

Uganda Refugee Response Plan (RRP) 2024-2025

January - June 2024

Overview

The overall protection objective is to ensure that refugees and asylum-seekers have access to asylum, fair and accelerated asylum procedures as well as full enjoyment of their rights as set forth in international and domestic laws. It remains crucial for UNHCR and partners to continue to strengthen the capacity of the government institutions to respond to emergencies, support improvements in registration and the asylum system whilst providing life-saving services, as well as monitoring, mitigating protection risks, building resilience of the forcibly displaced and stateless persons and enhancing durable solutions.

Efforts will continue to be made to reinforce comprehensive feedback and response mechanisms to ensure accountability to affected populations (AAP). In addition, special focus will be given to the vulnerable groups with the objective of ensuring that they have equal access to protection assistance and the opportunity to participate in community self-management and decision-making. Meanwhile, peaceful coexistence among communities as well as the provision of mental health and psychosocial support services (MHPSS) will remain a priority.

Product Scope

This product covers an overview of the sector, key achievements, funding situation including, Registration, Refugee Status Determination (RSD), Community-Based Protection (CBP), Mental Health Psychosocial Support (MHPSS), Legal and Feedback Referral and Resolution Mechanism (FRRM) as part of Protection leaving out CP and GBV which have been analysed in separate dashboards.

The Result Analysis:

Refugee Status Determination (RSD): As of Q2, 8,373 applications went through RSD procedures with total of 9,878 individuals, 82% of the total are Somalians (Those who were interviewed last year before putting the Somalis on hold for the RSD), in general, . 99.7% recognition rate. Congolese, South Sudanese, and Sudanese are granted prime-facia status on appearing at the border. . A total of 71,446 individuals have been granted refugee status based on it, reflecting a commitment to humanitarian support. The Refugee Appeals Board's thorough review processes also underscore the careful consideration given to each case, ensuring that decisions are fair and just.

Access to Justice: By the end of quarter II a total of 81,727 individuals (40,701 F/ 41,026 M) benefited from legal assistance and sensitization, representing 59% of the total reached in Q2. A total of 45,430 individuals (23,423 F/ 22,007 M) benefited from sensitization on the International and Domestic Refugee Laws. 54% of this total reached in Q2. While 36,297 individuals (17,278F / 19,019M) benefited from legal assistance including access to legal counselling, legal representation, accessing mobile courts, and detention monitoring visits.

Accountability to Affected Populations (AAP): A total of 32,440 complaints have been addressed through effective feedback and response mechanisms including 332 received and addressed from the host community. 51% of the complaints were received through the Inter-Agency FRRM, while 49% were received through other mechanisms. This represents 48% increase of Q1 achievements, and 49% of the annual target for 2024. 9,001 new queries have been received and referred through the Inter-Agency FRRM helpline in Q2 2024. Through other feedback and response mechanisms including protection/help desks, complaints, and suggestion boxes, 6,475 new queries have been received, referred to, and addressed by partners during the reporting period.

Community-Based Protection (CBP): One session of the Refugee Engagement Forum (REF) has taken place at national level in quarter 2 (April 2024) while the feedback sessions continued to be organized at the settlement level. These meetings have allowed communities to share their main asks to the stakeholders of the Uganda Refugee Response. The World Refugee Day (WRD) Commemoration in June 2024 has been organized with the involvement of the communities at the national and district levels. The event has allowed to reflect on the key gaps to address for a more sustainable refugee response in the context of the Localization Agenda.

During the quarter, Uganda has participated to 2 series of webinars globally to share experiences of CBP Promising Practices within the Response: the grant for empowering refugee-led organizations (RLOs) and the Refugee Engagement Forum (REF).

Support to Persons with Specific Needs (PSNs) including Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS): A total of 23,554 PSNs (12,918F/ 7,728M) have been supported by the various partners, 58% of the total reached in Q2, 28% increase compared to the same period last year. The performance represents 19% of the annual target. Funding challenges faced by partners greatly contributed to the recorded low level of performance. A total of 160,179 individuals (94,893F/ 65,286M) accessed level 1, level 2, and level 3 MHPSS services, 50% of them reached in Q2. This represents 50% of the annual target achievement, The same level of achievement was attained in Q2 of 2023.
