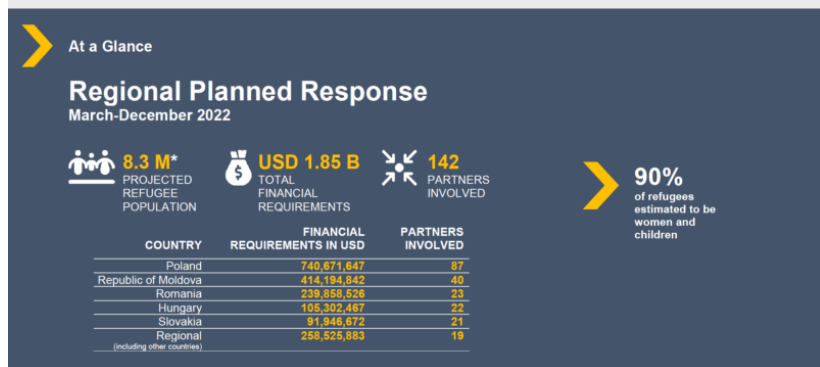

Strategic Objectives & National Priorities

1. Support host countries to ensure that every refugee from Ukraine has **access to safety and international protection**, in line with their situation, and in compliance with the principle of *non-refoulement*.

2. Support host countries to provide **timely and life-saving humanitarian assistance** for refugees, and vulnerable third-country nationals, with a specific focus on the most vulnerable.

3. Facilitate the identification of solutions for refugees from Ukraine from the onset through a whole-of-society approach.

4. Ensure effective coordination of partners at country and regional level in support of hosting countries' efforts.

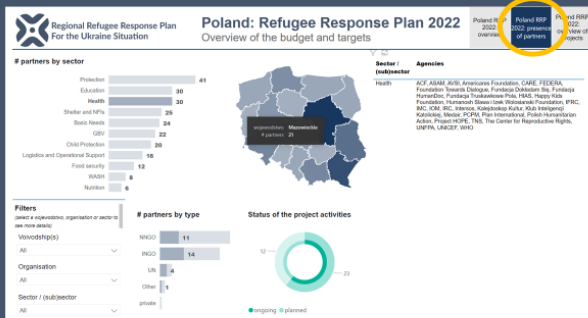

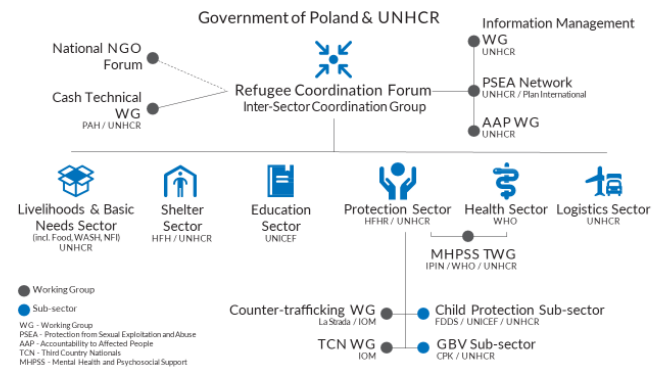

- The Protection sector is co-chair by Helsinki Foundation for Human Rights and UNHCR.
- The general protection activities supported through the Protection Sector contribute to the prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse in reducing refugees' vulnerability to exploitation.
- Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse remains challenging in an environment where refugees are spread out



	<p>in urban areas across Poland and a high number of volunteers are involved in the response, often for a short period of time.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• It is an ongoing process to ensure systematic reporting of cases of sexual exploitation and abuse in terms of communication with refugee communities, availability of confidential reporting and complaint mechanisms, and training of humanitarian and other actors.
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Agenda point 3	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• The Network is co-chaired by Plan International and UNHCR.• The PSEA Network was set up at the begging of the response due to the high prevalence of women and children, the high mobility of the population, and the number and variety of actors on the ground, including international humanitarian organizations, government, civil society, and a large volunteer force, exacerbate the risks of sexual exploitation and abuse (SEA).• Since the begging, several organizations started communicating with the communities through their web pages poster, flyer and contact details for reporting.• The PSEA Network was established under the Regional Refugee Coordination Forum in Poland from the onset of this emergency. 39 organisations had attended this coordination space, and around 20 are active members.• The Network has adopted ToRs and has conducted a rapid risk assessment (RRA), including a complementing vetting mechanism survey.• The Network is developing the action plan for the next 3 months and has decided to hold thematic meetings to encourage local organizations to join.
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Agenda point 4	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• The GBV sub-sector is co-chair by UNHCR and Centrum Praw Kobiet (CPK).• Preliminary referral pathways published at the Operations Data Portal: Information, general and specialized support for Ukrainian women including women who have experienced gender-based violence (GBV). Phone operators have received basic GBV training, can facilitate referrals to GBV specialists and arrange face-to-face psychological and legal counselling.• Ongoing development of GBV subsector SOPs (with coordination of other sub-sectors)
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Agenda point 5	<p>HIAS is providing small contribution agreements to local women's organizations and CBOs in Ukraine, Poland, and the region to expedite the due diligence process and ensure that funding is going to small local organizations that can respond immediately to the crisis and have a large impact in the community. HIAS is currently working mostly through partners in the region to provide GBV, MHPSS, cash, and livelihood support, and is working on opening up offices in Poland, Ukraine, Moldova, and Romania.</p>
