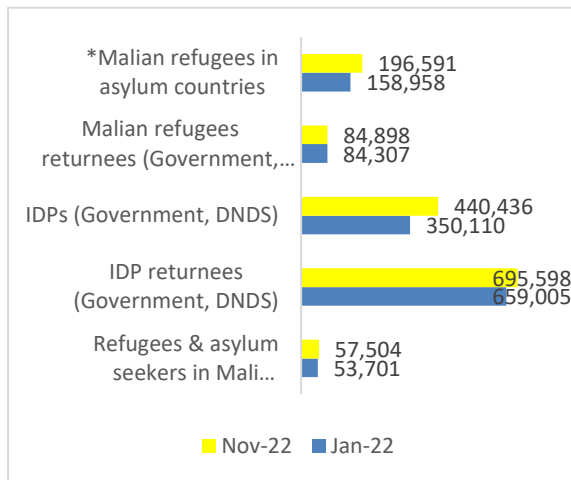

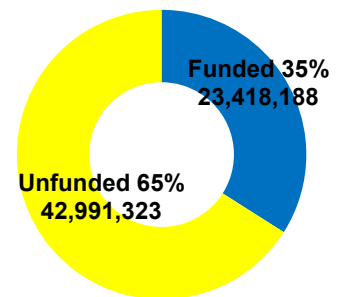

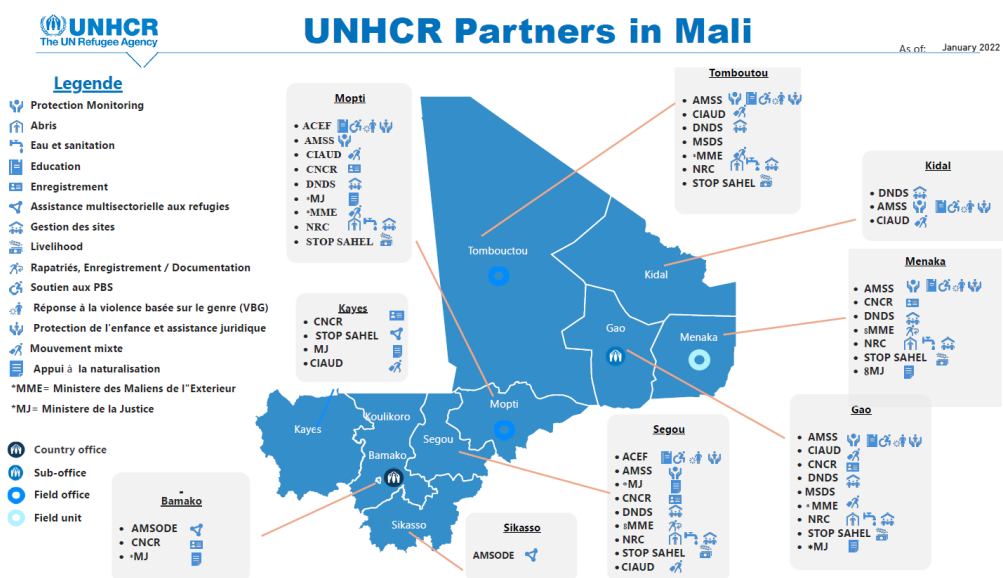

MAIN ACTIVITIES

PROTECTION

- In November, UNHCR received, advised, and guided six refugees (including two women and four men) plus one man asylum seeker following their needs including durables solutions (resettlement, repatriation), health, and documentation.
- UNHCR visited three detention centers, four police stations, and four gendarmerie brigades in Nioro Sahel, Diema, Kolokani, and Kita. No one person of concern was detained.  
During these visits, UNHCR sensitized 39 police and gendarmerie officers plus 19 persons in charge of the centers on the documentation of refugees and shared posters with them to easily recognize a refugee identity card.
- On 30 November, UNHCR organized a training workshop on international protection. The 43 participants (all men) are officers from the police, gendarmerie, and prison administration.
- In November UNHCR resolved 358 requests for assistance through the Blue Hotline.

Community Mobilization

- In November, in Ménaka, Gournas Rharous and Gossi, UNHCR assisted 121 persons with special needs (including 68 refugees) through the distribution of food kits and medical assistance.

Education

- In Kayes, UNHCR distributed school kits to 654 Mauritanian refugee students, including 347 girls and 307 boys. In Douentza, UNHCR distributed 100 school kits to 3 schools hosting displaced students.
- During November in Diré, Goundam, and Niafunké (region of Tombouctou), UNHCR trained 30 teachers, including 26 men and four women on psychosocial support.

Child Protection:

- During the period under review, UNHCR organized two recreational activities in Gossi and Ménaka reaching 35 children, including 26 boys and nine girls.

- In Gourmas Rharous in the Timbuktu region, UNHCR provided psychosocial support to 17 girls including 15 IDPs and two returnees.

### Gender-based violence

- In Douentza and Ménaka, UNHCR provided psychosocial and medical care to nine GBV survivors, including two cases of sexual assault, three cases of physical assault, three cases of denial of resources, and one case of psychological violence.
- In Douentza, UNHCR distributed 5 dignity kits to 5 women from the host population.
- UNHCR and its partners conducted 32 awareness-raising sessions on GBV and the importance of prenatal medical consultation, in Ansongo, Douentza, Ménaka and Gourmas Rharous, reaching 428 persons, including 303 women, 19 men, 96 girls, and ten boys. Many internally displaced persons and refugees participated in these sensitizations

### Mixed Movements:

- In November, 490 persons (327 men, 146 women, 10 girls, and 7 boys) of various nationalities were identified in Mali's mixed movements, especially in the regions of Gao, Kidal, Kayes, Menaka, Mopti, Nioro, Segou, and Timbuktu. Many of these people on the move have suffered psychological and emotional abuse, theft, extortion, destruction of property, racketeering, and arbitrary arrest.
- UNHCR conducted a total of 32 awareness-raising sessions in the Gao, Kayes, Mopti, and Timbuktu regions, reaching 357 persons, including 233 men, 113 women, nine boys, and two girls. These sessions focused on the refugee status determination process, asylum procedures in Mali, the consequences of irregular migration, the importance of civil registration, and prevention against COVID-19.

### Statelessness:

- On 22 and 23 November in Segou, UNHCR organized a workshop to validate the documents relating to the creation of a directorate for the procedure for determining statelessness status in Mali. The 50 participants (30 men and 20 women) are government staff (governors, mayors, prefects, and other government officials staffs). During the workshop, participants validated the creation of the National Commission for Stateless Persons and the Appeals Commission. The next step will be the submission of these documents to the Council of Ministers for approval.
- On 14 and 15 November in Bamako, UNHCR trained 35 staff (including 21 men and 14 women) of the National Human Rights Commission (CNDH) on statelessness. During the workshop, presentations were also made on international protection, cross-cutting protection, and child protection. The training allowed participants to strengthen their knowledge of UNHCR's mandate and the rights of refugees.
- As part of the fight against statelessness, UNHCR, through its partner Stop Sahel, facilitated the registration of 11 newborns (six girls and five boys) in the Mauritanian refugee community in Kayes.
- As part of the naturalization process of Mauritanian refugees, UNHCR facilitated 200 applications for the naturalization of Mauritanian refugees. Of these 200 applications, 125 were for children under the age of 18 including 68 boys and 57 girls.

### Durable solutions:

#### Voluntary Repatriation:

- As part of the civil documentation support, UNHCR registered 400 children returnees who don't have civil status documents in the Segou region. The list of 400 children was transmitted to the authorities for the establishment of birth certificates.

## Resettlement

- In November, in Bamako, UNHCR facilitated and organized the departure for resettlement to Canada of two refugee families of Rwandan nationality. The first family is composed of a man head of household, his wife, and five children (three girls and two boys). The second is composed of a widowed woman and her nephew.
- UNHCR continues to profile refugees in Kayes, Menaka, and Mopti to identify potential cases of refugees requiring resettlement.

## SHELTER & NON-FOOD-ITEMS (NFIs) & WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE (WASH)

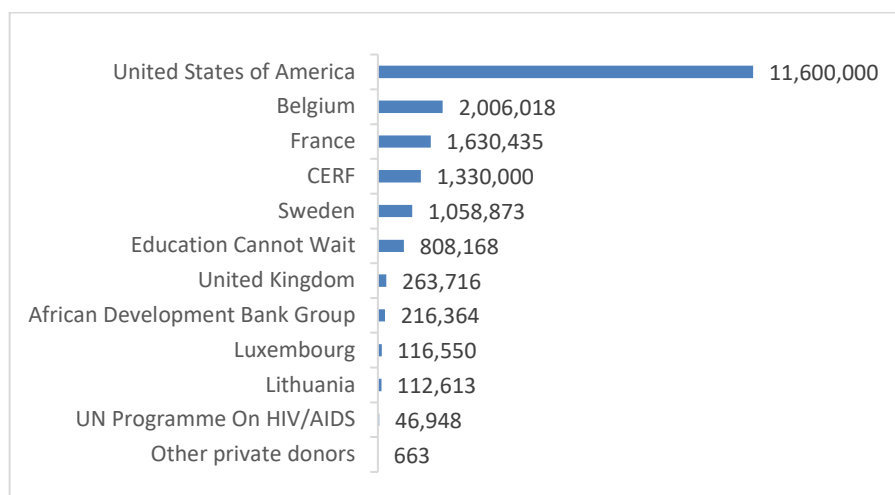
- At a school in Gounzoureye in the Gao region, UNHCR has built a block of three classrooms and two blocks of three latrines. These achievements will reduce overcrowding in the school, which has many displaced pupils.
- In Mopti, UNHCR installed 74 traditional huts, 32 Refugee House Units (RHU), and 35 solar-powered lamp posts at the IDP site.
- In Timbuktu, UNHCR installed 70 traditional huts for 555 refugees in the village of Gossi.
- In Timbuktu, UNHCR organized two training workshops for administrative and traditional authorities and also refugee and IDP leaders on the peaceful resolution of conflicts and the importance of documenting housing and land. A total of 59 persons (31 women and 28 men) participated in these workshops, including refugees and IDPs.
- In Kidal, UNHCR provided shelter/NFI assistance to 541 IDP households who fled insecurity in Talataye village last September. The kits are composed of 66 family tents, 1,093 mats, 968 mosquito nets, 978 buckets, 1,168 jerrycans, 549 kitchen sets, 897 solar lamps, 370 tarpaulins, and 1,110 blankets.

## FINANCIAL INFORMATION
