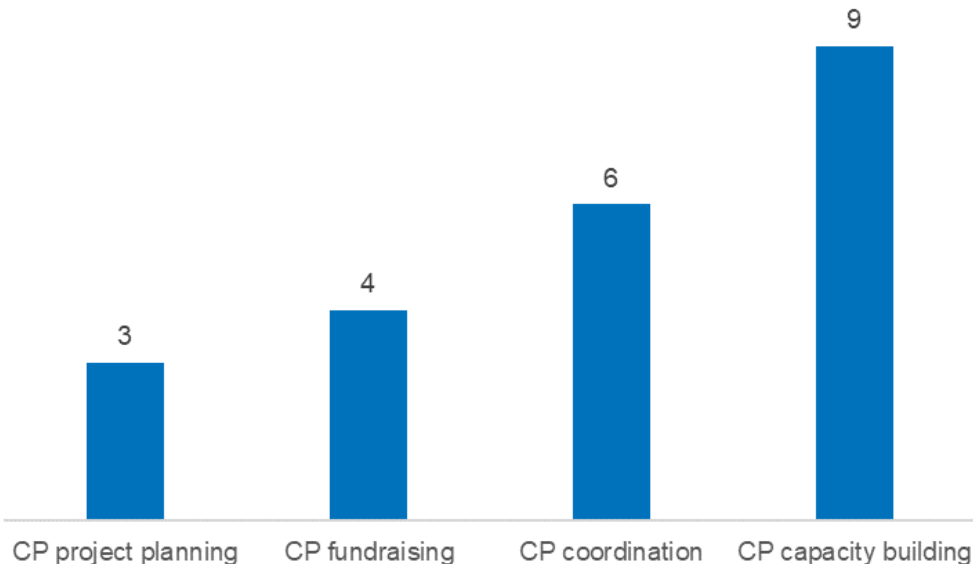

# Training Needs Survey (cont.)

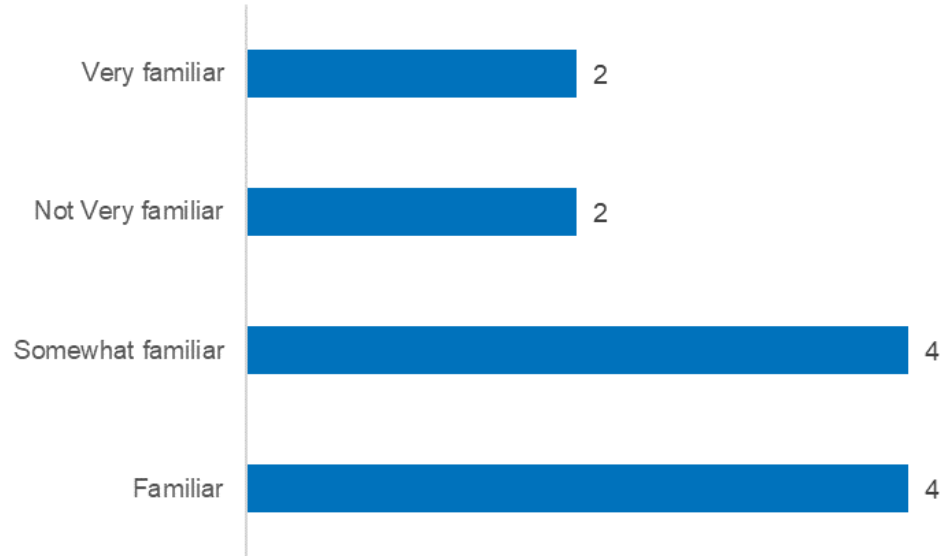
As a child protection practitioner, what capacity gaps do you identify as high and most urgent to ensure a quality child protection response?



# Training Needs Survey (cont.)

Are you familiar with the Child Protection Minimum Standards in Humanitarian settings?

- 8 out of 12 participants indicated their familiarity with the CPMS (66%)



# Regional Refugee Response Indicators

- # of children provided with child protection services
  - Activity Tags: Child Friendly Spaces and services that take place inside these locations (mobile/Blue Dot/RAC), Case Management (including Best Interests Procedures), CF Information, CP prevention and response, MHPSS
- # of participants trained on child protection and children's rights
  - Activity Tags: Capacity Building/Training
