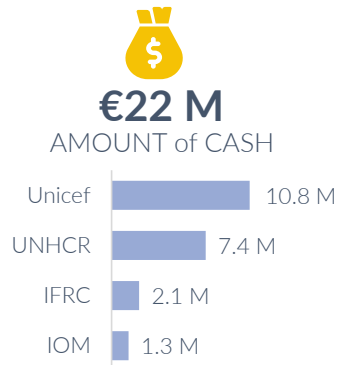
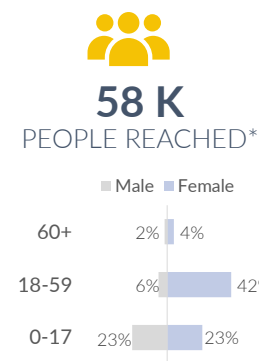
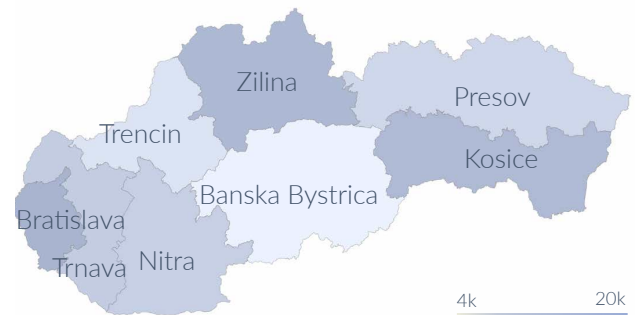


The Government of Slovakia's Ministry of Labour, Social Affairs, and Family (MoLSAF) provides social aid in the form of cash transfers to vulnerable Slovak households via their Material Needs programme. On 22 February, the Government began to welcome refugees from Ukraine into this program as well: the first payments to refugees were on April and May. To mitigate costs and help manage the scale of enrolment, MoLSAF requested international support with transitional cash aid to the approximately 20,000 refugee families already enrolled in addition to future refugee enrollees as well as international support with enrolling refugees into the system. UNHCR, UNICEF, IOM and IFRC answered this call and, in close coordination implemented Cash Assistance in Slovakia in 2022. This dashboard aims to demonstrated the joint achievement of the Cash Working Group on the delivery of assistance for refugees from Ukraine.

PEOPLE REACHED by REGION

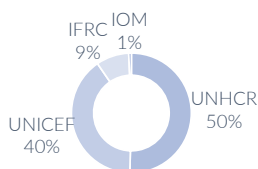

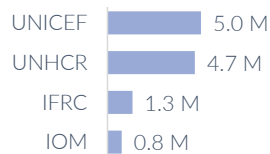

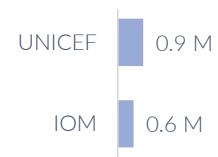


CASH FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITY

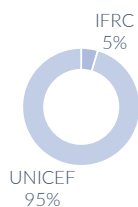

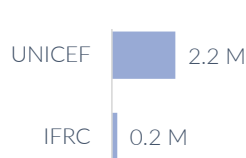


CASH FOR EDUCATION

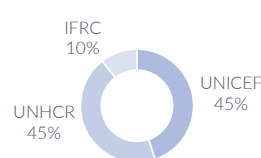

Feedback from people assisted

The Post Distribution Monitoring (PDM) is an exercise of a specific cash distribution, conducted independently from the cash distribution exercise itself. It is designed to collect information related to the objectives of CBI (e.g. access to basic needs and services or shelter construction), coping strategies and spending habits, and the quality of the distribution process. PDM findings will be used to verify compliance with agreed procedures and detect irregularities. The results are fed back into the programme cycle in order to improve the way CBIs are designed, calculated and delivered. In general in Slovakia, the PDM results shows that 72% of beneficiaries had their living conditions improved due to cash assistance given. Additionally, 89% had their financial burden decreased because of the cash assistance, and, therefore reducing the feeling of stress.
